3:30 p.m. in Wayland Cemetery officiated by Rev. George Fain, pastor of Corner Stone Pentecostal Church of God in Iowa Park.


Mrs. Earney was born June 18, 1944 in Knox City. She was a dietician for New Horizons Ranch in Goldthwaite and was a Baptist.






Holiday Candles? Use those quart and half gallon square milk cartons for a mold. Cut off tops. Buy wax from the craft store. Melt in a double boiler, for color, more recycling, take those broken crayons and shave into the wax. Pour into milk containers after first anchoring the wick with heavy object, tie top of wick around popsicle stick and lay over top of carton. Allow to harden about 2 days. Then just peel away the carton. Voila, a bright orange candle for Halloween or Thanksgiving. Red, green, blue, white, silver or gold etc. for Christmas.

Perhaps you might make your candle any color, even colorless.

After peeling the milk container form the candle, warm some more wax, beat until fluffy and frothy like meringue and frost the candle rapidly, then sift with glitter, gold, silver, red, any holiday color. Allow to harden. A lovely centerpiece or mantel decoration. Let's see. What else can we re-



### Callahan Divide SWCD Now Taking Orders For Windbreak Trees

"The Callahan Divide Soil and Water Conservation has started taking orders for windbreak trees," says Jack Farmer, Chairman for the Callahan Divide SWCD in Baird. "Each year the District offers these windbreak seedlings to the general public on a first come, first serve basis at a very inexpensive cost."

Evergreens which are available include the Afghanistan pine, Pinyon pine, Austrian pine, Ponderosa pine and the Eastern red cedar. In addition to the evergreens, several varieties of bare-rooted hardwoods are also available.

These hardwoods include Green ash, Mulberry, Hackberry, Russian olive, Red oak, Sand cherry, Catalpa, Lacebark clm, Walnut, Nanking cherry, and Honeysuckle. Tree orders will be taken from now until February or till the supply runs out which ever comes first. The expected date of delivery will be on or near February 18, 1999. All orders are prepaid and delivery is guaranteed. These trees are delivered fresh from the Texas Forest Service nursery located at Lubbock. The pickup location for the trees will be at the Natural Resources Conservation Service office in Baird.
