Carriker, State Director, Texas USDA Rural Development, the fiscal year is quickly drawing to close, there are still ample federal funds available for Guaranteed Rural Housing loans. Borrowers can often get these loans with no down payment.
To be eligible for financing, the home must be located in a rural community with less than 10,000 in population, on farm or in open country, not closely associated with an urban area. Under certain circumstances, loans can be made in 25,000 in population.
