#### Man seriously injured while committing felony theft, Tues., July 20

In an attempt to steal anhydrous ammonia from Cross Plains Grain and Peanut (Highway 36) location, a Carthage man was severely burned when the 5 gallon propane container he was carrying exploded. The theft occurred on Tuesday, July 10.

The suspect extracted the anhydrous ammonia from a tank and filled 5 and 10 gallon propane bottles. His partner from Louisiana, who was waiting in Treadway Park, fell asleep and never came to pick him up.

The suspect was walking near the creek when Mike Winfrey saw the explosion as the drove down Highway 36. When he reached the man he had been badly burned.

Winfrey called Justice of the Peace Rolan Jones who questioned the man and learned the whereabouts of the second man. Following a license plate check, Department of Public Safety Trooper Jim Cook picked up the Louisiana man who the pickup was registered to.

The Callahan County Sheriff's Department was called for further investigation and the Cross Plains E.M.S. was summoned for the injured man. He was transported to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene with burns from the waist up. Later he was care flighted to the Burn Center in Lubbock.

The man from Louisiana is currently held in the Callahan County Jail. Felony charges have been filed on both.

In March of 1998, Leisa was diagnosed and underwent her first surgery to remove a malignant brain tumor called gliobastoma. In the past 16 months, her treatment has included drug therapy, cobalt radiation, chemotherapy, CAT scans and MRI's, daily prescriptions and a brain biopsy.

Last Friday, July 23, Leisa endured another surgery to remove another large mass from her brain. The surgeons went in grimly expecting a large malignant tumor, but test results following the surgery showed that the mass was not malignant, but was residue and tissue growth caused by the radiation and chemotherapy. More surgery is not predicted at this time.




Reverend Rollo M. Davidson, 88, of Lewisville, passed away Thursday, July 22, 1999, in Lewisville. Funeral services were held at 10

Financial Tips for Newlyweds

 Consider your life insurance needs—If you need both your incomes to manage your household expenses, consider purchasing a life insurance policy. This may be more of an issue when you have children.



Besides that -- you could see all through their houses with the blinds open and all those open doors. Well, soon we became accustomed to the pace of life outside of Lubbock and though we no longer shut EV-ERYTHING up tight at 5:30 p.m. -we still lock the doors before turning in for the night and before leaving the house for errands. We also try to be on the alert and watch and see what is going on in our neighborhood and all around.

I've heard, you know -- it's better to be safe than sorry. Well -- it's great to feel safe and we've never been sorry we moved to Cross Plains. We are GLAD
