

#### A Father's Will

Years ago, there was a very wealthy man who, with his devoted young son, shared a passion for art collecting. Together they traveled around the world, adding only the finest art treasures to their collection. Valor Telecommunications was formed by Welsh, Carson, Anderson & Stowe (WCAS), a leading private equity investor in telecommunications with over \$8 billion in capital, in partnership with a group of prominent Hispanic investors whose roots are in the Southwest. In addition to WCAS. Vestar Capital Partners and Citicorp Venture Capital are significant investors in Valor Telecommunications. 



## A safe holiday tops Santas **Christmas list**

ABILENE-Santa Claus has a holiday wish for Texas drivers: please don't hit him.

Santa and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) have teamed up to remind Texans not to drink and drive during the holiday season. Santa has good reason to be concerned. Last December, 83 people were killed and 2,245 were injured in alcohol-related traffic crashes in Texas. In fact, Texas leads the nation in the number of traffic deaths where alcohol is involved.


"Drinking and driving is a problem anytime, especially during the holiday season," Brenda Mitchell, Abilene district traffic safety coordinator, said. "But, we anticipate that the problem could even be worse this year due to turn of the century New Year's parties. People who normally don't drink and drive during the holiday season may be out for this unique celebration."

TxDOT's holiday public education effort conveys a serious reminder with a touch of humor. Colorful materials bear the message "Santa is Coming to Town. Please Don't Hit Him. Don't Drink and Drive."

Santa and TxDOT are targeting millions of Texans with Santa's special plea for safe driving. There are 30 holiday-themed billboards being posted on interstate highways in major Texas cities and throughout Texas. Of these, one is located in Abilene at South 1st and Mockingbird. In addition to billboards, don't drink and drive radio public service announcements will air in 17 cities across Texas in December. The cities include Abilene which has three radio stations involved. They are KEAN-FM, KHXS-FM and KCDD-FM.

Also, thousands of convenience stores, liquor stores and restaurants are placing red and yellow Santa decals on their front doors and beverage cooler doors remindings customers not to drink and drive. Drink coasters with a don't drink and drive message are also being provided to restaurants and bars throughout the state.

"Santa isn't the only one who wants people to be responsible drivers," Susan Bryant, TxDOT's traffic safety director, said. "We are delighted that the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association, Texas Package Stores Association, Texas Restaurant Association and Diamond Shamrock are joining us to remind everyone how important it is not to drink and drive." And just in case anyone is tempted to get behind the wheel after too much holiday cheer, Bryant added, local police and sheriff's departments will be on special patrol for impaired drivers during the holidays. All available state troopers from the Texas Department of Public Safety will be on Texas highways for Operation Motorcide between December 24 and 26 and between December 31 and January

Total gas production in Callahan County for the month of September 1999 was 103,547 MCF. One MCF is equal to 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas.

Total crude oil production in Callahan County for the month of September was 21,222 barrels of oil.

The total oil production in Callahan County during August 1999 was 22,238 barrels of oil. Total gas production in August was 108,860 MCF of natural gas.

Other oil production months for Callahan County include: September 1998 with 30,904 barrels of oil, October with 30,116 barrels, November with 28,387 barrels of oil, December 1998 with 27,019 barrels. January 1999 with 26,349 barrels, February with 24,211 barrels, March with 23,948 barrels, April

Texas oil and gas production in September came from 143,843 oil and 52,660 gas wells.

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

Mama had some colored glass Christmas balls and we'd hang some of those on there, usually blue, red or gree ones. Daddy made us a small string of lights to go on the trees. He was a radio repairman and was used to working some with electricity. The colored light bulbs were not all the same size but we thought them the most beautiful and magical of all the strings of Christmas lights in the world. Mama had a large round roll of cotton which she would wrap around the lower trunk of the tree, allowing the cotton to spread out about 6 or 8 inches onto the floor. This we would then sprinkle with artificial snow flakes so it would glitter. This period of time being partly during WWII, the snow was made out of some sort of white stuff which really looked like Lux laundry soap flakes, which was a popular washday soap in those days.

Houses or more likely just a room or two of a home was usually all that was heated. Sometimes by a wood stove, sometimes by a kerosene stove and lots of times by gas space heaters.

Believe you me; it was usually so cold in the house on Christmas morning that children gratefully stayed in their beds under all those quilts until some brave grown-up (adult) arose and lit the fires.

Then everyone ran for the Christmas tree and the stockings to collect their share of the apples, oranges, nuts and peppermint candy sticks and to see what toys Old Santy Klause had brought. Some folks did stockings, we did not.

You know that was also before Rudolphs time. He hadn't yet been born. MERRY CHRISTMAS 199 9!!!

## NOTICE TO PARENTS --**Noisy Toys Can Damage Children's Hearing**

HOUSTON-Noisy toys from Santa do more than shatter "peace on earth" and "good will toward men." They can damage your child's hearing.

