Farmers and Ranchers May be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Conservation Program

The ongoing drought has caused severe damage in all areas of Callahan County. Farms and ranches suffering severe damage may be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) administered by the local County FSA office if the damage:

- *will be so costly to rehabilitate that Federal assistance is or will be needed to return the land to productive use.
- *is unusual and is not the type that would recur frequently in the same area.
- *affect the productive capacity of the farmland.
- *will impair or endanger the land.

A producer qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost-share levels not to exceed 64 percent of the eligible cost of restoration measures. No producer is eligible for more than \$200,000 cost sharing per natural disaster occurrence. The following types of measures may be eligible:

- *installing pipelines or other facilities for livestock water or existing irrigation systems for orchards and vineyards
- *constructing and deepening wells for livestock water.
- *developing springs or seeps for livestock.
- *restoring conservation structures and other similar installations (tank clean out).

Producers who have suffered a loss from a natural disaster may contact the local County FSA Office and request assistance from the date beginning September 24, 1998, through October 26, 1998.

To be eligible for assistance practices must not be started until:

- *an application for cost-share assistance has been filed.
- *the local county FSA Committee or its representative has conducted an onsite inspection of the damaged area.
- *the agency responsible for technical assistance, such as the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) has made a needs determination, which may include cubic yards of earthmoving, feet of pipeline, etc., required for rehabilitation.

*FSA Committee has issued approval.

Sign-up has started, so come into the County FSA Office as soon as possible, but before October 28.

Early morning accident turns deadly for Abilene teen

An Abilene teenager died when the BMW he was traveling in rolled over in an early Saturday morning accident 10 miles west of Cross Plains on Hwy. 36.

David Scott Reynolds, 16, was a passenger in a 1983 BMW that rolled after the driver lost control of the vehicle. The driver drifted off to the right edge of the roadway then over corrected to the left causing the vehicle to over turn. The vehicle also caught fire. Reynolds was ejected during the rollover. He was pronounced dead at Hendrick Medical Center. He was not wearing a seatbelt.

Joseph David Grimes, 17, also of Abilene, was driver of the car. He was treated and released from Hendrick Medical Center. He was wearing his seatbelt.

Highway Patrol Trooper Jim Cook of Cross Plains investigated the accident.

Reynolds' body was taken to Tarrant County for an autopsy, said sources from Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home.

City of Cross Plains Hires New Police Chief In Special Meeting

The Cross Plains City Council hired a new police chief at a special meeting Monday, September 28.

Recently retired Department of Public Safety Trooper Don Gosnell was hired from a field of 8 applicants to take over the local law enforcement one man force.

Gosnell will start his new duties on October 1, and has 31 years as a DPS Trooper, with 28 of those years being in Cross Plains.

City Secretary Debbie Gosnell, the new policeman's wife, said she could see no problems with working with her husband. "He'll be working mostly at night and I'm used to him being gone from home a bunch," Debbie said.

The city has been without a lawman since the resignation of Tim Sanders

on August 21. The absence of a city policeman prompted one letter to the *Abilene Reporter-News* complaining about the situation.

Sanders resigned after complaints to the city council, by some local parents that he had asked their children to make drug buys for him. The teenagers refused the officers request and no "sting operations" were ever initiated and no action was ever taken against Sanders by the Cross Plains City Council.

The city's newly purchased drug dog, bought with donations garnered by Sanders, has been sold and the City of Cross Plains will re-imburse all the donated money to the contributors. This item was not discussed at the meeting but had raised some concern since it was announced that the dog would be sold earlier this month.

Callahan County Commissioners Adopt Increased Tax Rate

Callahan County Commissioners adopted a tax rate and received a payment for Precinct #1 County Road 120 repaired during a regular commissioners' court meeting Monday, September 28 at the County Courthouse in Baird.

The county adopted an increased tax rate for 1998. The approved rate of \$0.357 is an increase over last year's rate of \$0.344 per hundred dollar valuation.

This is the county's first tax increase in about four years, according to the county appraisal office.

A \$1,691,535 budget was approved at the September 14 meeting for fiscal year 1998-99. The budget was an increase of about \$160,000 over last year's budget.

Harold Hicks, Callahan County Commissioner of Precinct #1, accepted checks totaling \$19,000 for repairs to County Road 120 between FM 604 and Union Hill Road.

There had been a dispute between Hicks and the parties involved in the water line that was installed in the edge of County Road 120. The water line is part of the Abilene to Baird water supply line.

The checks came from Aledo Construction, who contracted with the City of Baird to lay the line, and the Callahan County Water Supply Corporation, who had hired a contractor to install meter taps along County Road 120. Aledo paid \$14,457 and the County Water Supply chipped in \$4,543.

