I can vouch for only four years out of his tenure, but I have no reason to doubt that the others were just as eventful. And in spite of ourselves, we did manage to learn in those hours spent in Ag class, in the shop, at judging contests and on field trips, and we have put to good use what we did learn, in everyday life, using that unique ability to combine book learnin' and common sense. With folks getting into the spirit of homecoming, I wanted to take this brief opportunity to give a salute to a fellow Fightin' Texas Aggie, and to say thanks Prof for putting up with us, all of us, throughout the years, and for being a part of our growing and learning experience. Burn Ban Reinstated for Callahan County

Callahan County Commissioners voted Monday, July 24 to reinstate the countywide outdoor burn ban effective immediately.

The burn was lifted after heavy rains in the county in June, however little rainfall fell during the month of July forcing county commissioners to reinstate the outdoor burn ban. On a motion by Commissioner Tommy Holland and second by Commissioner Bryan Farmer, the commissioners' court voted unanimously to reinstate the outdoor burn ban.

Callahan County Commissioners also met in a budget workshop to consider the 2000-2001 fiscal year budget for Callahan County. County Judge Roger Corn stated the commissioners have tentatively proposed a tax rate one and one-half cents higher than last year's. The tentative tax rate would generate \$42,000 in additional revenue for the county coffers.

Judge Corn said the commissioners' court will meet at 9:30 a.m. Monday, August 14 to discuss the tax rate again. At the August 14 meeting, county commissioners will take a record vote and schedule a public hearing if the higher tax rate is to be considered

The county judge said each department head has presented their department budgets to the county commissioners for their consideration. As the budget officer, Judge Corn said he's also examined the department budgets and will make recommendations to the entire commissioners' court.

The commissioners' court has also tentatively slated a public hearing on Tuesday, August 29 to adopt the tax rate. The commissioners' court has also scheduled a meeting on Monday, September 11 to adopt the 2000-2001 fiscal year tax rate for the county.

Other commissioners' court agenda items included:

-Commissioners reviewed and signed the minutes from the previous commissioners' court meet-

-During time set aside for public comment, Leenell Roach representing Allied Compliance Service of Lubbock met with the county commissioners to present some drug testing information for CDL's (Commercial Driver's License) being offered by the company.

-On a motion by Judge Corn and second by Commissioner Harold Hicks, commissioners voted to table appointment of election judges for the county precincts to the November 2000 General Election. The item will come before the commissioners' court at the Monday, August 14 meeting. -On a motion by Hicks and second by Farmer, commissioners

voted 4-0 to pay all approved bills. -On a motion by Farmer and

second by Holland, commissioners voted 4-0 to adjourn the commissioners' court meeting at 1:50 p.m.

for Housing in Rural Areas ----- Zero Down **Payment for Rural** Homeownership

TEMPLE, TX July 17, 2000 -Steven A. Carriker, State Director, Texas USDA Rural Development, announced today that even though the fiscal year is quickly drawing to close, there are still ample federal funds available for Guaranteed Rural Housing loans. Borrowers can often get these loans with no down payment.

To be eligible for financing, the home must be located in a rural community with less than 10,000 in population, on farm or in open country, not closely associated with an urban area. Under certain circumstances, loans can be made in towns and cities between 10,000 and 25,000 in population.

"Never assume an area is not eligible under the guaranteed loan program. We encourage anyone interested in owning their own home to call the Brownwood Office for details on eligible areas," said Carriker.

The guaranteed rural housing loan may be used to finance new or existing homes that are structurally sound and have adequate See Federal Funds, Page 3

Have a great summer and don't forget the cookies and lemonade. Au Revoir!!



The total oil production in Callahan County during March 2000 was 22,292 barrels of oil. Total gas production in March was 118,413 MCF of natural gas.


