



Brandi Richey 300 Hurdles State Champion New State Record 45.89

Brandi Richey represented the Lady Buffs Track Tradition very well in Austin over the weekend. Brandi's 18 points from her two races placed us in 8th for team standing honors.

In the 100 meter hurdles Brandi finished 2nd with a time of 15.09. The winner Amanda Meffick from Sims Bowie ran a 14.98. We all feit Brandi had won the race, but the camera told a different story. The 15.09 was a personal best for Brandi on the track.


In the 300 meter hurdles Brandi won the Gold with a time of 45.89 setting a new state record. The old mark of 46.00 had held up since 1992. We ran a clean and smooth race from start to finish. Down the stretch with 3 hurdles to go we were behind, but one by one Brandi ran them down, passing the last one with 2 meters to go at the finish line. It was an exciting finish to an outstanding individual performance.



Kim lost her mother recently to cancer and she was dedicated to assisting the Nixon family in their battle against the same disease. She was the driving force behind all the organization and with the cooperation of many, many volunteers the benefit was a huge success.

The recent Town Meeting was well attended as Denise Coulter, executive director of the local Economic Development Corporation, welcomed residents. She briefly reviewed the Cross Plains Strategic Plan which was professionally prepared by West Texas Utilities.

The booklet included the Vision Statement; Situation Analysis; Target Industries; Goals and Work Plans; and Evaluation. These were formulated following the community assessment conducted about a year ago.

Individual reports of progress were delivered from various committees. The Beautification Plan to clean up the town has been promoted by holding a clean up day providing residents the opportunity to discard items. A health officer, Mark Norris, has been appointed and a message of encouragement to clean up property is now printed on the monthly city water bills. Ordinance Number 97-001 has been strengthened to help enforce property maintenance.

The problem with loose dogs has been addressed. An ordinance was passed and has been upheld.

A city property tax was researched and investigated by a committee. At this time Cross Plains is the only city in Callahan County who does not levy property taxes. The city's large cash reserve resulted in questioning the need for a tax at this time and this committee has disbanded. However, grants are not readily available due to the lack of property taxes.

Ecotourism is being promoted through the organization of a trades

Saturday, September 4th, Labor Day weekend. The event will kick off with a huge parade and a sanctioned cook-off providing professional points earned toward a year's end goal. It will be held at the Cross Plains Roping Club area in connection with the Old Settler's Reunion. Craft and food booths will be provided in Treadway Park. Quilt displays, cavalry re-enactments, and a moon walk are yet other attractions. A huge crowd is anticipated. Keeka Byrd was noted as a great organizer for the festival. The Economic Development Corporation has been searching for small manufacturing plants to establish locally. They are targeting companies who will employ 5-30 and have clean industries. We have

adequate water, but the sewer system is limited. At this time the EDC has several prospects who they have visited and who have made trips to Cross Plains. Firm commitments have not yet been determined. Marketing leads have been shared by Texas Midwest Community Network, Texas

Economic Development Council and Abilene Industrial Foundation. The old Foster Grocery building on Main Street has been purchased by Flair Trophies and Awards. Awards Plus will operate a retail frontage, with production in the rear

section. The new business will employee five and will be renovating the facility.

Bob Hefner has donated the old ice house to the Economic Development Corporation and a

The first week in June Leon will be evaluated to see if he is a candidate for gene therapy in San Antonio. If eligible, he will return for treatment. He is also considering a rare treatment in Canada.

The Herzogs refused his offer, realizing the immensity of the of the crime and the punishing effect of the constant, weekly reminder.





We've Been There, and We Love You

I live in a small community in western Washington. Unfortunately, we lost two teenagers the night after they graduated from high school. They went to a party. Alcohol was involved. They died in a car accident.

I wrote this for our small community newspaper, the Mukilteo Beacon. Feel free to use it. LARRY SIMONEAUX. Edmonds, Washington

'I don't know what it feels like to hear the words that two sets of parents received this past weekend. Like every other parent, I don't ever want to know. I'm not sure I am strong enough to handle it.

"So, this is to the teenagers. It's a message and a prayer. It's from us to you.

"We were once just like you - just as young and daring. We were once sure our parents hadn't a cluc as to what we wanted or what we were about. We were once sure we could tackle the world. We were once, down deep, scared to death to face that world. We were once just like you .

"The only real difference between us as parents and you as teenagers is a lot of "been, done that's." And believe me, a lot of our "done that's" were just as dumb and silly and dangerous and exciting as anything you've done or will do. That's why we worry.

"We made it through. We got older. We fell in love. We got married. We had you. That means we sat up endless nights while you were a baby. We changed you when you were wet. We fed you when you were hungry. We held you when you cried. We fretted over you when you were sick.

"We watched you take your first step. We made stupid faces to see you laugh. We listened to your first words. We bragged about you at work. We carried pictures of you in our wallets and put others on our desks.

"We sent you off to your first day at school. We kept your drawings and school projects. We put your

birthday cards on the refrigerator. We watched you in your first play. We cheered for you when you made the team. We drove you everywhere. We worried about whether you'd be popular, and then, when you were, we worried about your friends.

