A computer that can think?

Scientists are studying the way humans and animals think to try to make computers more versatile.

Scientists who design computers are looking into the way animals think, trying to understand how a mammal's brain is "wired." Though it will be quite a while before they can do it, they hope to someday make computers as smart as the family pet.

The difference they say, is specialization. Computers may be great at math, but they have a hard time being great at several things at once, the way a human or animal brain may be. It's possible to run some special-purpose computing machines as fast as a hundred million instructions per second, and some of the very powerful computers can do things almost that fast. A simple task like taking speech without understanding it and turning it into text, the kind of thing a human stenographer does - probably runs a thousand million instructions per second. Meanwhile the stenographer's brain is keeping her vital signs going, perhaps deciding what she'll have for lunch and taking in what her eyes see as she looks around the room. That's probably millions or trillions of instructions per second.

A human or animal brain is different from a computer in its ability to integrate. Researchers at AT&T are also looking at ways to get the specialist computers to cooperate. Rather than trying to extend the individual expertise of a system any further, they are trying to work out a way each expert is responsible for that part of the world which it knows and then provide an "intelligent" network for these experts to

permit the best exchange of information and combine their areas of expertise. One might say "I know how to fill out tax forms," another one says "I know about the penalties for violating the tax fraud laws." A third says, "I know how to analyze a checking account." Then they all cooperate in advising you whether a questionable deduction ought to be put in your income tax.

Large groups of people, including small business owners, consumers, students, professionals, taxpayers and government workers, can benefit from the quality of the efforts of researchers at AT&T Technologies. Quality is one of the keynotes of that company. In fact, its president, James E. Olson has been asked to kick off a five-year project to improve quality in business throughout the country. He's working on that for the American Society of Quality Control, the worldwide leader in the development, promotion and application of quality and quality technologies for the quality profession, private sector, government and academia.

The quality work of the company researchers, it is hoped, can create a computer that, while it can never give its owner the affection a dog does, it can offer some of the versatility.

Dorothy Webb Winner Of 'O.P. Schnabel Award'

Editor's Note: Julene Franke, president of the Cross Plains Gary Club, has advised the Review that one of the local gardeners has been announced as winner of the prestigious "O.P. Schnabel Award", given by Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc. Winner is Dorothy Webb of Webb's Store community, near Burkett. The following article was authored by Jeans Sparks and appeared in a summer issue of the Transportation News of Austin.

A farm to market road in Coleman County owes most of its bluebonnets and purple paintbrush to Dorothy Webb. When Dorothy and her husband Bevo moved from South Dakota twelve years

ago into the old Webb family homestead at the far end of Farm to Market Road 2806 near Burkett, there were no bluebonnets along the road.

Actually, about a mile south, a small patch grew near a neighbor's gate. These bluebonnets inspired what Dorothy calls her "impossible dream" - to have bluebonnets and paintbrush the entire length of the road.

Dorothy has been planting these beautiful wildflowers since her first year in Texas. Not only that, but she regularly picks up litter "so there won't be any beer cans among the bluebonnets."

"I hate that," she said with a grin.

Dorothy decided that there needed to be a "Please Don't Litter" sign, so she made one and posted it right by the

"Webb Ranch" sign.

The hardest part of her project, Dorothy says, is gathering the seed. For one thing, the best time to harvest bluebonnet seed and the best time to catch channel cat too often coincide. When she has to make a choice, sometimes the fishing wins. However she constantly looks for flower seed sources. One of the best places to find them is in friends' yards or fields in Burkett. The paintbrush seed are tiny, but easier to find and easier to get started than the bluebonnets, she thinks.

This one-woman wildflower project has suffered a few setbacks over the years. Once the seed molded, and last year a gas line was put through the largest patch, destroying many

Herd Rolls Past Rochelle 33-6 In Conference Play

Cross Plains Buffaloes recorded their second triumph of the football season Friday night defeating the host Rochelle Hornets 33-6 in a District 8-A East Zone squabble.

The victory raised the Herd's district record to 2-1, and the season mark to 2-4. Rochelle is still winless.

Buffaloes quickly gained the upper hand in the contest, scoring on their first possession of the game. The touchdown came on a 6-yard pass from Quarterback Devin Koenig to Tight End Troy Harris with almost 10 minutes left to play, in the first canto. Halfback Darin Apple set up the tally with a 55-yard run, and the Koenig to Harris combination click-

ed for the counter about five plays later. Koenig's attempted kick from placement failed on the conversion.

