

Seventy Texas FFA members came one step closer to their dreams of higher education when the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo presented each of them with a four-year, \$10,000 scholarship during ceremonies at the Texas FFA Convention in Corpus Christi,

Selected by the Agricultural Education Division of Texas Agency, the scholarship recipients all demonstrated academic excellence and strong leadership skills throughout their high school and FFA careers. To qualify, recipients of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo FFA scholarships must pursue a degree in agriculture or life sciences at a Texas college or university.





Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander today reminded Texans that the second annual Sales Tax Holiday is Aug. 4-6. The Comptroller urged families to take advantage of this well-deserved tax

During the Sales Tax Holiday, most clothing and footwear priced at less than \$100 is exempt fromstate and local sales taxes. Though the holiday is timed to help families outfit their children to go back to school, the tax break isn't limited

The tax exemption applies to school uniforms, work uniforms, pajamas, robes and slippers, socks and underwear and even jackets and sweaters if you can find any in the stores during this 100 degree weather," Comptroller Rylander

"We have opportunities to do more

mommas who make the clothes for their kiddos can also benefit from this tax break. These changes will take legislative action, and I'm going to recommend this to the state legislature when it convenes in January.

During the first Sales Tax Holiday last year, Texas families spent more than \$400 million dollars on taxexempt clothing and shoes, saving more than \$32 million in sales taxes. This year, the savings are expected to add up to \$34 million.

This year, local communities had a chance to opt out of the Sales Tax Holiday, if they notified the Comptrollers office by March 31. Only one taxing jurisdiction, the city of Sunset Valley, south of Austin, opted out.

"Officials in a number of communities briefly considered opting out, but they concluded that the increased local economic activity generated by the Sales Tax Holiday outweighed loss of sales tax revenue during the three-day weekend," Comptroller Rylander said.

"In 1999, even though the state chose to provide families with a \$32 million tax cut during the first tax holiday, overall sales tax revenue for the year rose to a record \$13 billion. City sales tax rebates for the year increased 7.1 percent to \$3.5 billion," Comptroller Rylander said.

For retailers and shoppers who have questions about the Sales Tax Holiday, the Comptroller's tax assistance line will be open during the weekend at 1-800-252-5555. Taylor Electric "Customer Charge" is not sensible,

It is the responsibility of members of a cooperative to voice their opinions of wrongdoings in their organization. Just as thousands of other rural coop members, I recently received my electric bill. And just as thousands of my fellow members, I am astounded at the recent rate increases. Or should I say, "customer charge" increase.

Let me explain why this increase is not sensible. My total energy charge this month for two meters was 65.52. My total "customer charge" was 30.00. As you can see, my "customer charge" is now almost half of my energy charge. Why? Because just like thousands of fellow rural coop members, I have an additional meter that is not frequently used. There are MANY rural folks who have meters at barns, cabins, sheds etc. whose "customer charges" are now 5, 10, 15 times higher than their energy charge.

It would be more ethical and "coop-like" to compensate higher energy manufacturing costs by simply increasing KWH rates. Though none of us enjoy rate increases, at

least it would reflect usage honestly and undisguised. This "customer charge" hike of 200% hurts the very rural members that make up this reputable coop. If nothing else, multi-meter customers should be given a discounted customer charge when all meters are on the same homestead or general plot. That would be only fair since so many loyal members added meters a few years back when Taylor Electric allowed self-reading of meters. It is wrong to encourage folks to set up separate meters one year and then turn around and charge 15.00 customer charge per meter a few vears later.

Perhaps there are some financially self-serving motives at play. Perhaps there have simply been some honest bad decisions. Whatever the reasons, this is not working as a COOP should, and it is the very rural customers who are being hurt. 



off program in February. The congressionally mandated pork checkoff program is funded by assessments collected from producers when hogs are sold. The funds are used for pork promotion, research, and consumer information. Program funds cannot be used to affect the outcome of the referendum vote.

The final referendum rules provide for in-person voting September 19-21, 2000, at the Callahan County FSA Office, 141 W. 4th

Ste. A, Baird, Texas 79504. Absentee ballots may be requested beginning August 1. However, absentee ballots for producers will become available from the Callahan County FSA Office from August 18, 2000, through Septem-

August 3, 2000

The public is invited to observe the counting of the ballots at the Callahan County FSA Office on November 29, 2000, at 10:00 a.m.

Producers who have owned and sold one or more pigs or hogs at any time from August 18, 1999, through August 17, 2000 are eligible to vote. Producers are to vote in the County Office where the producer's farm records are administratively located or, for other producers, in the county where the producer owns hogs or pigs.

The final rule will be published in the Federal Register on July 13 and will be on the web at: http:// www.ams.usda.gov/lsg/mpb/pork/ pkrefrule.htm.

The stuff of a birthplace is hooked to your genes. Time spent growing up there is embroidered on your heart. The threads of my life in Seattle are pretty faded by now, but of a strong weave.

This was quite a momentous trip for Sweet Pea, too, though for different reasons than my own. We started a spoon collection for her, getting one from each state we passed through.

It felt good to be in the arms of my hometown and near the places of my parents' birth.

I'd almost forgotten how much water there is in Washington State, in lakes and streams and rivers and all of Puget Sound. And how much I love the very small feeling I get standing near sky-high evergreens.

I would have loved to retrace some memories of the Olympic Peninsula, ferry boats, the house where I grew up, the place on the edge of the hillside where we used to watch sunsets, the Waterfront, Pike Place Market, the Woodland Park Zoo where four generations of our family strolled many Sunday afternoons.


But, no time. I didn't even have time to count how many new skyscrapers have sprouted in downtown Seattle since my last visit.


