"WATER, WATER, WATER"

If you are suffering from the lack of water, you will definitely relate to this article. The drought situation that has existed in this area for the past few years, has depleted the water for some of us who depend on wells.

At this point, we have already drilled a new well when the original one went dry, and now it is about to go. Of course, if we depended on tank water we would have been in trouble even sooner.

We have never been able to drink the water, but at least it would furnish the house. Now, we feel lucky if there is enough water to bathe at night. When you have to be conservative, you would be amazed at how little you can get by with. Sometimes I feel like I'm living in the "good old days?" that I have heard my parents talk about when there was no inside plumbing.

You can wash dishes in half the water you think. Not an ounce is wasted -- anything left over goes on the inside plants.

For months I've brought our clothes to town to wash. This is no fun! I never appreciated the convenience of a washer and dryer at my house before.

All summer and until a few weeks ago, I have hauled water to keep my outside flowers alive. Everyone thinks I'm nuts for doing this, but I really like my flowers. It does look funny with the flowers all green and blooming and the grass yellow and dying.

Sometimes I forget that I'm not at home, and find myself conserving everywhere. Really we should anyway. My cousin, Todd Watson, became a geologist about fifteen years ago and he informed us that his instructors warned that we would be searching for water, rather than oil, in the near future. We may be there already!

Many area cities have been rationing water for months and have had to make alternative plans. Cross Plains is fortunate to have good water wells that have sustained throughout this drought.

I know there are others who are living a similar life-style and the rain means so much to your daily living and livelihood. Ranchers are already haying their cattle and considering decreasing their herds due to lack of grass, hay or water.

Today it looks rainy and the weather stations are giving a 30 percent chance. Oh, I hope it rains tonight! We need a terrific amount to raise the water table again. The Lord knows what we need and He will send rain in due time. It is my opinion that we have to humble ourselves and redirect our lives as the Bible instructs before He will heal our land. Sometimes we get so involved in everyday living that we don't notice what we are doing. I plan to give some time to re-thinking my game plan; how about you?

Lately the old saying, "You don't miss the water until the well goes dry" has new meaning!

Thank you Lord for answering our prayers and sending the rain.

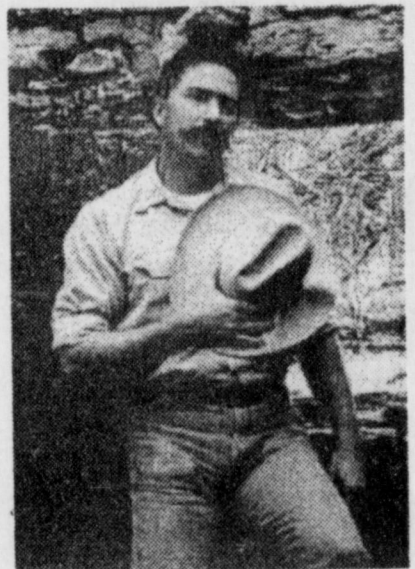
Mike Blakely to entertain at Library

Commissioners name Rumfield to EMS Board

Callahan County Commissioners, holding a regular bimonthly meeting Monday, Tuesday, October 10 at the County Courthouse in Baird, voted to appoint Tom Rumfield of Oplin as the county's representative to the Callahan County Emergency Medical Service board of directors.

On a motion by Commissioner Bryan Farmer and second by Commissioners Tommy Holland, commissioners voted 5-0 to appoint Rumfield to the Citizens EMS Board.

Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court included:

—The minutes of the commissioners' court meeting on September 11 were approved as presented.

—During time set aside for public comments, no one spoke to the county commissioners.

—Commissioners met with Sam Rocco in regards to the condition of County Road 258. Rocco stated he believes the road is a health hazard because of the constant dust. He stated 150-200 cars travel down the road each day and he estimated there are 43 houses on the road. Rocco stated he would appreciate the commissioners' court consideration in doing something about the road. Commissioners Harold Hicks said he believe the best limestone material was used on the road and it was dusty everywhere because of the lack of rain. Commissioner Farmer stated he would be glad to give Rocco a dollar figure if he wanted to contact the people who live on the road. In the past, some roads have been paved and the people shared the expense of the material and the county had been responsible for the labor involved. No action was taken.