"When selecting a toy, most parents are guided by the child's request, the color or the novelty. Parents assume that if a toy is in the store, it's okay. But, that's not so," said Dr. Lois Sutton, a clinical professor assistant of otorhinolaryngology at Baylor College of Medicine.

Currently, only a few safety regulations address the noise levels of toys, however, Sutton provides the following guidelines:

· If a toy makes any noise, parents should try it out before they take it home. "Loud things can come in small packages, even plush toys. Test everything before you buy."

. If you have to raise your voide to be heard over the sound of the toy, if it hurts your ears or causes ringing, do not buy it.

"And remember, children don't usually play with toys the way the manufacturer intended. Sounds that may be tolerated at arms-length become dangerous when a child puts the toy to his or her ear."

Sutton notes that standards set by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration limit the level and length of noise exposure in the workplace to 80-85 dBA in an 8hour period for adults. The dBA is a scale that reflects the sensitivity pattern of human ears in decibels.

"OSHA recommends that hearing protection be worn in the workplace

when loudness and exposure time exceed the standards. However, there are no standards for children," Sutton said.

Parents could be surprised to find that musical toys such as electric guitars, drums and horns emit sounds as loud as 120 dBA. Toy phones can measure between 123-129 dBA, and toys that produce firearm sounds can measure 150 dBA one foot away from the noise source. According to Sutton, 85 decibels is about the loudness level of city traffic while 135 decibels is the level of a jackhammer.

"Noise exposure is cumulative," Sutton said. "Constant wear-andtear on the fragile middle and inner ear structures can cause trauma. Over time, those noise exposures begin to add up.


"Loud may be considered cool, but we are seeing more and more high school students who suffer from hearing problems," she said. "Loud noise levels can become a habit."

Sutton urges parents to set limits. "The louder the toy, the shorter the play time."

And, limits should include preteens and adolescents who listen to stereo systems with headphones and boom boxes with noise levels of 105-110 decibels.

"If you can hear the music when you approach a child wearing a headset, it's too loud," she said.

Sutton encourages parents to do the entire family a favor this Christmas by shopping wisely and enjoying a "Silent Night."

## Top Weather Stories of Century Includes 2 Killer Tornadoes in Clyde

The staff at the National Weather Service office in San Angelo has compiled a list of this century's top weather events in West Central Texas, including two Clyde killer tornadoes in 1938 and 1950.

Two lists were compiled including #1 severe thunderstorms and tornadoes and #2 floods and other significant weather events. Factors taken into consideration included the magnitude and/or uniqueness of the event, economic impact, and death toll. The events are listed in chronological order.

-May 30, 1909 Zephyr Tornado: Just after midnight this tornado cut a narrow path through the center of Zephyr in eastern Brown County. Forty-six homes, six businesses, two churches, and the high school were destroyed. Thirty-four people died in this storm and 70 others were injured. Hundreds of dead animals littered the fields and fires burned through the night in the wake of the storm.

—April 8, 1922 Rowena/Oplin Tornado: Tornado touched down northwest of Rowena and moved northeast to two miles east of Oplin. Númerous homes were damaged or destroyed. Twelve people died and 90 were injured.

-May 10, 1933 Brownwood Tornado: Tornado touched down in Brownwood and moved southeast through the communities of Jones Chapel and Delaware. Four people died and seven were injured.

-June 10, 1938 Clyde Tornado: Tornado touched down about eight miles northwest of Clyde and moved southeast toward town. When the tornado dissipated, 14 were dead, 40 were injured, and 25 homes were destroyed.

—April 28, 1950 Clyde Tornado: Tornado touched down just north of Clyde and moved northeast destroying 11 homes and damaging 10 others. Five people died and five were injured.

--March 13, 1953 Judd/O'Brien/ Rochester/Knox City Tornado: Tornado touched down near Judd and moved northeast to Knox City. Many rural homes were destroyed as well as an eight block area of Knox City. Seventeen people died. Twelve of the deaths were in Haskell County. Sixty were inhured.

-May 11, 1953 Lakeview Tornadex Tornado touched down 17 miles west-northwest of San Angelo and moved east-southeast into the community of Lakeview on the northern fringes of San Angelo. Thirteen people died and 159 were injured. Damage included 519 homes, 19 businesses, and 150 cars. -May 4-5, 1967 Severe Thunderstorm Outbreak: Thunderstorms produced large hail over Concho, McCulloch, and Taylor Counties. Ninety-nine percent of the homes in Eden and 75 percent of the homes in Abilene suffered damage. Widespread damage also occurred in McCulloch County, the worst being in the community of Placid. -April 19, 1986 Sweetwater Tornado: The tornado touched down on the west side of town around 7:15 a.m. It dissipated as it exited the northeast part of Sweetwater. One person died and 100 were injured. -May 28, 1995 San Angelo Storm: A severe thunderstorm in San Angelo produced winds over 100 MPH, large hail, and flash flooding. Extensive damage across a large part of San Angelo totaled \$128 million.

