Two large capacity washers will be available for oversize items such as king-size bedspreads, etc. Thirty-pound dryers will be provided. Everybody laughed. Instead of panicking, Rogers commented: "Well getting tangled up in a rope ain't so bad - - unless it's around your neck." Everybody laughed again. Then he made another comment and they laughed some more. He discovered a new talent within himself hidden one - - the ability to make people laugh. So Will Rogers
remembered as an American humorist, the foremost comedian of his day and not as a circus cowboy.
I wonder if you might not have a hidden talent that only needs to be discovered - - one that would be good for you and others if only allowed to surface? Will Rogers cured many ills with his humor. The book of Proverbs says, "A merry heart is a good medicine." No telling what you could contribute to society, the world, your family, the community Jesus severely rebuked the one who hid his talent, afraid to use it. It was

"Weather-wise"
There has certainly been quite a few deadly tornadoes this spring in the United States of America. Texas has seen it's share of tornadoes and more. The first tornado I was in, I was an infant so I don't remember butI sure heard a lot about it. We lived in Baird and the ornado hit Baird and Clyde, it was prety bad.ent but death was there too pres, peope les ives. 100 Yes, people lost their lives. I once dated a young man from Clyde, for in that tornado. He and his older brother did survive and they were then raised by their grandparents. The second tornado I was in, I wa abut 13 or 14 years old, living in Baird once again, We had come full circle in our moving. Born in Baird where we lived with my paternal randparents, two years later when Cross Plains: Dr Eli Powell Cross Plains; Dr. Eli Powel grandparents were here. By aternal and 4 we and moved to Rhome Texas for a few months. We left there and moved to Fort Worth during WWII where my parents both worked in defense plants. Then my father became ill and we moved back to Cross Plains by the ime we reached 3 and 5 . By the time we reached 8 and 10 we moved back to Baird.
Again Baird and Clyde were hit by a devastating tornado. Again lives
were lost. We had hailstones the size of baseballs in Baird. We didn't make it to the cellar, we rode out the storm in the house. The hail beat out almost all the windows in my grandmothers house, but we were time I turned 18 , it seemed that I had spent about half my life in storm cellars.
So many parents took their
offspring to the cellar when a offspring to the cellar when a cloud would come up that it got so when I
was in high school we all thought we was in high school we all thought we
spent nearly every night in spent nearly every nig
somebody's storm cellar. So many students So many students spent so many
nights in the storm cellars of Baird that it got so that if you didn't have your homework and said it because of having to go to the storm cellar, the teachers gave you a chance to make it up time they were in someone's storm cellar also!!!!!!!
Those nights in cellars with
neighbors and friends near neighbors and friends, near and far
and some relatives were something else. Dirt, cobwebs, spider webs else. Dirt, cobwebs, spider webs,
flickering candles, blinking lanterns and the occasional flash light lit up our world.
You sat wherever you could find a chaird a crate, the cellar stairs, an old Lard Can, a stool, a box and children
slept wherever they propped knees or on Mama's or Granny other. Just as you got completely comfortable and asleep, some anxious adult would open the cellar door to look out and see the hhreatening clouds. When they did wake up half the kids and put out most of the candles and kerosene lamps. We got some of our education in school, sure but we also spent so many nights and aftemoon in cellars, we were more "weather wise" than "book-wise," much of the in the early 1990's, the tornado hit Cross Plains. Thankfully though, no lives were lost here. luckier and our home didn't receiv

"On the first Friday, Saturday and Sunday of August, no state or most clothing and footwear priced under $\$ 100,{ }^{\prime \prime}$ Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander said. The timing of the sales tax holi-
day is intended to help parents day is intended to help parents

school year, but the tax break is not limited to children's school clothes.
*Most clothing and footwear priced under $\$ 100$ is exempt from
sales taxes. Consumers may pursales taxes. Consumers may pur-
chase as many tax-exempt items as they wish.
*Clothing and footwear used primarily for athletics or protective wear, such as golf cleats or football pads, are not tax exempt. However, athletic clothes that are com-
monly used as street wear, such as tennis shoes, baseball caps and jogging suits are eligible for the tax exemption.