—County Sheriff Eddie Curtis met with the commissioners to discuss a cooling unit for the County Jail and an air filter unit. The cooling unit needs to be upgraded by next spring. Commissioner Hicks made a motion to table the item. Commissioner Charlie Grider seconded the motion and it carried. 5-0. Commissioners also discussed with the sheriff concerning four cell phones for the deputies at the Sheriff's Department. This item will be placed on the next meeting agenda on October 23.

—On a motion by Commissioner Grider and second by Commissioner Farmer, county commissioners voted 5-0 to approve a grant of easement to the Texas Historical Commission in regards to the Courthouse Preservation Program.

—On a motion by Commissioner Hicks and second by Commissioner Grider, county commissioners voted 5-0 to approve the second and fourth Monday at 9:30 a.m. as the designated day of the week Commissioners' Court shall convene is a regular meeting during the next fiscal year.

—On a motion by County Judge Roger Corn and second by Commissioner Grider, county commissioners voted 5-0 to approve October 2000 as Breast Cancer Awareness Month in Callahan County.

—On a motion by Commissioner Holland and second by Commissioner Grider, county commissioners voted 5-0 to approve the Texas Department of Transportation waiver with Federal Off-System Bridge Program Projects and equivalent match projects.

Judge Corn stated there are some seven county bridges which need to be replaced. He said the federal government would pay 80% of the bridge replacement costs, the state would pay 10% and Callahan County would pay 10%.

The first bridge to be replaced is the Battle Creek bridge located north of Putnam on the Eastland County line in Commissioner Tommy Holland's Precinct #3.

Judge Corn said a new program would waive Callahan County's portion on the Battle Creek bridge, if the county agrees to pay its portion on another bridge in the county road system.

—On a motion by Commissioner Farmer and second by Commissioner Holland, county commissioners voted 5-0 to accept a request from Billy Ray Cullen to place a road, approximately 1/2 mile in length, into the County Road system. The road is located off County Road 258.

—County Commissioners voted 5-0 to approve a request to close a road, identified as County Road 327 on some maps. This road transverse properties owned by Bruce Williams, Morris Snyder and the heirs of C.B. and Annie Snyder. The motion to close the road was made by Commissioner Holland and second by Commissioner Farmer on a unanimous 5-0 vote.

—County Commissioners were to discuss a proposal on the Old Jail presented by Horace Hatfield, Nancy Young and Jackie Pruet, however no one was present at the commissioners' court meeting.

—On a motion by Commissioner Hicks and second by Commissioner Farmer, county commissioners voted 5-0 to approve payment of all approved bills.

—On a motion by Commissioner Farmer, county commissioners voted 5-0 to adjourn the commissioners' court meeting.

