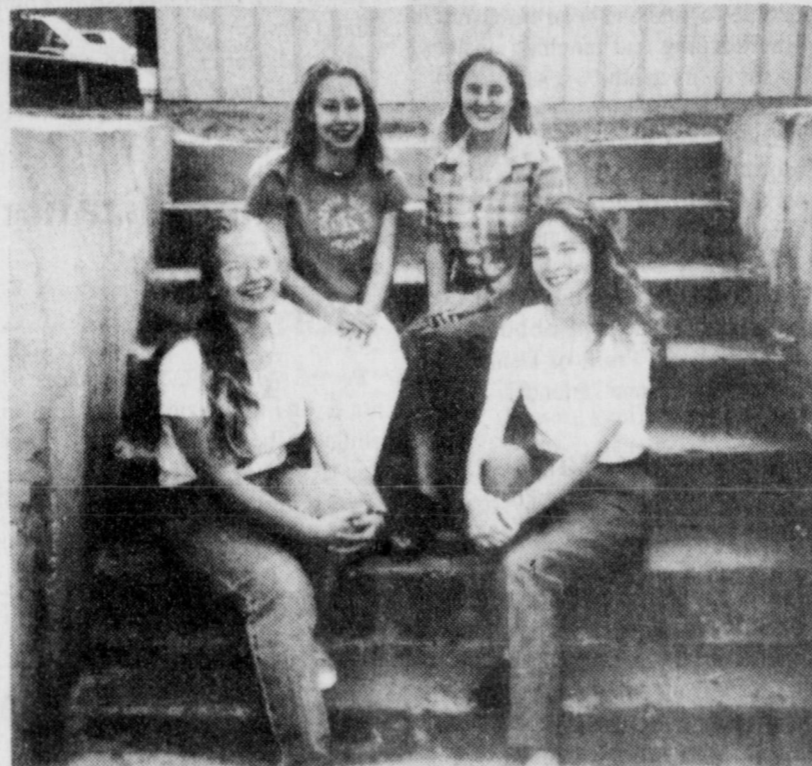

Dr. Lou Rodenberger Autographed Her New Book Friday

Dr. Lou Rodenberger of Cross Plains was the honoree of the book signing party Friday at the Cross Plains Public Library. Local residents came by to congratulate her on the publishing of Texas Women Writers and have their copy of the book autographed. Dr. Sylvia Grider who collaborated with Dr. Rodenberger was unable to attend the celebration.

The ladies began the project in 1988 at the request of the editor at Southern Methodist University who needed an anthology of essays of Texas writers. This is the first book of its kind -- the first to attempt a comprehensive history of that literary tradition in this state. The book gives recognition to some fine Texas women writers who were long overdue.

Rodenberger and Grider talked through the organization of the book and asked twenty scholars to prepare essays on major Texas writers. Dr. Rodenberger did the majority of the writing while Dr. Grider edited. SMU would not publish the book at first, having lost interest with a change of editors, and Texas A&M University

required more work before publishing. After revisions and polishing it was published by Texas A&M Press in a little over one year. It has established a new area of interest.

It is believed that the first woman writer in Texas was Mary Austin Holley, cousin of Stephen F. Austin. She is the author of Texas. At least 200 women from 1830 to 1995 are included in the critical biography of each major writer. It includes African American writers, Latino, poets, play writes, 19th century fiction and non-fiction, and 20th century writers of note.

The book was published in hopes that more women would begin researching women's past writings and to encourage new writers. Texas A&M Press will be publishing new editions of books by two fine forgotten Texas women writers covered in Texas Women Writers: "Joshua Beene and God" by Jewel Gibson (Random House, 1945), a satire set in East Texas, and "The Wire Cutters" by Mollie E. Moore Davis (1989), fiction about the controversy over the fencing of ranchlands. "The Wire Cutters" will be available in a few weeks.

