"Reputation is what men and women think of us; character is what God and the angels know of us." Thomas Paine said it that way; perhaps we ould shorten it by just saying, concerning character, that it is "what we really are.
While we want our reputations to be good, and want to guard it from being defamed, if we have the right character it will be difficult
impossible for anyone to ruin our reputation even if they tried. Some trie mpossible for anyone to ruin our reputation even if they tried. Some tried to discredit the Galilean and destroy his reputation but His character
prevented it. I'm thinking especially of all the things done to Him and said about Him, even while He hung on the cross -- and yet when it was all said and done, one of the Roman soldiers said, "Surely and truly, this was a righteous man, the Son of God!" They had gambled for His clothes, put a sign over His head in mockery, shook their heads at Him in derision, and jeered and sneered Him -- but because of the life He had lived and His efusal to retaliate, the centurion upheld Jesus' reputation -- yes, and If ecause of Jesus' character.
If we really want to build and maintain good reputation, let us pattern our ives after the Master Teacher's life and teachings. His life became
leaching in deed that matched His teaching in word and we would do well eaching in deed that matched His teaching in word and we wo
o "follow His steps" in the examples He left us, I Peter 2:21.
A real BREAKTHRU will be to work on our character -- toward it being right according to God's standard. And if God is pleased with us, it really makes little difference what mere men may think.

A Callahan County Historical Landmark burned this past weekend in a fire thought to have been started by a lightning strike. According to Cross Plains Fire

were so hot the tin melted. The old Noah Smedley Homestead, presently known as the "Wylieplace" in north Rowden, in southeastern Callahan County, burned to the ground during a rain Saturday, September 23, 2000 between 10:30 p.m. and 11:00
The unique old home was buit The unique old home was built
around 1902 . Dean Cibbs, Noah's around 1902. Dean Cibbs, Noah's grandson, says the family told of the house was completed. It was o
wooden construction with a large split rail porch. A hand dug underground cistern, with a series of gutters and pipes to fill it with
rainwater from the home's only water supply, until the county pipeline water was
installed a couple of years installed a couple of years ago.
The home was unpainted The home was unpainted and
with the very dry conditions, the entire structure was in flames in a matter of minutes, swiftly spreading to a small shed filled with hay, a tractor and a pickup
truck. Firefighters from Cross Plains answered the call and pulled the tractor and pickup from the burning building. The remains of the house, shed and hay burned
for several hours under the for several hours under the
watchful eyes of the firemen, who remained on the site until $4: 25$
a.m. Firemen were relieved by Rowden residents Marty and
Sherry Ross who stood watch until daylight, but the old homestead was gone. In the 1900's the Smedley's raised their eleven children in this home and Ima May Smedley
Gibbs, the oldest of the three girls told a story of standing on the porch of this home with her family, in the spring of 1912 during a
severe thunderstorm and seeing severe thunderstorm and seeing
smoke to the North of them; as it smoke to the North of them; as it
turned out, the Pilgrim School (the Rowden School at that time) was struck by lightning and it burned to the ground.
The home was owned by Inez
Wylie of Baird who stated she and Wylie of Baird who stated she and
her husband Gaston purchased her husband Gaston purchased
the home in the early 1960's and her son, Bill had been restoring it.