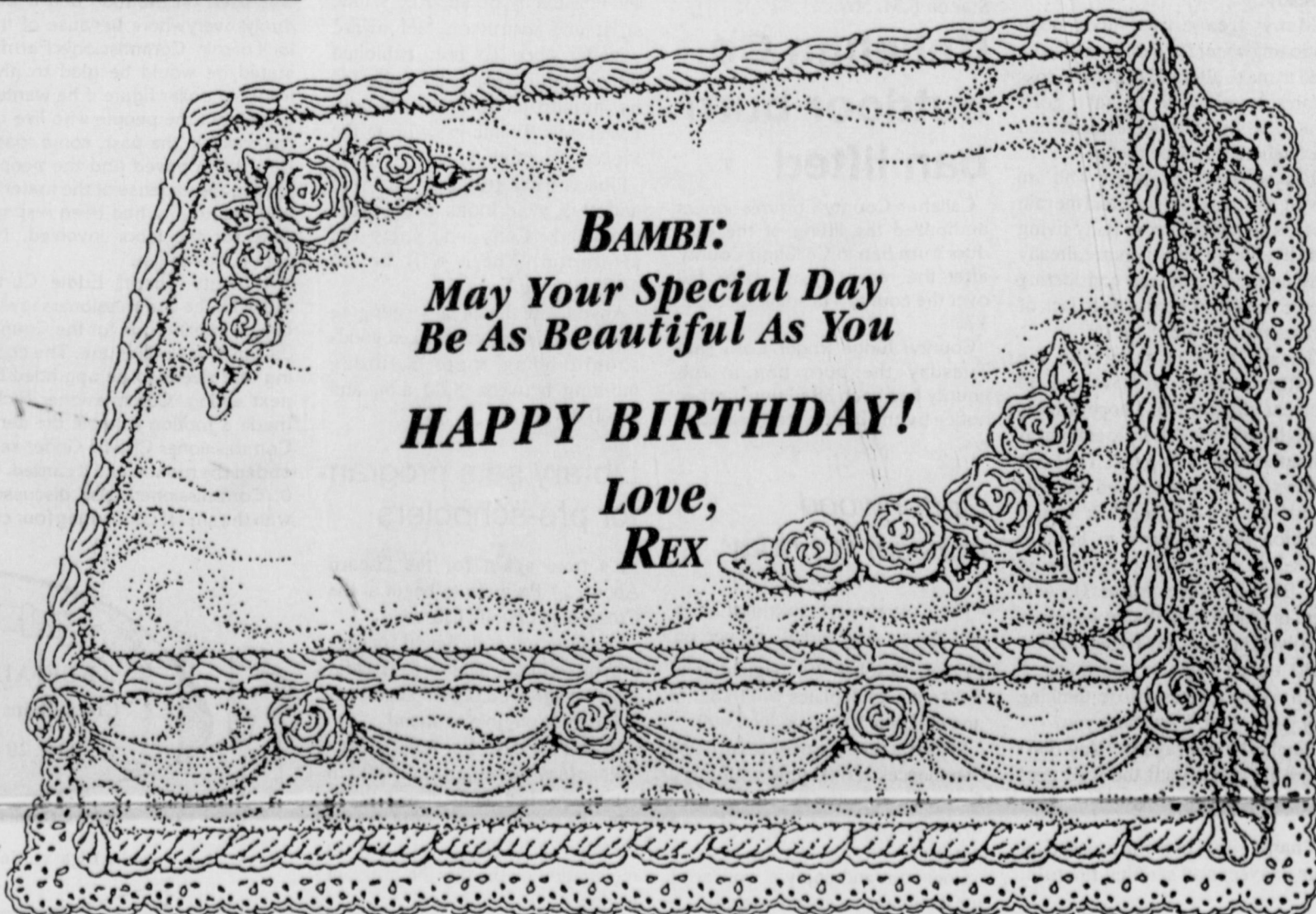

**USDA announces
one-time only wool
and mohair program**

The Callahan County Farm Service Agency (FSA) has announced a new, one-time only wool and mohair program created to assist sheep and goat producers endure the low prices they are receiving for the sale of their shorn commodities.

The Wool and Mohair Market Loss Assistance Program (WAMLAP) provides 20 cents per pound for wool and 40 cents per pound for mohair to farmers who shorn their livestock during the 1999 marketing year and are still currently in the business of producing and marketing agricultural products.

Sign-up for WAMLAP begins on October 10, 2000, and ends December 29, 2000. Applications must be submitted by the deadline to the FSA county office where the farmer resides.

"Just like the rest of the agricultural economy, wool and mohair prices have been on a continuous slide during the past three years," said Scott Odum, County FSA Executive Director. "This program will help sheep and mohair producers recover some of their expenses."

Producers are required to certify the amount of shorn wool or shorn

mohair from live sheep or Angora goats. Greased wool or greased mohair from pelts or hides is not eligible for payments. The office will also need to know the number of animals shorn.

"Farmers are encouraged to provide the office documentation supporting the pounds of wool or mohair they are certifying," said Odum. "Because if a spot-check indicates a discrepancy, the producer must refund the difference."

Since prices have been so low, some producers may still have 1999 wool or mohair stored on the farm. Those pounds of fiber are eligible for WAMLAP. A farm visit by an FSA representative will be required to determine the pounds in storage if the farm is selected for a spot-check.

The livestock must have been owned by the producer for 30 days and shorn during the 1999 calendar year in the United States to be eligible.