Traveling to Gorman last Friday it looked to be an easy game, but turned out to be a big test for the Buffs. They took the opening kick-off and marched down the field to the end-zone for the score. Justin Hopkins scored from the 1 yard line consuming some 7 to 8 minutes of the clock. A ball control game, much like the

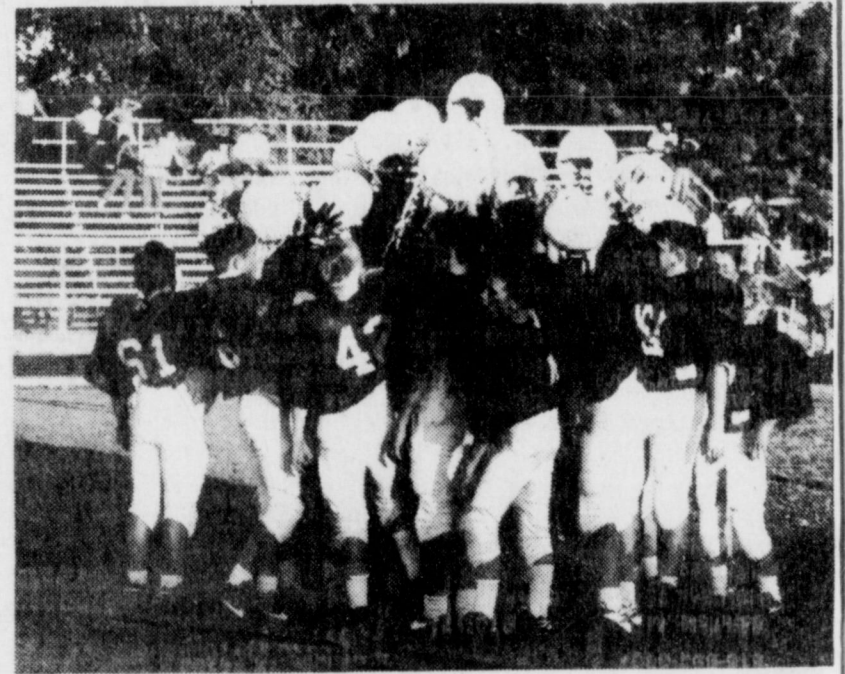

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Vanda,

You have asked for memories and stories concerning high school -- I owe my "checkered" school record to some of the female students in the 1950 Class. That's where I learned how much fun it was to play hookey. As I recall, it was my first week in school, March 1947. We had moved from West Texas for the last time my freshman year (during the war, we moved back and forth between Cottonwood and Grandfall-Royalty.)

It was Friday, and the boys had baseball game and I guess every boy in high school played baseball, because it seems only girls were being sent upstairs for a good old spelling bee. I didn't really mind because that was something in which I excelled, so I could have made "my mark" that first week. However, halfway up the stairway, I noticed a bunch of girls bending down and going downstairs rather than up. I followed them wondering what was going on. We headed for the girl's bathroom and crawled out the window. Someone, probably Juakana (Graves?? names elude me) said, "No way am I going to a silly spelling bee while the boys are all having fun."

I think there were about six of us, possibly more. I think Mr. Lackey caught us in the post office and told us to get back to school. It was the most daring thing I guess I ever did in high school. I missed the spelling bee and thus missed my chance to obtain a school record of any kind. I finished my freshman year and began my sophomore year before we moved to Brownwood. The Class of '50 doesn't remember me too well, but I claim them anyway.

I also claim the Class of 1952, because after I married, I tried going back to school to finish. I was only able to attend 6 weeks because of personal reasons, and I was slated to be invited to their 40th class reunion.

Evidently I missed being in school, because I did manage to get my degree to teach -- high school, then generic special ed, and then elementary school. I retired in 1992, and began training to teach alphabetic phonics in 1993. After being certified in 2 years, I began a 3 year program to become a qualified instructor in AP. I teach my first seminar on September 26 and 27 under the watchful eye of

Mrs. Aylett Cox, who wrote the program. Our foundation, the James Phillips Williams Memorial Foundation, is very pleased to have certified two master instructors in Abilene who began teaching AP through Hardin Simmons this past summer.

I was so pleased to read the article concerning Georgie Wagner's accomplishments. She has really been active and I'm pleased to see that she has been recognized. She and I have something in common, as we both worked at the Conley Cafe at the same time. She worked the morning shift and I the evening, back in 1947 or 48.

That's all I wanted to share about CPHS, but I don't want to explain the picture I'm sending. I attended Cottonwood School intermittently and I've only made one homecoming, but plan to be there this year -- God willing. In March of this year, I was in Cottonwood for the combined celebration of Aunt Effie Pearl Jones' birthday and Jack and Uva Jones' anniversary.

