

Commissioners were scheduled to open bids at 10:00 a.m. on the Painting Contract for the Courthouse windows, but Judge Johnson announced that no bids had been received for the project. After some discussion the Commissioners decided to readvertise for bids. Legislature Raises **Cross Plains Teachers'** Pay By 25 Percent

As a result of late hour negotiations between key legislators in the House and Senate Joint Conference Committee on House Bill 4 and HJR 4 and members of the Texas State Teachers Association, teachers in Cross Plains ISD will be getting pay increases next year ranging from \$1,000 to possibly as much as

The pay raise proposals were included in a tax relief package that would provide a \$10,000 increase in homestead exemptions for local school property taxes should voters support the exemptions in a special election August 9. This would allow voters a \$15,000 school tax homestead exemption as opposed to the current \$5,000.

The total pay package for teachers raises the state minimum salary schedule by 6.5 percent over the biennium and would increase salaries up to \$1,460 the second year, including the step credited for experi-

TSTA President Richard Kouri said the struggle to get due recognition for teachers this year was made more uncertain by the original proposal to completely overhaul the tax system and public education funding.

"The two original tax proposals before the House and Senate actually froze teachers' salaries for the next two years," Kouri said. "That was totally unacceptable given the fact that two years ago Senate Bill 1 promised teachers automatic pay increases when additional state funds were available for education." Under the current bill, 76,000 Texas teachers will automatically receive pay increases over the next two years. Teachers who are in districts that pay above the minimum salary schedule will be asking local school boards to place some of the \$1.8 billion in new education money into salaries to stay competitive in teacher recruitment and retention.

Kouri had high praise for legislators who pushed hard to find the money for teachers, including Rep. Paul Sadler of Henderson, Rep. Mark Stiles of Beaumont, House Speaker Pete Laney of Hale Center, Rep. Scott Hochberg of Houston, Rep. Rob Junell of San Angelo, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Sen. Ken Armbrister of Victoria, Sen. Teel Bivins of Amarillo, and Sen. Bill Ratliff of Mt. Pleasant.

Rep. Mark Stiles, a member of the Conference Committee, thanked TSTA for its perseverance in lobbying throughout the session. "I'm proud to have worked with TSTA's team these past four years to raise teacher pay in Texas by 25 percent," Stiles said, "but we are still below the national average."

Texas ranks 36th in national rankings in teacher pay.

In addition to salary increases, TSTA was instructing teacher retirement benefits, making it possible for full retirement when age and service numerically total 80.

Kouri concluded that in addition to the two improvements in teacher benefits, his organization's greatest successes may have been in defeatng bad logislation, including tax funds for private schools, that would have harmed public schools and thwarted educational reform measures that were put into place in Senate Bill 1 during the last session.

Born in Peaster, Texas in 1906, Robert moved with his parents to Cross Plains around 1919. The Howard House here served as both his home and office until his death on June 11, 1936. Most of his writings were done here. Original manuscripts, first editions and original "Weird Tales" will be displayed during Open House. Copies of documents and Howard memorabilia will be for sale.

Callahan Co. Jail **Passes** Inspection

BAIRD -- Callahan County Sheriff Eddie Curtis announced that the Callahan County Jail has again passed state inspection and has been certified for another year.

The Texas Commission on Jail Standards inspected the facility on April 22, 1997, and gave the old jail a clean bill of health and in compliance with the minimum jail standards according to all regulatory codes applicable after the six hour inspection. The last inspection was May 6, 1996. The Callahan County Jail is listed as being built in 1885 and was in danger of being replaced a few years ago, but has gained new life and has passed all inspections since December of 1993. It is one of the oldest jails in the state

The name Burkett was given to the community when Mr. Will, who was the first postmaster, submitted his name after many others had been turned down.

Prior to joining the service in 1941, Henry worked for the mines in Arizona and Nevada. For 3 years he served with the Third Army Combat Engineers in France, England, and Germany. Severe wounds occurred at the Ziegfreid Line in Germany during the Battle of the Bulge - and he spent a year in Fitzsimmons Hospital in Denver. They predicted he would never walk, but with a determination that characterized his entire life he showed them.

Burkett attended the second class of a game warden school which had been instituted at Texas A&M by the Game, Fish, and Oyster Commission, a forerunner of Texas Parks and Wildlife. After completion of this school in 1947 he was stationed in Junction, Sonora, Alpine, and San Angelo. In 1958 he became a game warden Captain and in 1963 was named Regional Director of a 90 county West Texas area with headquarters in San Angelo.

When the regional system was abolished in 1972, he was transferred to Austin where he served as a special staff assistant to the Executive Director. In 1974 he was named Director of Law Enforcement until he became Executive Director in 1977 and held that position until he retired in 1979. At his retirement party in Austin, he was called a legend in his time, and was known for his toughness, fairness, and straightforwardness.

A member of Coggin Ave. Baptist Church in Brownwood, he is survived by his wife, Charlene Carter Burkett, whom he married on May 4. 1968, and four children; Glenn Burkett of Alamo, California, Bruce Burkett of San Angelo, Sara Biggio of Waco, Ed Burkett of Tyler, and three grandchildren, Jason, Carrie, and Cullen Burkett. 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



New State Budget Re volves Around Schools

AUSTIN-Lt. Governor Bob Bullock said Thursday the new \$86.2 billion state budget provides a "delicate balance" between the demand for frugal government, quality schools, a tough criminal justice system and services for the elderly and disabled.