The application is available at the Callahan County FSA office or it can be downloaded from the Internet at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/dal/p/psd/>.

**New medallion marker created
for historic Texas cemeteries**

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Historical Commission (THC) has created a new medallion marker to recognize designated Historic Texas Cemeteries. The medallion is a 10-inch cast aluminum marker with the words "Historic Texas Cemetery — Texas Historical Commission" encircling a central star, a rose and a cypress branch. It is available only to cemeteries with the Historic Texas Cemetery designation, which requires that they be at least 50 years old and deemed worthy of preservation for historical associations. An application process is used to determine eligibility for the designation.

"The designation and the medallion are tools that will increase public awareness of these important cultural resources," said Larry Oaks, executive director of the THC. "Awareness and education are among the best ways to guarantee the preservation of a cemetery."

The Historic Texas Cemetery Program was developed to address the destruction of historic cemeteries and the illegal removal of cemetery fixtures. Threats to historic cemeteries include urban expansion and development, vandalism, grazing animals and long-term deterioration from forces of na-

ture, such as weathering and uncontrolled vegetation. The designation and medallion encourage cemetery preservation, but cannot guarantee protection of the cemetery.

"Historic cemeteries serve as directories of early residents and reflect the cultural influences that helped shape our state's communities," Oaks said. "This program brings attention to these community treasures and recognizes the importance of their preservation."

Previously, cemeteries of historical importance were recognized with Official Texas Historical Subject Markers. In the future, the THC will honor these cemeteries with the new Historic Texas Cemetery medallion and optional interpretive plaques in place of a subject marker.

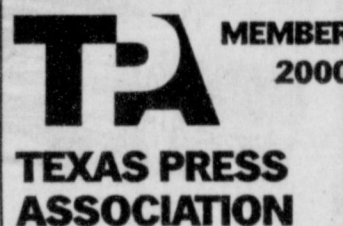

**White-tailed deer seminar
set for October 24th**

The recent cooler temperatures have turned many Big Country residents thoughts to the upcoming white-tailed deer season which opens for rifles November 4. Deer are an important component of renewable natural resources in Texas. The white-tailed deer is the major game species, measured by hunter participation and money spent on the sport. In recent years, hunters have harvested more than 450,000 head each year. Perhaps no wildlife species has more universal appeal than the white-tailed deer.

Many people are interested in deer - ranchers, rural landowners, farmers, nature lovers, gardeners and even suburban homeowners. But their perspectives are not the same. Nature lovers like to see many animals that are gentle and easy to observe. Hunters want hunting opportunities, primarily for bucks. Farmers and gardeners may just wish that the deer would feed on something besides their crops. Ranchers may view deer as potential sources of revenue.

Healthy deer herds have several common attributes such as big antlers, prime body condition, productive does, good fawn survival, rapid growth, and early maturity of young.

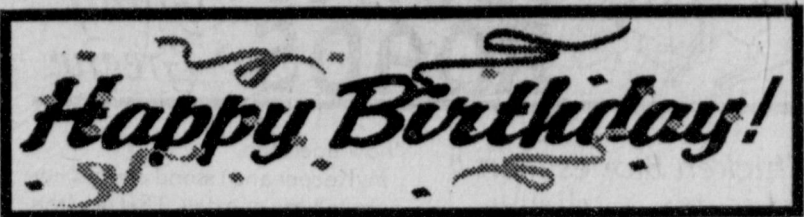
To address a few of the above topics and help local enthusiasts prepare for the approaching season, the Callahan County Extension Service has scheduled a White-Tailed Deer Seminar for Tuesday, October 24, 2000. The seminar will be held at 7:00 p.m. in the Baird Activity Center located at 208 Walnut in Baird, Texas. There is a \$2.00 admission that automatically qualifies participants for a chance at an 200# automatic deer feeder to be given away at the end of the program. There will be several other door prizes.

Steve Jester, of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will be on hand to discuss white-tailed deer biology, census techniques and harvest strategies. Vance Wallace, local Game Warden, will discuss current legal aspects for hunters. Kent Mills, with Ezell Key Feeds, will discuss nutritional requirements of deer, compare feed supplements, and discuss different feeding concepts used with white-tailed deer. Greg Simons, professional guide with Wildlife Systems, will discuss hunting strategies through a guides perspective.