I decided to see if I could find traces of the old "outhouse." It was farther from the school than I remembered, but you can tell it had been a state of the art restroom with concrete three holers. There was a tree that marked a line past which the boys could not go. I remember because we would taunt the boys, then run past the tree and make faces. Such simple things make fond memories.

Joe Coppinger is younger than I, being in my sister Twila's class, so he probably does not remember our sharing a birthday one April. His aunt, Mrs. Lois Hazlewood Coppinger, was my teacher and she asked Mom to bake a cake. Since he and I were never in the same room, the party must have been for first through 5th grades. I think we took the whole afternoon off for the party.

Although I only lived in Cross Plains 13 year, I have always considered it home. I love all of you and enjoy reading about your activities in the *Cross Plains Review*. I plan to wear a name tag everywhere this year so you will know me! Come up and give me a hug!

Buffaloes Notch First Win In 12-0 Upset of Eastland

The following appeared in the *Brownwood Bulletin* Wednesday, October 3, 1962.

Ball Control

After swapping punts following the opening kickoff, Cross Plains began relentless, time-consuming ball control which resulted in both Buffalo TDs. Eastland fumbled on its only play from scrimmage between the two Bison scoring drives.

Pin-point blocking led Buff backs on an 85-yard drive for the first score in 16 plays while the gaping holes in the Eastland defensive line and good interference enabled Bison backs to chew up large chunks of yardage in the march.

Largest single gainer was a 16-yard sweep of right end by Fullback Jim Hargrove. Key play of the march, however, was a 12-yard pass from Hargrove to flanker Charles Barr for a first on the Maverick 12 on a fourth and eight situation.

Quarterback Darrel Wyatt got three yards, a muscle-straining, stretch catch of a pass by right end

Leelan Nunn as he hit the ground in the end zone was ruled incomplete, then Hargrove circled right end from nine yards out for the touchdown shrugging off two defenders enroute. The score came with 1:20 left in the first quarter, and a pass fell incomplete on the two point conversion try. But nevertheless Cross Plains was ahead in a football game for the first time this season, 6-0.

Defense Alert

Although the Buff offensive machine performed brilliantly, the defensive unit was no less spectacular.

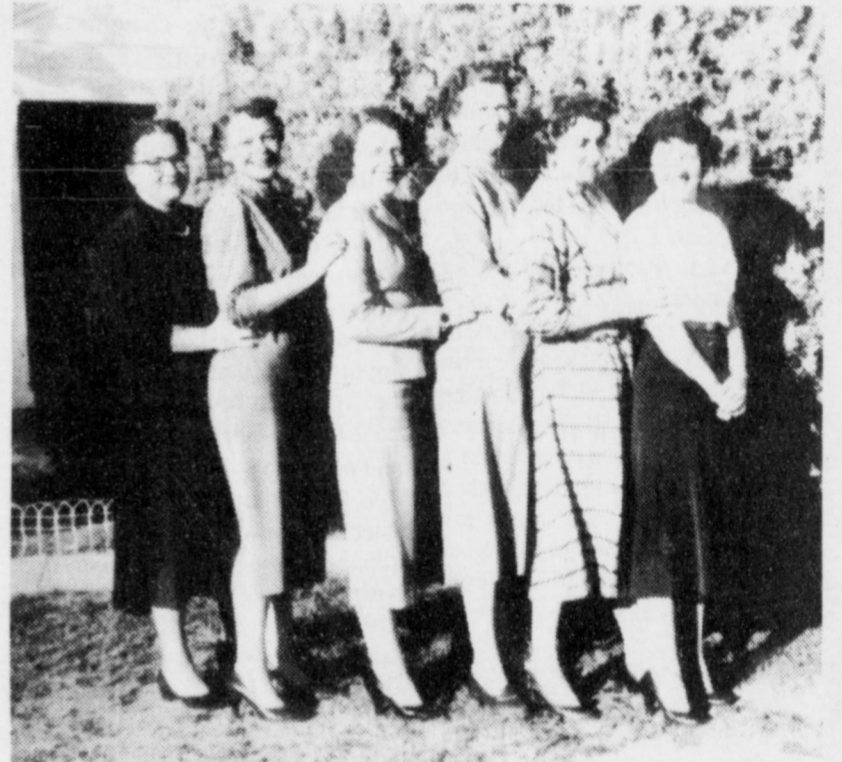