"The budget reflects the Legislature's unrivaled commitment to education and the prevailing belief that spending on schools is an investment critical to Texas' future," Bullock said of the 1998-99 appropriations bill.

"Two of every three new dollars will receive an additional \$580 milfrom economic growth are targeted for public education and our institutions of higher learning. We are putting our money on the minds of our youth," Bullock said.

"State employees will benefit from their first pay raise in four years, and \$1 billion will be on hand for property tax relief, surplus savings or other state needs. For the first time the resources will be available to begin laying the foundation for a plan to preserve and protect our water resources well into the next cen-

Hammered out by a conference committee of House and Senate negotiators, the budget increases spending from all funds by \$5.5 billion, a 6.8 percent increase over current levels. Spending from general revenue will increase \$3.4 billion over two years, a 7.5 percent

Bullock said general revenue spending on public education will increase \$1.5 billion, or 7.9 percent. The state's colleges and universities lion, a 7.6 percent increase. Public education will receive a total of \$20.8 billion for the two-year period, while colleges and universities will have combined budgets of \$8.2 bil-

The budget strikes the delicate paiance between the most essential services and the taxpayers' opposition to excessive spending. The price tag is higher as a result of explosive growth in school enrollment, case loads and the needs of a booming population in general.

"The lion's share of new money will prepare our schools for an estimated 156,000 new students over two years," Bullock said. "Lawmakers have provided sufficient funding for construction and improvement of school facilities, safer schools, teacher retirement and the reading program supported by lawmakers and Governor George W. Bush.

"Our colleges and universities will have the funds necessary to gain momentum as they prepare for the next century. In the final analysis, we're investing \$2.1 billion into our leaders of tomorrow," the lieutenant governor said.

Bullock said criminal justice will receive an additional \$321.4 million, a 6.2 percent increase in general revenue spending. Almost two-unings will be used to operate 25,000 new state jail beds already open and an additional 2,500 to open in 1998-99. More than \$53 million will be spent on supervision of 10,800 new parolees and 4,600 additional offenders on probation, he said. The Texas Youth Commission will have funds for 2,144 new beds authorized two vears ago.

Bullock said health and human services spending from general revenue will be \$10.3 billion, or \$283.5 million above current levels, a 2.8 percent increase. Community care services will be available for an estimated 14,815 additional clients. The budget also provides funding for higher nursing home case loads and additional foster care, adoption, chiiù abuse and neglect and Medicaid services.

Spending on natural resources will go up \$53.9 million, or 15.5 percent, to \$401 million, the bulk targeted for the state water plan conceived in Senate Bill 1.

The budget earmarks \$275.2 million for the judiciary, a 1 percent increase of \$47.7 million, and \$335.7 million for business and economic development, an increase of \$22.3 million, or 7.1 percent, according to Bullock.

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
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

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Hutchison, Other Texas Delegation Members Urge Glickman to Restore CRP Acreage

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison and a bipartisan group of Texas lawmakers today called on Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman to continue to maintain the current Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acreage in

"The administration has done a jump shift on the Texas agriculture community," Senator Hutchison

In their letter to Secretary Glickman, the Texans said, "Congress and the administration made a commitment to address agriculturerelated environmental concerns when they reauthorized the CRP in the Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996.'

The department's announcement of a 16.1 million-acre enrollment is well short of congressional intent, falling more than 9 million acres under the 36.4 million-acre cap and the administration's own 19.1 millionacre budget. Texas has almost four

million acres of cropland enrolled in

"Curtailing participation in the program will cripple USDA's efforts to mitigate soil erosion, address water quality issues and improve wildlife habitat," Senator Hutchison said.

"Your decision ... will have a disproportionately negative impact on the quality of agriculture and the environment in Texas," the letter said. "We expect that the remaining acres of environmentally sensitive land originally intended to be enrolled in the CRP will be considered in the next CRP sign up. We look forward to your timely response so that our farmers can make informed management decisions."

Also signing the letter were Senator Phil Gramm and Texas Representatives Henry Bonilla, Larry Combest, Chet Edwards, Ralph Hall, Ruben Hinojosa, Max Sandlin, Pete Sessions, Lamar Smith and Mac Thornberry.

Callahan County **Mayors Met** June 2

A meeting of the mayors in Callahan County was held Monday, June 2, 1997 in Cross Plains. The primary purpose of the conference was to explore and discuss the means in which the cities might combine their equipment, manpower, and expertise to pave more streets and maintain existing pav-

The meeting was attended by Mayors Merv Warrick of Clyde, Jon Hardwick of Baird, and Ray Purvis of Cross Plains. Representing Mayor Fry of Putnam were councilmen Kenneth Fox and John Ray. The meeting was the idea of Mayor Warrick and received support from the other cities' mayors. Discussion was held on the possibilities of a cooperative effort to do paving at a cheaper cost through volume purchasing. The participants noted that it might be beneficial to expand future discussions to include the input of the County Commissioners.

It was decided to hold regular meetings of this nature, and to include all aspects of city functions in addition to streets. Each participant is to report back to their respective city councils as talks progress. The cities of Baird and Clyde already have an inter-local agreement in force whereby manpower, material, and equipment may be afforded each other on a reciprocal, or trade-out, basis.

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
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
