The Governor commended the Pioneer Cemetery for leadership and community service in hosting the patriotic event to honor the courage and commitment of Americans who were willing to pay the ultimate price to safeguard our freedom.

A second certificate was provided by the State of Texas House of Representatives in remembrance of those fallen heroes who died fighting for our country and to honor the citizens of Pioneer for their

efforts in honoring these heroes. An update on the National World War II Memorial to be built in Washington D.C. was given by Jim Fleming. It was noted that the \$100 million dollar goal is about 85% complete. Money is being raised from private sources and donations. Gary Gianni of Chicago, Illinois will be the featured speaker at the Robert E. Howard Days dinner to be held at the Cross Plains Community Center, Friday, June 9 at 7 PM.

Gary Gianni graduated from The Chicago Academy of Fine Art in 1976. From there, he worked for the Chicago Tribune as an illustrator and for Network Television News as a courtroom sketch artist. His artwork has appeared in numerous magazines, children's books and paperbacks.

The year 1990 marked his debut in the illustrated graphic novel field with adaptations of the Tales of O .. Henry and 20,000 Leagues Under The Sea for Classics Illustrated

At Dark Horse Comics, he wrote and drew Indiana Jones and the Shrine Of The Sea Devil, collaborated with such major writers as Harlan Ellison and Andrew Vachss and teamed up with Michael Kaluta to work on the enduring pulp hero., The Shadow. Gary is the creator of Corpus Monstrum Mysteries running as a backup feature in Mike Mignola's Hellboy. Gary's work harks back to the

golden age of illustrating to people like Vierge, Clement Coll, Booth, and Krenkel. In 1997, his illustrations won min

the Eisner Award for Best Short Story, Heroes, in Batman: Black and White, for DC Comics.

In 1998, Gary began a year and a

half of work on the painting and drawings for Robert E. Howard's Savage Tales of Solomon Kane. This beautifully illustrated book, a gift from Barbara and Jack Baum, may be seen at the Cross Plains Public Library. It is because of their generosity that Gary Gianni is our honored speaker for the dinner. Gianni is currently painting the illustrations for Bran Mak Morn, another of Howard's characters.







We had penned the weaners when they were little - a chubby bunch of porkers with voracious vegetarian appetites. From outside the pen, we fed and watered them for months, but it was inevitable that the day would dawn when they would be loaded up and sold.

Seeing the men invade their space, the hogs dashed as one in a wild panic, swerving in and out -between legs and staying out of reach. The pigs seemed to know these guys were amateurs, and they would not be lured or trapped or backed into a corner.

MyKeeper kept up a valiant pursuit, while the neighbor fell back to watch. He might have been trying to devise an easier method of capture, but it's more likely he was enjoying the show.

It was a scene of surreal turmoil, a collage of chasing and dodging, cornering, evasion, and escape. And through it all the air was filled

with ear-splitting screeches. Teamwork was lacking, so I climbed into the pen to help.

I've seen pigs corralled before. It looked easy. This was not going to be easy. Nor would MyKeeper ever admit defeat.

I did my best to keep heading them back toward him. He greeted them with open arms, but they eluded him every time. The whole pen was in an uproar.

At last MyKeeper caught a hoof and held on for dear life. The pig didn't stop, so MyKeeper made a dive after the pig and slid into the muck like a baseball player hug-

ging first base. The fevered hog ran headlong into the fence — bumped it so hard it flipped up and let him under. It was a madhouse reversal. There was the pig, almost free, and MyKeeper sprawled on his belly in the pen. The only connection was a strangle-hold grip on one kicking, flailing, twisting, wrenching hoof.

Through my head flew visions of MyKeeper dragged through the welded fence panel, strained through the grid - something like a potato diced into french fries.

In a split second panic I shoved my weight against the panel and lifted it just as the pig dragged MyKeeper under it. At this point I don't know who was squealing loudest, but soon the pig wearied and My(Exhausted) Keeper lashed a rope around its hind feet. The pig and the man lay still, catching their breath and glaring at each, other as they recovered from the contest of man and beast.





The unemployment rate in Callahan County for the month of April 2000 fell to 3.7%, down four-tenths of one percent from the March rate of 4.1%, according to jobless figures released Monday, May 29 by the Texas Workforce Commission. Of the 5,892 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 5,674 were employed during April 2000, and 218 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 3.7%. The county's unemployment rate one year ago in April

1999 was 4.2%. Callahan County's unemployment rate was 4.1% in March 2000. Of the 6,032 civilian labor force in the county during March, 5,785

had jobs while 247 or 4.1% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 4.4% in February 2000, 4.4% in January 2000, 3.9% in December 1999, 4.3% in November, 4.5% in October, 4.4% in September, 4.8% in August, 5.0% in July, 5.8% in June and 4.8% in May, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and their unemployment rates for April 2000 include: Brown, 3.6%; Coleman, 4.9%; Eastland, 3.8%; Jones, 3.5%; Runnels, 5,1%; Shackelford, 3.0%; Stephens, 4.3%; and Taylor County, 3.3%.

The unemployment rate in Texas for April 2000 was 4.1%, down from the 4.4% unemployment rate reported in March 2000. The state's unemployment rate one year ago in April 1999 was 4.3%. Of the 10,323,900 civilian labor force in the state, total employment was 9,899,800 in April. Total unemployment in April 2000 was 424,100.

These mementos bare the slogan, Celebrate - Sober. Tshirts displaying the same slogan were also donated as door prizes.

"These graduation souvenirs are designed to be a reminder to the students to remain drug and alcoholfree around prom and graduation time," Mitchell said.

"The initiation of "zero tolerance" laws in our state, coupled with enhanced penalties for age law violations, signal a new era in Texas for targeting illegal underage drinking. Experience has shown that too many young innocent lives have already been lost or severely impaired in our state due to illegal underage drinking and drinking and drinking.

"We know the temptation seniors face this time of year as we've all been there ourselves," she added. "That's why we think it is so important to help finance prom and graduation all-night parties and to offer small tokens as reminders of the importance of remaining sober while making memories that will last a lifetime.

For the past several years TxDOT has made grants available through its Traffic Operations division to support Project Celebration. The money is divided between the state's 25 districts that then determine the amount of each grant based on the number of high schools participating in their individual