Apple scored on a 9-yard run in the second quarter to boost the score 12-0 favoring the Buffaloes. A 2-point conversion pass from Koenig to Wide Receiver Greg Weiss upped the Herd's advantage to 14-0.

Cross Plains' third touchdown came with just 30 seconds left in the first half. Scoring thrust of a three-play blitz was a 22-yard strike from Koenig to Split End Ricky White. An attempted pass failed on the two-point conversion try, but Bisons owned a 20-0 lead at halftime. Big play of the

65-yard drive which was put into gear by Koenig intercepting a Hornet pass, was a pass to Weiss for the first down at the Rochelle 22.

Strike Swiftly
Buffaloes struck quickly after resuming play in the second half. Koenig swiped a Hornet aerial and returned it 42 yards for a touchdown. Koenig's kick from placement was good and the Herd owned a 27-0 advantage three plays deep in the second half.

Cross Plains ended its scoring for the night as it had begun on a pass from Quarterback Koenig to Tight End Troy Harris. The last one was a 17-yarder in the third stanza. Conversion at-

tempt failed, and the Herd owned a 33-0 advantage.

Rochelle quickly retaliated when Hornet Matt Clark gathered in the kickoff and returned it yards for the touchdown. An attempted 2-point conversion run failed, and the final score appeared on the scoreboard favoring Bisons 33-6.

Leading Buffaloes
Leading ball carrier for the Herd was Halfback Darin Apple who gained 101 yards on 9 carries.

Quarterback Devin Koenig was credited by Head Coach Mark Davidson with throwing the ball extremely well, citing the three touchdown passes and 50 per cent completion figure.

Mighty Mites Bat Rochelle 24-6 In District Warfare

Showing improvement on both offense and defense the Cross Plains Junior High School Mighty Mites posted a 24-6 win over visiting Rochelle juniors at Buffalo Stadium Thursday.

The triumph was the second of the season and the second consecutive for the Mites in leveling the team's record at 2-2 on the season and boosting the mark 2-1 in district battles.

Head Coach Mack McConal said that he was very proud of the backs and the offensive line. "We have put 52 points up in the last two games, so we're real proud of them," the head mentor emphasized.

Coach Harold Schroeder said that he is very pleased

with the defense. He stressed, "They have allowed only six points in the last two games."

Cross Plains pleased a sparse crowd of home fans by taking the lead early in the game when Fullback Cody Odom rambled 20 yards around left end for the touchdown. Halfback Daryl Bates slammed off right tackle for the two-point conversion and 8-0 lead.

Rochelle countered with a touchdown in the second period, but the attempted two-point conversion was foiled by the Cross Plains defense. That allowed Mighty Mites to take an 8-6 advantage into the locker rooms at intermission.

Toward the end of the third

quarter Cross Plains added an insurance TD. The counter was a 10-yard pass from Odom to Wide Receiver Chad Bagley. Odom then sliced off tackle for the two bonus points and a more comfortable 16-6 lead.

Mite Tight End Jason Melson made a good catch of a Quarterback Derron Duffey pass and ran 30 yards for what appeared to be a touchdown. The effort was for nothing, as it was called back on a clipping penalty.

A few minutes later Odom circled right end for about 10 yards and the home team's third six-pointer of the night. Quarterback Duffey converted the two-point bonus on a keeper for the final 24-6 tally.

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Farmers Asked To Pick ASCS Committee Slate

"Farmers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by October 28 to be on the ASC Community committee ballot," says Scott Odom, County Executive Director.

The ASC community committee election will be conducted from November 22 to December 2 by mail ballot. There are three ASC Communities in Callahan County.

ASC Committees are responsible for managing federal farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC Committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals, Odom said. Callahan County farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve the farm community. Farmers have received petition forms by mail and are now submitting them to the county ASCS office.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulation petition, Odom said. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by at least three eligible farm voters in the ASC Community, and must be received in the county ASCS office by the October 28 deadline.

Farmers may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the ASC committee election may contact the county ASCS of-

fice for full details, including eligibility requirements for office holders.

Farmers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as a member of the ASC Committee. The election of concerned farmers to positions on ASC Committees is essential in the administration of farm programs," Odom said.

Odom further explained that the county ASCS office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guaranteed to all farmers regardless of race, religion, sex, age, color, handicap, or national origin.
