New Voters Cards Now Being Mailed

national average production cost increases in cost of land. The maximum annual increase allowed for the quota peanut support level is six (6) per cent. The support level for additional peanuts, those produced in excess of the poundage quota, will be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Legislation requires that the support level for peanuts produced on nonquota farms, will be based upon the projected world price for peanut oil and meal and that the secretary maintain a low price support level to insure no cost to the government. "This

production must either be contracted for export by April 15 on be placed under loan and marketed through an area marketing association," Miss Covington said.

As in previous programs, a peanut producers must certify to their planted acres and have peanut marketing cards before they can sell peanuts. The cards will state how many pounds of