"We were angry when we shouldn't have been. We asked you questions we shouldn't have. We made mistakes and hurt your feelings. We didn't say, "I'm sorry" or "I love you" often enough. We argued with you. We laughed with you. We stayed awake in bed and worried when you stayed out later than your curfew.

"We watched you change before our eyes into strong young men and women who were about to leave us. We were scared and happy and sorry at the same time.

"We want to see you become firefighters and doctors and lawyers and policemen, merchants, pilots, beauticians, teachers, librarians and forest rangers. We want to talk with you about how exciting your work is. We want to listen to you tell us how dumb or mean your boss is.

"We want to see you meet the man or woman of your dreams. We want to see you fall in love and do the same crazy things we did. We want you to get married. We want to pass you a few dollars to help you through the rough spots. We want to see you have children and watch you start all of this all over again.

"The thing we're most afraid of is that, sometimes, those things we worry about happen. Sometimes, for no rhyme or reason, you're taken from us by things beyond our control. Sometimes, we never get to see or do the things I've talked about because you're not here anymore ---and that is hurt that cannot be described.

"So, this is for you, the teenagers out there. It's the same thing parents have said to their children forever. It's the same thing you'll say to your children. They'll feel the same way about hearing it from you as you do when you hear it from us.

"Please. Be careful." We love you. You're all we really have.

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In Texas, Literacy Is A Family Affair

By LAURA W. BUSH, First Lady of Texas

Since January 1996, Governor Bush has been reminding Texans that the single most important thing we can do in Texas schools is teach our children to read. Yet my husband and I both recognize that a large number of Texas adults struggle to meet the demands of a technical society while performing at the lowest level of reading proficiency. The challenges are twofold.

First, we must ensure that our children can read. Literate children become literate adults. Texas school children outpace the children of states with similar populations in their rate of reading skill improvement.

Second, adult literacy goes handin-hand with children's literacy. Reading is acritical skill. But family literacy is more than simply reading. Family literacy is the way adults equip themselves to meet the daily needs of their families and help their children learn how to succeed in the modern world.

Family literacy programs work to break the parent-to-child cycle of illiteracy. Through intensive education of more than one generation, family literacy programs build on families' strengths. Families come to school together. While their children learn in nearby classrooms, parents work on their own reading skills. And parents practice teaching their children under the guidance of professional teachers. Parents learn that the most important thing they can do to prepare their children for success in school is to read to them carly and often.

In 1996, with the financial support of the Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy, I established the First Lady's Family Literacy Initiative for Texas. The initiative is a grant program which awards seed money to Texas family literacy programs. In three years, the initiative has granted almost \$600,000 to 30 family literacy programs.

A crucial factor in the First Lady's Family Literacy Initiative - as it should be for any literacy program is effectiveness. This year the initiative funded results-oriented programs that measure progress in reading skills in terms and numbers that everyone can understand.


We've also asked many parents who participated in these family literacy programs if the programs make a difference. Parents tell us they've learned ways to help their children develop language and reading skills, such as writing out shopping lists together or reading road signs when driving in a car.

Parents tell of a sense of accomplishment for the first time in their lives. Asked what she learned most about reading, one parent said, "Not to be afraid."

Perhaps most important, parents tell us they are reading more to their children then before they signed up for family literacy support.

A new Texas Family Literacy Center at the University of Texas at Austin will help Texas family litcracy programs better serve their clients and measure results. The center will provide technical assistance and information on researchbased practices, assessment, and accountability. The center will be a vital resource for family literacy programs statewide.

Governor Bush and I are optimistic that the efforts of Texas family litcracy protessionals, working handin-hand with public schools teachcrs, will help us reach our goal of more literate Texas, so that fewer Texas families are left behind.

Dear Editor:

Too many Texans still die in drunk driving crashes. Sadly, in fact, Texas leads the nation in alcoholrelated traffic fatalities. In 1997, the number of alcohol-related deaths on the roads in Texas along accounted for more than 10 percent of the nation's total. But, it's time for a change and Texans are ready and waiting.

A recent statewide poll reported that the majority of Texans think current drunk driving laws are too lenient and that drivers who fail the sobriety test or refuse a police officer's request to take the test should have their driver's license suspended for longer periods than the current law allows. Overwhelmingly, 86 percent of Texans favor a one-year guaranteed license suspension period for repeat offenders.

Texas lawmakers have a chance to help turn the tide by adopting Senate Bill 1774, authored by state Sen. Judith Zaffirini of Laredo. The bill

closed and has met all of the TCDP requirements TCDP spokesman Bryan





After the 1994 tornado the state agency allotted grand funds for the City of Cross Plains residents to repair damaged homes in the community.

The TCDP received complaints, from some Cross Plains citizens, of preferential disbursement of the funds and Cross Plains was charged with a conflict of interest in December of 1997.

The letter, addressed to Mayor Purvis, said that the TCDP staff had reviewed the close-out documents submitted and found them to be in compliance with federal and contractural requirements. The contract is

Edwin Weiss moved to table the sewer jet machine until may 18th so the specifications on the machine could be reviewed. The motion was approved after being seconded by Joe Ingram.

Cross Plains Fire Chief Bob Harrell informed the council that the Fire Department received a grant for \$2,800 to be used to purchase new bunker gear. Edwin Weiss made a motion to

pay the bills. The motion was seconded by Jerry Cassle and approved.

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
