TOM TURKEY GETS A BLOW IN OLD TEXAS

HOUSTON, Oct. 31.-Texas turkey. raisers, with from \$6,000,000 to \$7,000,-000 worth of turkeys, are sitting with hands almost tied as the result of foot and mouth quarantines imposed by the other states.

Dressed birds are being shipped in from outside sections, according to G. T. Platt, state agent of organized cooperative associations, who with others is making an effort to obtain modifications of the quarantine.

Many states have quarantines which prevent the chipment of dressed turkeys from Texas to their territory unless the shipments are accompanied by certificates from government inspectors. It is impossible, according to Mr. Platt, to have government men inspect every shipment.
