Visiting Lometa Hornets spotted the Cross Plains Buffaloes a 7-0 lead before striking twice in just over a minute to disappoint the **Bisons in District 8-A East** 

Zone action here Friday. Victor of the game here Friday could possibly have taken a giant step toward annexing a playoff spot at regular season's end. "At least we could have been in a position to control our own destiny," said Head Coach Mark Davidson. He added that it was a disappointing loss, but simply means that we must work harder and hope for someone else to do us a favor, if we are to earn a playoff spot.

Buffaloes struck quickly on a complicated play the Buffaloes worked to perfection. In the second quarter **Bisons Quarterback Devin** Koenig flipped a short pass to Split End Ricky White who immediately lateraled to trailing Halfback Darin Apple who sped untouched into the end zone completing the 63-yard play. Koenig kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead.
