Callahan County Commissioners set the December 2 date after being presented a petition on November 10 requesting the balloting. The petition reportedly had 135 qualified voter signatures.

Tuesday's election will be the first such vote in Baird in 13 years.

Veterans Advised To File Papers With County Clerk

All veterans who have not already done so should take advantage of the free service which enables them to have their military discharge papers put on record at the County Clerk's office. According to Irvin G. Mcbley, Veterans Service Officer for Callahan County, many veterans have already recorded their discharges and thus are able to quickly obtain a certified copy in the event it is needed.

There are many occasions when a veteran is called upon to provide proof of his military service. Many employers require proof of service in personnel files, and the veteran must produce an honorable discharge in order to obtain admission to Veterans Administration Hospital. When faced with a medical emergency, it is most important that hospital admission be accomplished without any unnecessary delays. Proof of honorable military service could, in such instances, be the difference between life and death.

On July 12, 1973, there was a disastrous fire in the National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis, Mo., and the service records of more than five million Army veterans were completely destroyed. Many veterans are now experiencing great difficulties in proving they were ever in military service because their records were destroyed and they have lost their discharges.

Many World War II veterans took advantage of the free recording service, as did those who served during the Korean Conflict. It appears, however, that the Vietnam veterans have not followed this practice as relatively few have recorded their discharges of DD Form 2-14. Every veteran is advised to immediately take his discharge to the County Clerk's office for free recording, as such action now may save him untold hours or days of anguish later when he is badly in need of proof of his military service.

Thanksgiving Planned As Holiday In Cross Plains

Thursday, Thanksgiving Day, will be a holiday for many Cross Plains businesses.

Virtually all business houses in the downtown section of the city will be closed all day Thursday, and several concerns along highways leading into Cross Plains will also be closed for the day.

At least one office in the city will take a two-day break. West Texas Utilities Co. office will be closed both Thursday and Friday, according to Gene Rhodes, local manager. Office of the City of Cross Plains took two holidays last year, and it was expected that would be repeated this year.

Cross Plains schools will dismiss classes at 3:15 p.m. Wednesday, earlier than normal, and students will not return to classes until Monday, Dec. 1 when regular schedule will resume.

Dumping In Creek Here Is Prohibited

Persons who have been dumping household trash, dead animals and deer remains in Turkey Creek on the Old Cottonwood road are advised that violations will be reported.

It is pointed out by local law officers that dumping in waterways of the state is prohibited by law, and that persons violating that law may be prosecuted.

It was noted by Bobby Golsen that dumping in Turkey Creek near his home has long been a problem, and violations have recently increased. Last week a dead calf, believed to weigh about 300 pounds, was dumped there as were deer hides and remains and small animals.

Golsen advised law officers, and it is reported that regular patrols will be made along the route by officers.

County Commissioner E. F. (Franz) Odom noted that his workmen will install no dumping signs at the site.

Golsen warned that he will definitely report violators to law officers, and asks help of other local citizens in preventing pollution of his place and the stream.

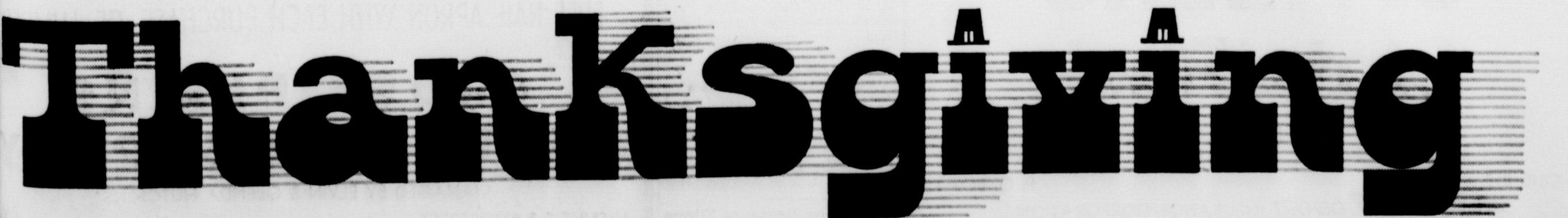
Miss Dillard claimed eighth chair in the flute section. She

Farms In Callahan Yield \$13.9 Million Last Year

Compared with farmers and ranchers in many parts of the country, the Callahan County farm community made out relatively well in the past year.

Their gross receipts from the sale of crops, livestock and other commodities were at a comparatively high level, according to the final tabulations, recently released.

Credit for it is attributed to high prices obtained for most farm products rather than to increased production.

In general, throughout the country, that was the picture—reduced output that was compensated for by better prices. Crop receipts rose \$8 billion in the year, but livestock suffered a drop of \$2 billion.

As a result, gross farm income in the United States rose above the \$100 billion mark for the first time, reaching \$102 billion.

The facts and figures for the local area and for other sections of the country are from a survey made by the Standard Rate and Data Service and from reports issued by the Department of Agriculture.

Total receipts in Callahan County from farm operations in the past year are listed at \$13,928,000. The previous year's total was \$10,791,000.

That was the gross return, before any allowances for taxes, labor costs, fuel, equipment and supplies.

It represents the overall receipts from the sale of farm products, together with government payments and the value of home-grown foods consumed on the farm.

The increase, 29 per cent, compares with a rise of 21 per cent in the United States.

According to the most recent breakdown from the Department of Agriculture, approximately 18 per cent of the cash proceeds from farm marketings locally is from crops and 82 per cent from the sale of livestock, poultry and dairy goods.

Although gross income was up for most of the nation's farmers, their realized net income was not. Increased production expenses, especially in the form of sharply higher prices for seed, feed, fuel and fertilizer, and a cutback in government payments left them with a net income of \$27.2 billion, which was about \$5 billion less than in 1973.

However, notes Agriculture Department, it was the second best year on record. It topped 1972 by a wide margin.

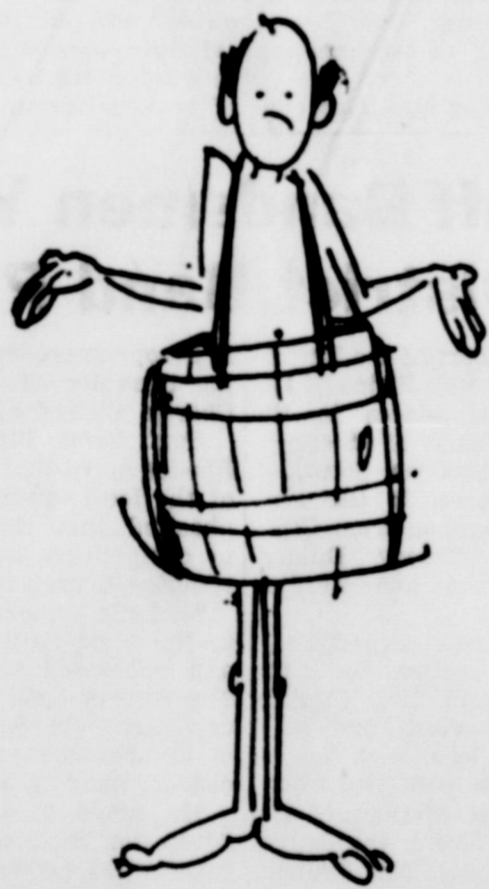
