

4 To 6-Inch Snow Covers Locality; School Is Closed

Frigid temperatures and a covering of four to six inches of snow struck the Cross Plains area last week.

As citizens of this section of the

state were trying to thaw and rebound from extremely cold week end and Monday, Jan. 9-11, another "blue norther" hit Tuesday night and turned the locality into

a white frigid icebox.

Snow showers fell through the night, beginning about 11 p.m., followed by hard snow through the mid-portion of Wednesday morning. Measurements of the snow ranged from four to six inches in the Cross Plains area. It curtailed travel for some time and classes at Cross Plains Schools were dismissed both Wednesday and Thursday. Classes resumed Friday when southerly winds brought warmer temperatures. Roadways cleared Thursday, but local thermometers which didn't get above 18 to 20 degrees all day Wednesday dipped down to 5 degrees or so early Thursday.

Cold temperatures returned for the week end, but warmed into the 70's Monday.

A clear day Monday gave way to cloudy weather on Tuesday.

The moisture from the melting snow was welcomed by all farmers and ranchers, and noted more is needed. It is the first moisture of 1982.

On a cold Tuesday night of last week, Moran came here and defeated Buffettes 52-20, but the Buffaloes annexed first league win 70-38. Friday night at Gorman local girls lost a close contest 29-27, but host Panthers slapped the Bisons 79-49.

Moran girls quickly gained upper hand Tuesday of last week by posting an 11-2 first quarter lead and rolling to a 28-4 halftime decision. Cold shooting Buffettes warmed a little in third and fourth quarters but lost 52-20.

Scoring for Cross Plains were Jo Koenig 6, Paula Allen 5, Kathy Jones 4, Leichelle Thompson 3 and Shelli McCoy 2. Kathy Jackson led Moran with 17.

Buffaloes broke a 10-10 first quarter tie by gaining a 27-18 advantage at halftime. They rolled

to the 70-38 win by hitting 47 per cent from the field and 73 per cent from the free throw line. Kirby Stephens canned 12 of 14 charity tosses.

Terrel Harris bucketed 15 points for top scoring honors. Others were Stephens and Jeff McCoy 14 each, Dennis Koenig 13, Richard Clark 6 and John Hanke, Ronald Hilburn, Randy Phillips and William Sneed 2 each.

Buffettes watched an 8-6 edge slide into a one-point deficit, 15-16 and 22-23, at halftime and third quarter respectively before finally bowing 29-27 to host Gorman Friday. Cross Plains made only 9 of 30 free shots.

Valerie Whitsitt paced Cross Plains scoring with 10, followed by Koenig 6, P. Allen and L. Thompson 4 each and Jones 3. Rodgers led Gorman with 11.

Gorman was ranked 15th in state in Class A last Friday, and

Gas Rate Talks Set At Austin Thursday

Opposing local forces say the gas rate hearing with the Texas Railroad Commission at Austin will be held Thursday beginning at 10 a.m. at the commission's quarters.

The session, which has been delayed several times, was kayoed last week by snow-packed roads Wednesday and Thursday, making travel hazardous.

The hearing is to set a rate Flame Gas, Inc. can charge its customers in the City of Cross Plains. Flame is currently operating on an interim rate of \$6.39 per thousand cubic feet granted by the Railroad Commission several months ago. The hearing became necessary when rates asked by Flame were unanimously rejected by the Cross Plains City Council.

Flame announced that the gas purchase adjustment clause charge for the bills which will be issued February 1 will be \$1.73 per mcf, 22 cents less than was required for January billing.

New Voters Cards Now Being Mailed

Albert Lovell, Callahan County Assessor - Collector, announced Tuesday that the 1982-83 voter certificates are being placed in the mail.

These certificates will replace the ones the registered voter currently holds which are good through February 28, 1982.

Under current law, these certificates must be mailed in non-forfeitable mail. So therefore, if a person has changed mailing address, his voter certificate will be returned to the tax office. In case a current registered voter in Callahan County does not receive his new voter certificate, he will need to contact the county tax office. Also in case a person has moved from one voting precinct to another in this county, he will need to contact the county tax office 30 days prior to an election to get his voting precinct changed.

To all persons who are not currently registered to vote in Callahan County, notice is given that they must register 30 days prior to an election they desire to vote in.

Peanut Producers Vote Program Fate

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will conduct a referendum January 25-29 to determine whether peanut poundage quotas will be in effect for 1982-85 crops.

If two thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum approve poundage quotas, peanut growers will be eligible for price support loans and subject to penalties on peanuts marketed for domestic edible use in excess of their poundage quota. If they do not approve poundage quotas there will be no price support and no penalties.

The peanut price support program, through poundage quotas, limits the number of pounds of peanuts that can be marketed by producers for domestic edible uses. The national poundage quota for 1982 is 1.2 million tons, according to Callahan County ASC Director, Melanie Covington. The Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 eliminates the traditional peanut acreage allotments system. "This means that any person can grow peanuts anywhere in the country and market for the peanuts for other than domestic edible use," Miss Covington said. Under previous programs, production was limited to farms with an allotment.

