





If you experience one or more of these symptoms, it is wise to see your doctor. Successful sinusitis treatment requires a full course of antibiotic therapy. When taking antibiotics, it is important to finish the prescription.

Cloud Seeding Efforts Presented to Commissioners

Callahan County Judge Roger Corn briefly gave a presentation to the Commissioners' Court about the possibility of Callahan County joining 12 other West Texas counties about "cloud seeding" in an effort to improve the drought conditions currently plaguing portions of the Big Country area.

Corn spoke to the Commissioners' Court Monday, June 12 during the commissioners regular bimonthly meeting about the cloud seeding proposal. Judge Corn said he recently attend the cloud seeding workshop in Abilene. The cloud seeding proposal is being pushed through this area by West Texas Utilities Company. WTU's main electric generating station is located on Lake Fort Phantom north of Abilene. Because of the lake's low water level, WTU must purchase additional water elsewhere to keep the lake at a certain level so the generating station can continue to operate.

Judge Corn emphasized that cloud seeding does not make it rain if no clouds exist. He said that by seeding clouds, it will make it rain more and make the rainfall stay in a certain area longer.

The county judge said he will attend another meeting in Abilene June 21 in which costs for the cloud seeding program will be discussed. Judge Corn said preliminary estimates the project would cost \$1 million to seed a six million acre area that covers the 12 county region. Judge Corn said the State of Texas would pay one-half of the seeding project.

Other agenda items brought before the Commissioners' Court included:

-On a motion by Corn and second by Harold Hicks, commissioners voted to approve the updated lease agreement with the Department of Human Services after meeting with Bob Mehaffey and Larry Hopkins. The lease agreement involves office space rent by the Department of Human Services in the Callahan County Annex building (old hospital build-

-On a motion by Charlie Grider and second by Bryan Farmer, commissioners voted 5-0 to offer a letter of support to Citizens EMS to construct a new ambulance office and barn facility in Clyde.

Commissioners met with Clyde resident Bob Robinson, with West Texas Industrial Engine. Robinson was at the meeting to introduce himself to members of the Commissioners' Court.

-On a motion by Corn and second by Holland, commissioners voted 5-0 to table taking action concerning an animal control contract with the City of Clyde.

-On a motion by Farmer and second by Holland, commissioners voted 5-0 to approve the Texas Association of Counties to provide the county group health insurance. The coverage, through Blue Cross/Blue Shield, calls for an eleven percent increase in the health premium.

-On a motion by Grider and second by Hicks, commissioners voted 5-0 to allow the Texas Association of Counties to provide pub-

lic officials liability insurance. -On a motion by Holland and second by Farmer, commissioners voted 5-0 to approve a new interlocal agreement between Callahan County and the Abilene Regional MHMR Center. Callahan County is one of the sponsoring agencies for the Abilene MHMR Center.

-On a motion by Hicks and second by Grider, commissioners voted 5-0 to lift the burn ban in Callahan County until further no-

-On a motion by Farmer and second by Corn, commissioners voted 5-0 to adopt an order regulating the use of certain fireworks for the July 4 fireworks season. The order states that fireworks cannot be ignited on county roads or county-owned property. Fireworks can be ignited on private landowners property, as long as permission is received from the property owner and that some type of water system is available on the

-On a motion by Corn and second by Grider, commissioners voted 5-0 to approve joining a Preservation Courthouse Team. An architect is currently performing a Master Plan of the County Courthouse in Baird in order to apply for a state preservation grant. The Texas Legislature has authorized up to \$50 million be spent to restore old Texas court-

-On a motion by Farmer and second by Holland, commissioners voted 5-0 to obtain cost figures for colored county road signs. Commissioners are in the process of approving minimum and maximum sizes for county road signs and numbers which help law enforcement officers and Citizens EMS locate a county residence quickly.

-On a motion by Corn and second by Hicks, commissioners voted 5-0 to approve a resolution in support of the Brazos G Water Planning. Judge Corn commented that Callahan County is located in the Brazos water district and the resolution approved by commissioners is in opposition to a Brazos group located in the southern portion wanting more water rights in the northern portion of the water district.

Those in the southern portion of the water district feel because that area's population is growing more, they should have more of the water rights from the northern portion of the district. Judge Corn said the resolution involves those lakes in the northern portion of the Brazos in which the lake level can be controlled by flood gates.

-On a motion by Farmer and second by Hicks, commissioners voted 5-0 to approve the proposed budget for the Callahan County Appraisal District as presented by the chief appraiser.

-On a motion by Holland and second by Hicks, commissioners voted 5-0 to approve the payment of all approved bills.

-On a motion by Farmer and second by Corn, commissioners voted 5-0 to adjourn the Commissioners' Court meeting.