Hicks agreed to the payment and the money is to be used specifically for repairs on County Road 120. The contributing parties are to receive a letter of release from Precinct #1.

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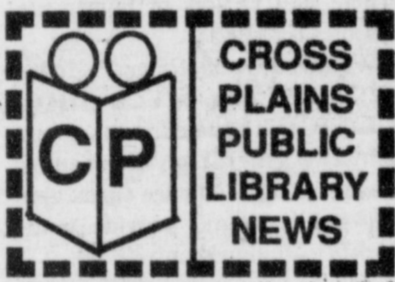

In a match race between a couple of top-touted horses, Ruffian was out in front of Foolish Pleasure by half a length when it happened. A sickening snap was evidence of a shattered bone -- the right ankle of Ruffian, a three year old filly -- and the race was over. Surgery was performed by one of New York's finest vets, the filly's leg was put in a cast, and the next day the cast was removed -- and the day after that, Ruffian ran the race again and won! Right? Wrong!! Within 18 hours after surgery, Ruffian was dead. Why? A team of veterinarians gave their best to save her. Why did she die? Well, there are some things man can't do. Even the vet had said, after doing all he could, "All we can do now is wait."

It's true with just about everything we put our hand to. We do everything we can, then sit back and wait for time and God to put the finishing touch on it. "Fennel"
One of my favorite herbs is fennel. Fennel is a very useful herb. Every part of the plant is edible. The leaves, the branches or stalks, the seed and yes, even the bulb are all edible and/or useful in cooking as well as usable for plate decorations and medicinally.

Following is a remarkably delicious recipe using fennel for brunch, which serves 6.

"Savory Sausage Souffle"
3 slices white bread - cubed, 3 slices wheat bread - cubed, 1 pound sausage, sauteed with 1 teaspoon fennel (or anise), drained. 1 1/2 cups cheddar cheese, shredded or grated. 6 eggs - 2 2/3 cups milk
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1/4 teaspoon oregano
1/4 teaspoon basil
1/4 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper
Grease 6 small ramekins or muffin cups. Fill each dish 1/2 full with cubed bread.

Divide sausage evenly between the ramekin dishes or muffin cups. Cover with cheese and remaining bread crumbs. Lightly beat eggs, add milk to beaten eggs. Then add remaining ingredients to egg mixture. Mix well and pour in dishes, filling almost to the top. Cover and refrigerate overnight.

Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Chilled fresh melon cubes, pineapple chunks and white grapes make a delicious accompaniment for this dish. Followed with ginger snaps and your favorite flavored coffee or fruit juice.

individuals and \$5 for couples. A free Band Booster bumper sticker will be included in your membership. Bumper stickers will also be available to the general public for \$2.00.