Regardless of your level of interest in white-tailed deer, this program has something for you. You won't want to miss this opportunity to learn more about the most popular big game animal in Texas. 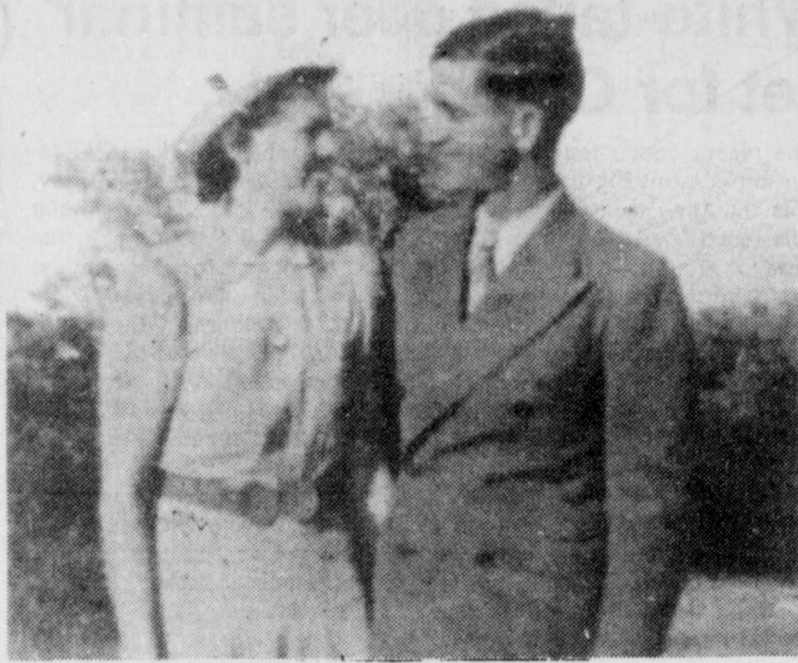

