The Cottonwood Historical Association has planned two work days, April 17th at 9:00 a.m. to clean the Methodist Building and April 24th for a general clean-up in preparation for the annual meeting. The following is an article from the Cottonwood Prodical in 1988 which Albert Lovell felt would be of interest:

Cottonwood is situated in Callahan County, one of the finest agricultural belts in the state. Cotton in this section is almost indigenous growth. Oats and all kinds of fruit grow extraordinarily well in this section of the county. It is situated at such an altitude that sickness caused by malaria is almost unknown.

The soil is Black Jack and Post Oak and the fertility is regarded as equal to, if not superior to, any in the county. Water is of the purest quality and is readily found in abundance anywhere from twelve to twentyfive feet.

There is two commodious churches in Cottonwood belonging to the Methodist and Baptist denominations. The Church of Christ and Presbyterian denominations have many members here also, however as yet, they have not built permanent structures.

There are public free schools with efficient teachers and one Polytechnic Institute presided by Professor Yonley, Ph.D.



## Report of the Callahan **County Attorney's Office** For Activities in 1998

The Callahan County Attorney's Office again had a busy year with over 900 cases handled.

Hot check collection is always a large part of the caseload. In addition to fines and court costs on other cases the office collected \$41,023.36 on 427 hot check cases. A file may contain more than one check which would mean that well over that number of checks were collected. Of that number 79 check cases were filed with the court and arrest warrants issued and 348 files were collected out of court. \$33,291.59 was distributed to merchants and victims of hot check cases. These figures were determined by a hand counting of disposed check files and checking monthly disposition lists.

The number of traffic appeal cases prosecuted increased 70% from 70 cases in 1997 to 119 cases in 1998. \$25,045.00 was collected on traffic appeals last year compared to \$13,585.50 in 1997, a \$11,459.50 increase in collection and revenue over 1997.

On January 1, 1998, court reports showed 241 criminal cases pending in county and district courts. That number increased slightly to 261 cases by December 31, 1998. The same records indicate 448 criminal cases were disposed during the year.

District Court records indicate that during the year 77 cases were disposed including 67 felony, 5 juvenile and 5 writ and appeal cases. County Court records show 371 criminal, traffic, and hot check

cases disposed during 1998. Office records show 5 drug forfeiture cases were disposed with \$10,466.00 in cash and two vehicles forfeited from suspected drug dealers. That money has been distributed to local law enforcement agencies in accordance with the law to help meet their expenses and serves to lessen the burden on taxpayers.

County Attorney Office records indicate that 905 files and cases were closed out during the year. including theft by check cases and traffic. In addition to check and traffic cases 106 felony cases and 253 misdemeanor cases were disposed during the year.

Office records differ from the court reports because they reflect different activities. Office figures are determined by an actual hand counting of the case files in the office and from a computer list of the cases. They include not only the cases reflected in the court reports, but also investigations, Grand Jury presentations, appeals, motions to revoke probation, civil, forfeitures, and cases the office has worked out of court.

There was a marked increase in the number of Justice Court trials during the year but the office does not keep a record of those cases tried.



#### Credit by Exam **Dates Announced**

Cross Plains ISD students may receive credit for an academic subject in which the student has had no prior instruction if the student scores 90 percent or above on a criterionreferenced examination for acceleration in the course. Credit by Exam is offered for all elementary grades K-6 as well as for all courses 7-12. If such credit is given, the examination score will be entered on the student's permanent record and transcript; and the score will be used to compute class rank.

State law requires that three days between January 1 and June 30 and three days between July 1 and December 31 will be scheduled annually for the administration of the examination for acceleration. The Cross Plains ISD school board has established the following dates as the days for credit by examination for acceleration:

June 28, 29, 30 and

July 5, 6, 7

There is no fee for the credit for examination used for acceleration. The student interested in taking credit for examination must submit a request to Rondall Sanders, High School Principal; Margie Sowell, Elementary Principal; or Vickie Campbell, Counselor; by April 15, 1999, for either testing session. Request forms can be obtained at either principal's office or the counselor's office.

After submitting the application for credit by examination, the student will receive the examination's review sheet, which will list the competencies tested on the test.

Tests will be administered on the established days, and the tests will then be sent to Texas Tech University for grading. Students will be notified of test results. For further information, please contact the principals or counselor at 725-6121 or 725-6123.


Jackie Tennison conducted the most important event of the day, the spitting contest.



#### **CROSS PLAINS REVIEW**

The Cross Plains Review was established in 1909, making it the oldest business institution in the community.

The original printing press was installed at its present address and the building was constructed around it. It is unique in that the business presently operates with modern equipment, while still housing the antique machinery. Customers enjoy viewing the old equipment and recalling how difficult printing a newspaper once was.

Don and Betty Joe Tabor of Clyde purchased the business fourteen years ago, February 1985, following the death of Benny Glover, publisher and editor. Tabor is the current publisher.

Vanda (King) Creech was employed as the editor and office manager in March 1985, and has maintained the position. She is the first lady editor of the weekly publication.

Deborah Griswold has been employed since March 1994, as a computer operator who typesets, builds ads, prepares photos and negatives.

Together the ladies gather and typeset the information and lay out each page. Every phase of creating the newspaper is completed at Cross Plains, except making the metal plates and printing, which is finished at Mr. Tabor's printing press at Clyde.

The Cross Plains Review has two sister newspapers in Callahan County, Clyde Journal and Baird Banner, owned by Mr. Tabor.

Mom always said I looked a lot like Granny Bishop.

I'd look in the mirror at my little girl face, and compare it to the grim sepia visage staring out of a very old photograph, and I'd think my Mom was weird to say that. I couldn't see any resemblance at all. And what's more, I didn't think I could ever look

like that. Mama would explain there were no camera smiles in those days, and that Granny Bishop actually had a pretty smile and bright, loving eyes. She said you couldn't even wiggle while the photographer stuck his

head under a black hood and pulled a chain to expose a glass plate. She described the bulky cameras with their accordion pleats from those

days before film. Make no mistake. Granny Bishop was an OK lady. She loved me a lot, and spent a lot of time hugging little me and telling Grampa Bishop how cute I was.

I vaguely remember their house in Seattle; most of it tucked in my heart and not in my mind.

It had a warm, brown feeling, with lace curtains' letting in a dappled light.