The program will continue to have two price support levels, one for quota peanuts and another lower level for additional peanuts. The price support level for quota peanuts grown within farm poundage quotas will be a minimum of 27.5 cents per pound (\$550 per ton) for 1982-1985 crops. Miss Covington said the 1982 level to be established by the Secretary of Agriculture will be based on cost of production, including land cost, with annual increases beginning in 1983 to reflect the national average production cost increases beginning in 1983 to reflect the national average production cost increases in cost of land. The maximum annual increase allowed for the quota peanut support level is six (6) per cent. The support level for additional peanuts, those produced in excess of the poundage quota, will be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Legislation requires that the support level for peanuts produced on nonquota farms, will be based upon the projected world price for peanut oil and meal and that the secretary maintain a low price support level to insure no cost to the government. "This production must either be contracted for export by April 15 or be placed under loan and marketed through an area marketing association," Miss Covington said.

As in previous programs, all peanut producers must certify to their planted acres and have peanut marketing cards before they can sell peanuts. The cards will state how many pounds of

peanuts can be marketed for domestic edible uses, and will be used to account for disposition of additional peanuts.

All producers of quota peanuts in 1981 are eligible to vote in the

upcoming mail referendum. Further details on the new peanut program may be obtained by contacting the Callahan ASCS office, second floor of the courthouse, at Baird.

Peanut Grower Groups Urge Vote For Quotas And Price Supports

Editor's Note: Peanuts are a vital crop to the economy of the Cross Plains community, and growers will take part in a referendum by mail from county ASCS offices next week, January 25-26. The following message in respect to the referendum has been offered to the Review for publication. It reportedly has been endorsed by the National Peanut Growers Group and by all peanut grower organizations in the state.

"Peanut growers will have an opportunity to vote in a very crucial belt-wide referendum during the week of January 25 to determine if we will have a peanut price support program this year. If growers approve quotas by a two-thirds majority of those voting, quotas and price supports will be in effect throughout the four years, 1982-1985. If growers fail to approve quotas, there would be no quotas or price supports in effect for 1982 and another referendum would be conducted next December to determine marketing procedure in 1983.

"There is a big difference in the past for peanut growers. In past referenda, if growers had failed to approve quotas, there still would have been a program with support prices at 50 per cent of parity for those growers planting within their allotments. This year, however, if growers fail to approve quotas, the new Farm Bill specifically provides that there will be no price support. In other words should growers fail

to approve quotas, there would be no program whatever, neither quotas nor support price, in 1982.

"However, if two-thirds of the growers participating in the referendum vote to approve, will maintain our program framework with a quota support rate of \$550 per ton in 1982 — a 21 per cent increase over 1981 — and with mandatory increases in subsequent years to help offset production cost increases. We will have a national poundage quota of 1.2 million tons in 1982, along with substantially strengthened undermarketing carry forward provisions beginning with unused undermarketings in 1980.

"We know that many peanut producers are unhappy with the program and its future outlook. Such feelings are understandable, but they are not good reasons for voting out the peanut program altogether or for not voting. With all of its problems, the peanut program is one of two remaining commodity programs that contain the basic essentials for success — supply management and support prices. These features must be preserved. Don't risk losing these fundamental concepts — Vote For Quotas and Price Supports.

"We urge that you not only vote in the referendum, but that you join with other growers in your community in setting up a telephone call campaign just prior to and during the referendum period to remind growers to vote. "A vote not cast can be used by program adversaries almost as effectively as a vote against quotas."

Social Security Benefits Cut For College Pupils

High school seniors whose parents are dead, disabled or retired should be aware of a new ruling regarding college entrance in 1982. These students must be enrolled and attending a college full time (at least 12 semester hours) before May 1, 1982.

Congress cut the \$2.33 billion Social Security student benefits as part of President Reagan's program to cut government spending. The lawmakers voted last August to phase out by 1985 all benefits for college students 18 to 22. High school students can get benefits up to age of 19. Social Security's children benefits expire at age 18 for non-students.

Only students whose parent died was disabled, or retired on Social Security before last August can qualify for the college and beyond the current school year. Any college student whose parent died, retired or was disabled since September can get benefits only through July.

Mrs. Bobbie Trammell, counselor at Cross Plains ISD states that the only college that has contacted her with a plan to enroll senior students before the May 1 deadline is Cisco Junior College. Their plan is:

Pre-summer term April 13 to May 20 (6 weeks).

Freshman English — 3:00 to 4:45 Monday-Thursday.

Freshman History — 5:00 to 6:45 Monday-Thursday.

Summer term June 1 to July 8 (6 weeks).

Freshman English — Time to be decided, Monday-Thursday.

Freshman History — Time to be decided, Monday-Thursday.

Each of the above classes will be 3 semester hours, which would be the required 12 semester hours.

Cisco Junior College will offer these courses at Cisco and Clyde Branch.

Senior students must be enrolled and attending classes in order to receive Social Security benefits the remaining years of college.