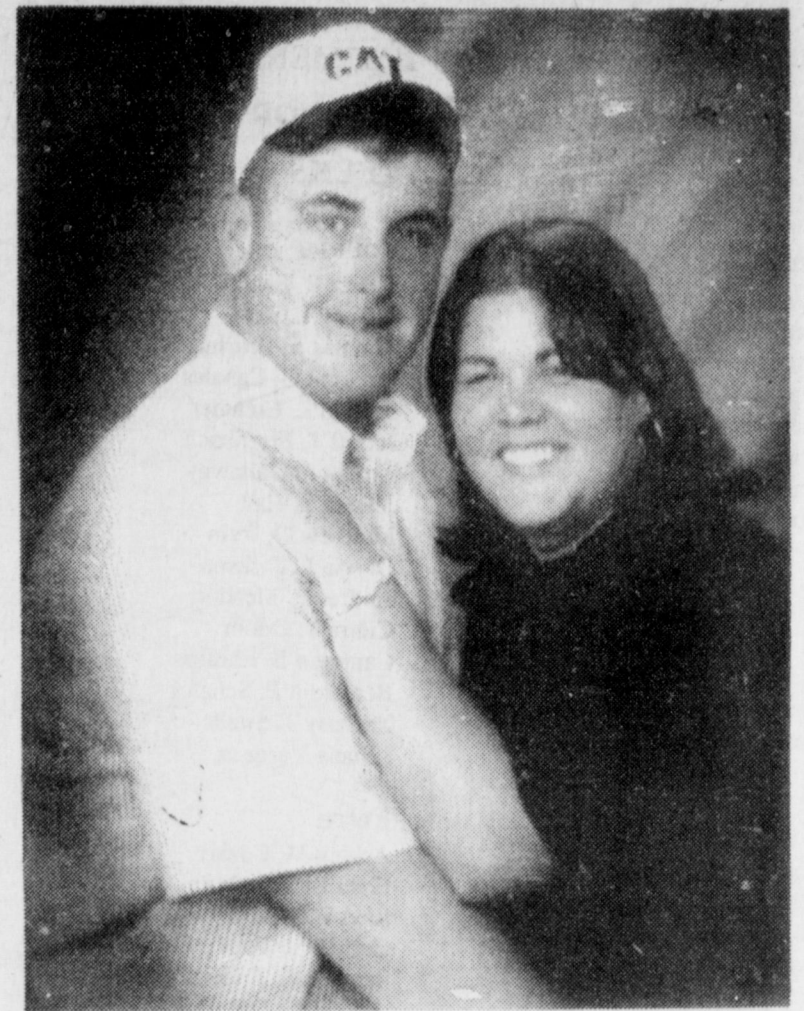
Contract commodity payment rates

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman today announced Production Flexibility Contract (PFC) final payment rates for fiscal year (FY) 2001. Eligible producers will share in total FY 2001 contract payments of approximately \$4.1 billion.

The Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2000, signed into law October 22, 1999, by President Clinton, provides farmers greater

flexibility in the timing of receiving their PFC payments. Producers may request to receive payments during any month from October, 2000 through September, 2001. Those who do not choose a payment option will receive their full payment near the end of that period.

Producers should contact the Farm Service Agency at their local USDA Service Center to receive information regarding selecting payment options.

USDA announces peanut market assistance program

Keith Kelly, Executive Vice President of the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC), announced on October 6, 2000, that peanut producers will receive an estimated \$61 million to partially compensate them for continuing low commodity prices and increasing costs of production for the 2000-crop year.

"This assistance will help producers who have been hit with a series of natural disasters over the past couple of years which reduced peanut production and caused a loss of income for producers," said Kelly.

Sign-up for peanut producers began at their local Department of Agriculture Service Center or farm Service Agency county office on October 2, 2000, and is set to end on February 1, 2001. Eligible producers include anyone producing quota or

additional peanuts during the 2000 crop year. Producers must have completed marketing of the 2000 crop before signing applications for payments.

The rate for calculating payments is \$30.50 per ton for quota and \$16.00 per ton for additional peanuts. The amount of payment will be the product of the quantity of quota and/or additional peanuts produced or considered produced for the 2000-crop year times the payment rate for quota or additional peanuts as applicable.

Where there were temporary transfers of peanut quota in the fall, both parties will be compensated at the quota rate for the pounds transferred.

Stenholm priorities included in defense bill

Washington, DC—Congressman Charlie Stenholm praised the passage of the National Security Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2001 (HR 4205) which was approved by the House of Representatives by a vote of 382 to 31.

"We owe a great debt of gratitude to both those who served our nation in the past and those who currently serve. One way that we can honor that debt is to provide high quality health care for military members, retirees, and their families," noted Stenholm. "The national security spending bill makes needed improvements which will help us meet that obligation."

The annual defense bill included several of Stenholm's funding priorities. The bill included major improvements in military health care. HR 4205 provides for an expansion of the military mail order and retail pharmacy programs to include military retirees over the age of 65. With a small co-payment, Medicare-eligible retirees and their families will be able to receive prescription drugs by mail or at their local pharmacy; these retirees will continue to have access to prescription medicines at no cost at military hospitals.

Other improvements for older retirees include a major expansion of the TRICARE program which has

been termed "TRICARE for Life." Beginning in 2002, military retirees will retain their access to the TRICARE program with no co-payments, deductibles, premiums, or enrollment fees.

Provisions from the amendment proposed by Congressman Stenholm were also incorporated in the final version of HR 4205. Those proposals will:

- Expand the TRICARE Prime Remote program to include family members of military members;
- Reduce from \$7,500 to \$3,000 the maximum out-of-pocket expenses paid by a retiree in the event of a catastrophic illness;
- Provide for reimbursement of travel expenses when a patient is referred more than 100 miles from home for treatment;
- Eliminate some preauthorization requirements for care; and
- Authorize the Secretary of Defense to increase reimbursement rates in areas where low rates affect access to health care.

The \$309.9 billion defense funding bill provides a 3.7 percent military pay raise which will take effect in January 2001 and includes funds to ensure that military members who are not provided with base housing will have to pay no more than 15 percent of their housing costs out of their own pockets.