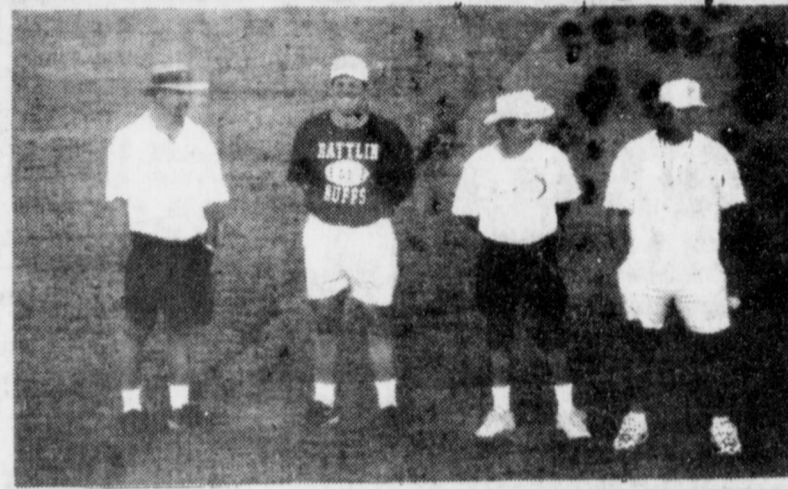

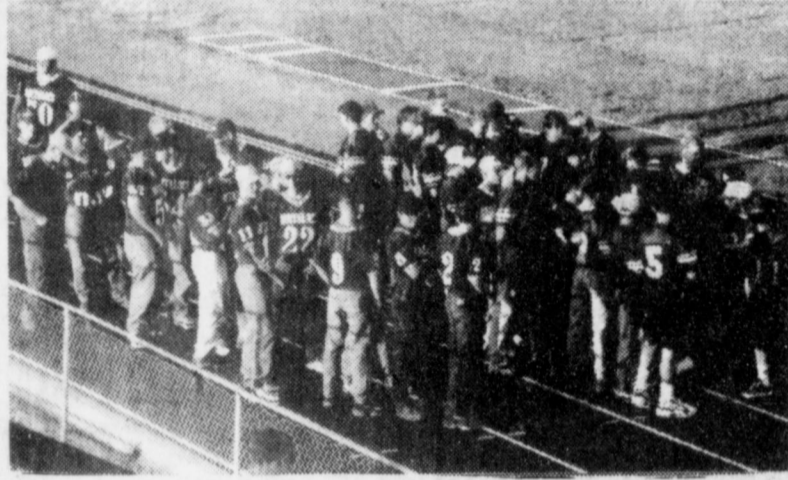

It was along road trip up to Rotan last Friday night, as well as a long night for the Cross Plains Buffaloes.

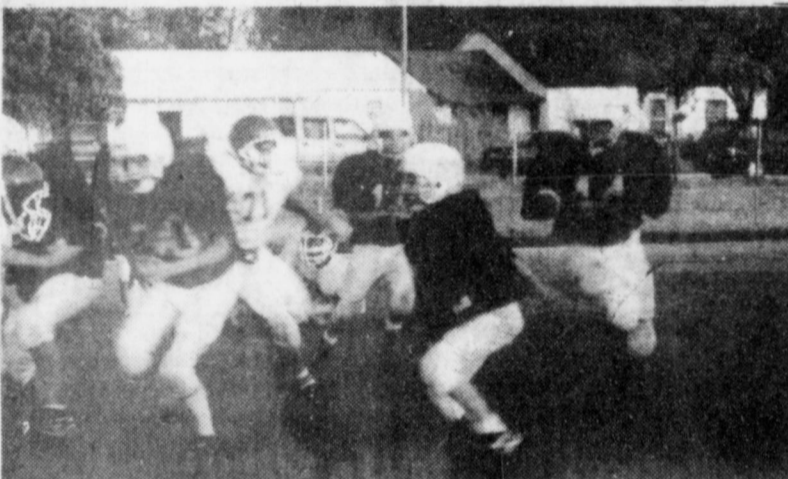

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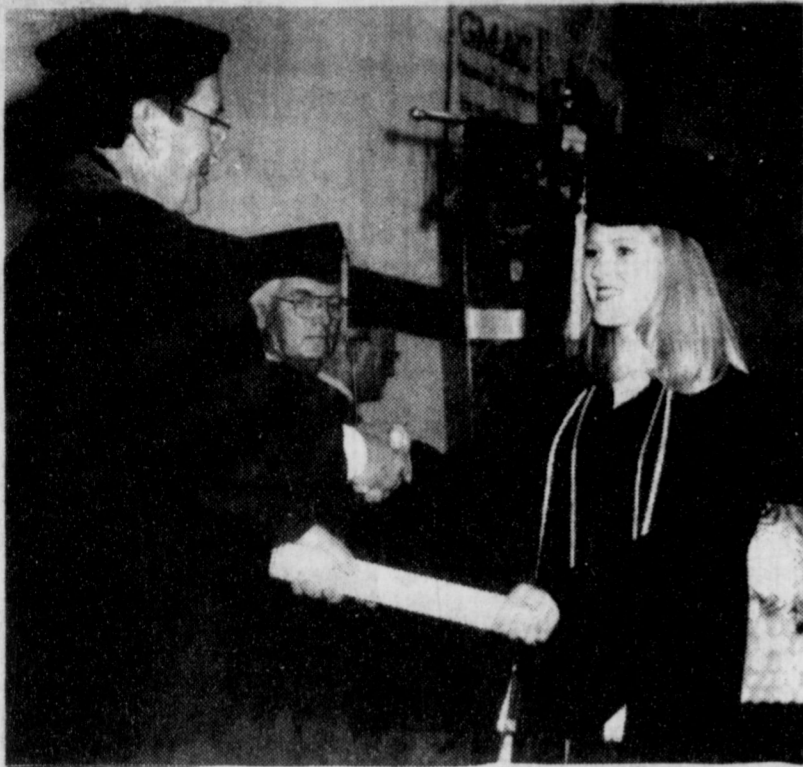

Equipped with Tomahawk cruise missiles, Harpoons anti-ship missiles and Sea Sparrow Missiles, USS Deyo is capable of hitting enemy targets hundreds of miles away. In addition, Keys ship carries two helicopters with sonar and torpedo capabilities, expanding the ship's reach.
