

Lunch will be served at the Lions Club in Eula. Resource people will include Dr. Travis Miller, Dr. Billy Warrick and Billy Henderson. The tour will give a total of 3 CEUs.






The community received so much needed rain. It does brighten the landscape as well as our spirits.
