Callahan County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, March 10, to determine contested races for County Judge, County Clerk and 42nd District Clerk in the Democratic Primary Election. The Republican Party Primary election will also be taking place at the same voting locations in the county Tuesday.

In the Democratic Party Primary Election, three men face off for the county Judge position from retiring Judge Bill Johnson. Seeking the

post are Clyde men Winford H. (Coach) Hogan, and Ben Holloway and Baird resident Roger Corn. If no one captures 50 percent of the vote for County Judge, a run-off election will be called.

For 42nd District Clerk, Sharon Owens and Georgie Manion are seeking the office currently held by Cubelle Harris, who is retiring from the post.

County Treasurer candidate Dianne Alexander is the only Democratic Party Primary candidate seeking the office from Dora Hounshell. Hounshell is not seeking re-election due to health reasons.

The Democratic Primary winner for County Judge, County Clerk and 42nd District Clerk is guaranteed the winner in the November General Election because of no Republican positions for Precinct #1 include candidates Mark J. Baidas, Silas Tucker and Ricky Wilkins.

Democratic Precinct chairman candidates for Precinct #2 include Motel Lee Adams, Reo Jolly and Bud Logan.

Democratic Party Primary voters are reminded of three propositions on the back side of the primary ballot. Voters are asked to vote either Yes or No on the three propositions.

Proposition #1 states: do you support a change in law requiring health maintenance organizations (HMO) to offer Texans an option to choose their own doctors?

Propostition #2 says: Do you support a constitutional amendment prohibiting sales taxes on food and medicine?

Proposition #3 reads: Do you support a plan to better recruit and retain qualified teachers in Texas classrooms and to make computers accessible for education to all students in Texas public schools?

On the Republican Party Primary Election ballot, current Republican Party county Chairman David Holmes is being challenged by Lisa Compton.

A number of other statewide offices are being contested on both the Democratic and Republican Party Primary Election ballots. Voters arc not allowed to vote in both party primary elections.

Early voting for both the Democratic and Republican Party Primary Elections is continuing until Friday, March 6, at the Justice of the Peace offices in Clyde and Cross Plains and the Treasurer's office at the courthouse in Baird. Polls for both party primary elections will be open Tuesday, March 10, from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

Harry E. Legendre


Harry E. Legendre, 87, of Abilene, passed away Friday, February 27, 1998, at a local hospital.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Monday at Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home Chapel of Memories, 542 Hickory, with Deacon Jerry Schwalb officiating. Burial was in Elmwood Memorial Park.

Mr. Legendre was born August 10, 1910, near New Orleans, Louisiana. He graduated from Louisiana State University with a degree in Petroleum Engineering. He lived in West Texas and worked as a self-employed petroleum engineer until moving to Cross Plains in 1972. He moved to Abilene in 1991 and was an independent oil operator until his death.

He married Vada Lee Quillen on February 23, 1947, in Roswell, New Mexico. He was a Catholic and his interests included his work, friends and fishing. He held a Lifetime Membership in the Society of Petroleum Engineers and was a member of the American Institute of Mechanical Engineers (A.I.M.E.) In addition to his wife, Vada, of Abilene, survivors include a son, John W. Legendre of Midland; two daughters, Suzanne Conaway of Midland and Mar'Sue Wilson of Shreveport, Louisiana; two sisters, Gladys Martin of Oakdale, Louisiana and Lillian Foret of Thibodaux, Louisiana; ten grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

Stenholm brings tax help to Abilene

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Congressman Charlie Stenholm announced that in response to several requests from his office, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has agreed to send advisors to Abilene to provide free help to area resident seeking help and advice in completing their federal tax forms. The IRS Advice Days are set for Thursday, March 5 from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and Saturday, March 7 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The location for both days will be the Abilene Post Office located downtown at 341 Pine Street.

"I'm not sure I'll receive very many thanks from taxpayers for bringing the IRS to town," Stenholm joked. "But in all seriousness, these free IRS Advice Days are a great service to local citizens and I'm grateful to o the Dallas District office for committing , these resources to us."

IRS Acting District Director Ellen Murphy encouraged residents to bring with them all income information, including W-2 and 1099 forms, social security cards or Individual Taxpayer Identification Numbers for all dependents and any other relevant documents and forms. "Don't forget that those useful items could include receipts, medical bills or statements, past federal state and local tax statements, home mortgage interest reports, contributions and miscellaneous expenses and a copy of last year's tax return," Murphy commented.

