

## TEXAS TALK



### By Glenn Winfrey

Solar heat collectors on a commercial scale will probably show up on the farm before anywhere else. Exactly when solar energy units can practically be used is still an open question. Certainly not right away, but tests performed in six states by the Agricultural Research Service indicate that low temperature drying of grain by use of simple solar collectors is technically feasible. Technically feasible and economically practical are often some distance apart. It appears this is still the case with solar drying since the main thing the ARS testing ascertained was a need for more tests. The new series of tests will be conducted during the next two years and will provide more information on economics of the various commercial systems as well as increasing the technological information available on solar energy collection.

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



HOW TO STUDY THE BIBLE ... Continued Number five: We must study the Bible realizing that he

Bible itself makes a clear distinction between the Old Covenant and the New. In Mt. 26:28 the Lord said. "For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins". In Heb. 9:15 we have: "And for this cause he is the mediator of the new testament, that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance". Then in verses 16 and 17 of Heb. 9 we read: "For where a testament is, there must also of necessity be the death of the testator. For a testament is of force after men are dead: otherwise it is of no strength at all while the testator liveth." In Heb. 10:9 the Record says, "He taketh away the first that he may establish the second". In Heb. 8:8 Paul quotes God as saying, "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and with the house of Judah:..." Then, in verse 13 Paul comments: " In that he saith, A new covenant, he hath made the first old. Now that which decayeth and waxeth old is ready to vanish away." In the Old Testament we have type; in the New Testament we have anti-type. In the Old Testament we have shadow; in the New Testament we have the substance (that which made the shadow). In the Old Testament we have copy; in the New Testament we have the original. In the Old Testament we have figure; in the New Testament we have the real. In this connection, let me suggest that you study carefully: I Pet. 3:21; Heb. 10:1; Heb. 9:9; Heb. 9:23. The Old Testament prepares the way for the New. The Old Testament is the New Testament concealed; the New Testament is the Old Testament revealed.