Floods and other

significant events -1934 Heat Wave: This heat wave is most significant because it did not end with the summer. Record high temperatures began in June and the heat did not subside until December.

-September 15-18, 1936 Concho River Flood: Three days of heavy rain over the Concho River basin resulted in significant flooding in San Angelo. Property damage totaled \$2 million (1936 dollars). Two people were killed.

-1950's Drought: The drought began in 1950 and continued through 1957. Some areas had a couple of wet years, but for the most part it was extremely dry. The heat during the summer months was just as oppressive as in 1934. -June 28, 1954 Ozona/


Crockett County Flood: Hurricane Alice came ashore south of Brownsville on June 24-25. The remnants of the hurricane moved up the Rio Grande and into the Pecos and Devil's River basins dumping up to 35 inches of rain over Howard's Creek and Johnson Draw. Sixteen people were killed as Johnson Draw swelled out of its banks and flooded Ozona.

-July 3-4, 1976 Heartland Rain: Copious amounts of rain fell over parts of the Heartland sending the San Saba and Colorado Rivers out of their banks. The Taylor Ranch in southern San Saba County recorded 17.83 inches or rain in two days.

-August 3-4, 1978 Albany Flood: Up to 32 inches of rain fell in two days across Shackelford County and parts of the Big Country. Six people died and four were injured as flood waters rushed through Albany. Flooding also occurred in Clyde during a 30 hour period Thursday and Friday, August 3 and 4 with over 12 inches of rainfall. Clyde Lake, which was 13 feet below the spillway, filled beyond its spillway during the flood-

-September 7-8, 1980 Flood: The remnants of Tropical Storm Danielle dumped heavy rains (over 15 inches in some places) across the Concho Valley, the Northern Edwards Plateau, and the northwest Hill Country. The result was widespread flooding and property damage totalling \$16 million.

-1981 Columbus Day Abilene Flood: Heavy rain fell October 11-14 over much of the Big Country. In Abilene, 10 inches of rain caused significant flooding and over \$6 million in damage. Clyde received 10 inches of rainfall in six hours on October 13, 1981. The flooding here resulted in the evacuation of several families and major damage to homes and businesses in Clyde. Flooding along the 200, 300, 400, and 500 block of North First Street and 100 block of Oak Street caused damage to numerous businesses. Clyde Lake gained over 22 feet of water during the deluge and water trickled over the emergency spillway since Clyde Lake was constructed in the 1970's. -1983 Cold Weather Outbreak: The temperature dropped below 32 degrees on December 18 and stayed below freezing until December 26 across much of West Central Texas. -April 25-26, 1990 Brownwood Flood: Thirteen to 18 inches of rain fell over Brown County and the Pecan Bayou sending Lake Brownwood over the spillway and putting five feet of water in the central business district in downtown Brownwood. Two people were killed in this flood.




arrival of cold weather all-too-often results in an increase in house fires. too.

"Cold weather frequently prompts unsafe efforts to heat homes," stated Young.

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sources and carelessness with holiday candles.

The fire control leader noted that one unsafe act could turn a joyous holiday celebration into a season of sorrow and personal tragedy. He offered several suggestions to safeguard homes and property from needless fire tragedies.

Avoid overloading extension cords and wall electric outlets. Avoid using multiple plugs to extend the capacity of wall outlets. Don't use kitchen stoves or ovens for home heating. Keep natural Christmas trees well watered and away from heat sources such as candles, space heaters and fireplaces. Consider electric lights in place of candles for holiday lighting. When using candles, locate

them away from flammable materials and place in containers wide enough to contain candles should they accidentally tip over. Purchase and install smoke detectors, and replace batteries in existing detectors.

Dispose of Christmas trees safely. Consider recycling your tree-for mulch or to help stabilize sand dunes, build structure for fish in a lake or pond or provide shelter for birds and other wildlife. Keep outdoor fires and fireworks well away from surrounding vegetation. Construct wide firebreaks around any outdoor fire, and stay with the fire until it is completely out. Never burn on dry, windy days. Dispose of smoking materials properly by either putting them in your ashtray or by smothering them with bare mineral soil.

Observe these precautions and help insure a fire-free holiday for your family.

· Traffic lights may fail in the event of a power outage. Motorist should take extra care at an intersection with a traffic signal that is not working and they should be prepared to give other drivers the right of way if necessary.

· If you begin to feel sleepy while driving, find a safe location toget off the road and take a break. Recent studies show that drowsy driving may be just as dangerous as drinking and driving.