IRS representatives will meet with citizens one-on-one throughout the two day sessions. Individuals are encouraged to schedule an appointment by calling (915) 676-5711. Walk-ins will receive service as well. Elaine Talley, assistant to Congressman Stenholm in his Abilene office, also reminded taxpayers that the Congressman's office can serve as a liason between constituents and the IRS in difficult, long-term problems. "We're here for people year-round but this is a special opportunity to have questions and problems addressed by IRS representatives faceto-face, so I encourage everyone to take advantage of the opportunity," Talley noted.

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Attention Young Men: Uncle Sam **Needs You!**

If you are a young man between the ages of 18 and 25, it's time to think about your Uncle Sam, and the best way to stay on his good side is to register with Selective Service. Although most men register when they are 18, as required by law, some fail to do so until they are older. In some cases, they wait too long.


If you are now 25, you have only the months remaining until your 26th birthday to register. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service State Director Harold D. Doyle cautioned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain benefits, such as federal studentaid, job training and most federal employment, in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon.

Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment and permission to practice law.

Doyle points out that men age 18 through 25 who have not yet registered can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering promptly at any local post office, Army National Guard Recruiting Offices or on the Internet (http:// www.sss.gov). Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison, or both.

Over 13 million men age 18 through 25 are currently registered with Selective Service. Of those, 920,915 are from Texas.



Cattlemen, **Consumers & Oprah Win in** Amarillo Lawsuit

AUSTIN -- "While we are disappointed the jury felt that the facts in the cattlemen's lawsuit against Oprah Winfrey did not warrant a ruling for the plaintiffs, the overriding good news for the American consumer of which all the scientific experts agree -- is that the U.S. enjoys the safest beef in the world," John Brown, President of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas said.

"This trail was not about Oprah and her feelings about beef. It was about false and misleading statements presented on her show," Brown noted. "The real issue in this case -- responsible speech -- could not be addressed by the jury. The jury never considered whether harmful, false statements about the beef industry were made."

ICA members strongly support the freedom of speech. But our members also believe that the exercise of free speech carries with it a responsibility for accuracy and fairness. We welcome opportunities for full and open debate on all important issues, including food safety.

"The cattlemen's 'beef was not against Oprah, but against those individuals who choose to willfully ignore the facts and attempt to spread misinformation that could be devastating on the market for perishable agricultural products," Brown stated.

Although the cattlemen lost this Installt, TCA hopen that ultimately the national discussion on responsible speech will result in more balanced and accurate reporting by the media -- and talk show hosts -- resulting in a win for cattlemen and a win for all Americans.



MAMA IN HER BONNET C. 1967, FOR "OLD FASHION DAY AT WORK"

"Those Straw Hats"

Just sitting here daydreaming-thinking back on the past.

Remember back in the 1940's, (or when your grandmother used to tell you stories about when 'SHE was a girl'?" Those were the times when no one had air conditioners! Not many that I can recall had electric fans either. Everyone would sit in church and fan with paper and pasteboard fans. Plastic had not been invented yet at that time. If you hadn't been given a cardboard fan as a promotional or couldn't afford to purchase a fan; you just improvised. Just used a piece of paper folded double or took a square piece of paper and folded it into pleats. Both types made great fans. Some churches and other public buildings had a ceiling fan, but I never thought they ran quite fast enough, at that point in time. Probably electricity didn't have as high a voltage at that time or some such explanation. Anyway they just seemed to go at only an extremely slow pace, they just sort of stirred the air faintly and BUZZED loudly.

In the middle of the summer when it was really hot, if Mama went outside she wore a bonnet. Mama had red hair and sun sensitive skin. If she didn't wear either a bonnet, or a hat and smock or use an umbrella for shade she got freckles. The big red kind. Mama much preferred bonnets to hats. She made her own bonnets mostly the flat style. Sometimes she worked in stores and I can see her now walking to work under that big umbrella, in the blazing sun.

freckles too, so she bought us straw hats. You know; the kind those country bumpkins always wear in Hollywood movies and on Hee Haw on television.

Yeah! In Cross Plains or in Baird when we went to town we'd have to wear one of those straw hats. We got new ones every summer. At first when we were real young (between 3 and 9 years); we were proud of our hats. But by the time we hit 10 and 12, we hated, yes and despised those straw hats. But Mama was so afraid we'd get freckles that she insisted we wear them. In those days, the vogue was to have white creamy complexions. Well, Mama really tried to keep us in vogue. I'm sure she probably worked extra hours so she could afford to purchase us those straw store bought hats, so we wouldn't have to wear homemade bonnets. But you know, we didn't see it in quite that way. It seemed to us at the time that Mama probably was supporting the entire straw hat industry, single handedly.

Alas and alack, as it turned out though; all Mamas' efforts had been in vain (no pun intended)! You see we both had inherited our fathers coloring. Daddy was of French and dark Irish extraction, consequently even without hats, we didn't get freckles.

When my two sons were real small (before we had any daughters), Mama even made them each a little slat bonnet. Both the boys were blue-eyed blondes. You know they just loved those little slat bonnets. The boys were aged about 1 and 3 at





In her book, Here to Stay, Mary Jo Bane admits that the American family is beset from all sides -- rising divorce rates, more abortions and fewer children, more women leaving the home to work, declining parental authority and the anchorless sexual mores of our times, just to name a few. Yet in spite of all these strikes against marriage and the family, she says "the family may be a stronger and more resilient force than we think." "Rather than threatening the family, many of the recent changes in family life have been positive, or can be positive," she argues. For instance, "can't parents with fewer children do better by them? Can't marriages that endure voluntarily and not because divorce is socially unacceptable or economically infeasible be more satisfying?"

She makes some good points and I certainly like her positive optimism -- that which the title of her book even suggests -- "Here to Stay!" The family is here to stay. But I believe we better do all we can to help it stay, by giving it the nurture provided by principles in "the family Manual," the Manual on marriage and how to make it work, on the family and how to make it successful -- how to make it "here to stay." I'm talking about the Bible, of course. Have you consulted it lately? Its instructions is the Breakthru marriages and families really need!

For instance: "Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord... Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church and gave Himself for it ... Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right ... 


What were her two daughters doing during all those years of summers? Mama was afraid we'd get



TCADA issues heroin warning to Texas families

Law enforcement officials, emergency rooms and substance abuse treatment centers report a disturbing increase in use of heroin in Texas over the past four years, according to the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

Heroin use can be fatal. In the Dallas-Fort Worth area, 12 young people have died of heroin overdoses in the past 12 months, most of them under the age of 20 and most of them in the affluent community of Plano, north of Dallas. The youngest victim was 13-years-old.

"Heroin is readily available in Texas and it is extremely addictive," said Dr. Jane Maxwell, who heads TCADA's research branch. Maxwell said the higher purity of heroin being sold on the streets today adds to the dangers of overdosing and. fatalities.


Other areas of the state have not reported the high level of heroin overdose deaths seen among teenagers in Plano. But with heroin availability and use increasing statewide, TCADA officials said they fear North Texas trends could spread elsewhere. TCADA officials said parents and teenagers need to know that:

Heroin purity is deliberately being increased and prices cut worldwide by international drug dealers trying to win new customers. Trends monitored in Australia, Europe, and nations formerly part of the Soviet Union are being seen in Texas today.

Dealers are deliberately targeting young people in suburban neighborhoods.

* New, young customers are ignorant of the highly addictive nature of heroin, believing incorrectly that users who snort of sniff the drug instead of using needles will not become addicted.

Maxwell, who serves on the Community Epidemiology Work Group for the National Institute on Drug Abuse, said: "The drug is no longer just being sold to the traditional heroin addicts. It is now being targeted to younger and younger users."

Only three overdose deaths were reported in Collin County (north of Dallas) in 1996," Maxwell said. "But during the first nine months of this year, a total of 16 overdose deaths involving heroin or morphine use by teenagers and adults were reported in Collin County."

Texas traditionally has been the market for Mexican Brown and Black Tar heroin, sold to middleaged addicts in urban centers. Purer, stronger forms of heroin from Columbia and Asia are sold on the East and West Coasts.

"It now appears that purity of Mexican heroin is being improved to compete with the quality of South American and Asian heroin," Maxwell said. "Street-level heroin is much stronger than it has ever been. This is frightening."

Heroin ranks third after alcohol and crack cocaine as the problem most frequently cited by adult clients admitted to substance abuse treatment programs funded by TCADA. The percentage of heroin clients is increasing significantly. In 1997, 12 percent of TCADA clients sought treatment for heroin, up from 9 percent four years ago.




