> Dr. McAnalley is a PhD with a MD degree from Southwestern Medical School in Dallas. The subject of his presentation was "GlycoScience: State of the Science Review". Glycoscience is the study of the structure ad function of carbohydrates or sugar ("glyco") molecules in the body. Science has solidly established that cell-surface glyconjugates are key to the healthy functioning of the entire body.

This research has already begun to provide insight into the many new treatments for the auto-immune diseases as ADD-ADHD, Diabetes, Lupus, Fibromayalgia, heart disease and others. Science now understands that the common thread that connects all these many diseases is a breakdown of cell communication in the body.

The raw at which the human occuy ages is closely tied to cell communication or the lack thereof. Dr. McAnalley has shown that the presence of these eight monosaccharides on the cell surface provide the "language" by which the cells communi-

Dr. McAnalley referred to a study in 1998 by Brockhausen that addressed the association of many cancers with changes in the glyconjugates at the cell surface level. Cystic Fibrosis and inflammatory diseases, such as Rheumatoid Arthritis, Osteoarthritis and Chron's disease are all associated with alterations in glycoforms.

In March of this Science magazine, one of the top four science publications of the world, published several scientific articles on Glycobiology. One article referred to the glycobased vaccine developed to control bacterial produced meningitis in children. This form is fatal to 10 percent of the children that contract the disease. This glyco-based vaccine is a giant step in Glycobiology but it is an artificial means of supplying the body with nature's monosaccharides that should come from our diet through glyconutritionals before the bacteria arrives.

In this same issue Science is a study done by the Department of Biochemistry, Imperial College of Science, Technology and Medicine, London, England on the same eight monosaccharides that Dr. McAnalley is covering in his Composition of Matter


Callahan County Water Supply Corporation under Drought Contingency Plan

Dear Editor:




Three generations guilty of pushing heroin." So read the AP headlines which went on to tell of a grandmother, mother and daughter receiving jail sentences for pushing heroin in Massachusetts. The grandmother, sixtyeight, took orders for the heroin over the phone from customers of her daughter, forty-six, and then the younger one, eighteen, delivered the goods. Though in this case it seems the one in the middle of the three generations was the "ring-tail leader," it's nothing uncommon for the bad habits and even criminal characteristics to be handed down from generation to generation to generation...





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Rowden Baptist Church (**Builds New Sanctuary**

Rowden Baptist Church is in the final stages of construction of a new Sanctuary approximately 1200 square feet in size and seating approximately eighty

The old Church building has served well, but in the spring of 2001 the congregation voted to build a new Sanctuary. Funding for the building addition, approximately \$25,000, was raised by donations from Church members, friends and memorial

The new Sanctuary addition is ocated on the northside of the old building and construction has progressed rapidly. Most of the construction has been volunteer labor by members of the congregation and friends. Officials are hoping for a completion date and dedication in late summer.

The older portion of the Rowden Baptist Church will continue to be used for Church activities as well as a Community Center for the Rowden area

Rowden Baptist Church holds services at 11 a.m. each Sunday morning.

In 1896 the Antioch Baptist Church was organized when Brother R.D. Carter and A.T. Ford, a licensed Baptist minister, met with persons of the Rowden community to constitute a New Testament Church. Among those present were T.Z. Pool, J.L. Hood, W.A. Sikes, sisters Nancy and Cora Pool, Etla Hood and Belle

This group adopted the Articles of Faith and Church covenant. Brother R.D. Carter declared the group to be a New Testament church. Antioch became the name of the church.

The next recorded meeting of the Church was in 1897. Brother M.S. Whatley conducted services with conference following. Fannie Maltby joined by letter. A committee was formed to seek a pastor and Brother A.T. Ford accepted the call as Antioch's first pastor. In the next conference teachers and officers were elected for a Sunday School.

Records indicate that in 1904 contributions were made to Home Buckner's Orphan Home. The Church became known as a missionary Church. The first Deacons appointed were W.A. Sikes and E.F. Shelton. Antioch Church hosted the annual Associational Meeting in 1917.

Highway 36 was built through the community and the Antioch Baptist Church under the pastorate of E.L. Redden voted in conference to move the building to the southside of Highway 36. The Church's name was changed to Rowden Baptist Church.

Church records are not complete in the years since the Church began, but some of the Church clerks were Annye Miller, Jessie Odom, Vernie Beile Mauldin, Flora Swafford, Ima Gibbs, and Joyce Odom. Later pastors were Clifton Hancock, Charlie Myrick, W.J. Farley, Dan Applin and W.E. Nowell. Brother Nowell was pastor when, in conference, the Church voted to disband in 1962, and give the building to be used as a missionary Church by other Churches in the County. A Cross Plains church moved the building into Cross Plains and it served as their missionary Church for several years. They voted to sell the building which now is the home of the Cross Plains Garden Club.

The present Rowden Baptist Church building which is located on Highway 36 twelve miles West of Cross Plains was once owned by the Bayou School District.

Bayou School had small houses' called teacherages, for school instructors to live in while they taught at the school. They were the smaller school buildings from the consolidated area and the present Rowden Baptist Church was one of those buildings. It was moved to its present site sometime after the closure of the Bayou School and has served as a Community Center for the small Community.

The Bayou School was situated in the central part of Callahan County twelve miles south of Baird, in the southwest corner of the crossroad formed by State Highways 283 and 36. It was named Bayou, due to its proximity to the Pecan Bayou. The Bayou School District was formed in 1937 by consolidation of five county schools of that general area: Rowden, Oak Lawn, Gilliland, Bayou and Hillside and encompassed 103 square miles.

The Bayou School enjoyed 12 years before succumbing to another consolidation and graduated its last class in 1949. Hundreds of students attended, but only one student Carl Mauldin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Mauldin of Rowden received his entire public education at Bayou.

In an ironic twist, Carl Mauldin (the only person to go to school all 12 years at Bayou) is the present Pastor of the Church. He, along with some Rowden residents decided to reestablish the Rowden Baptist Church in March of 1999.

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
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Chicken Stories, Part III Ruling the roost...

The hens were happy running around the barnyard with the goats. We let them have their favorite rooster among them. He was our favorite rooster, too. He kept the hens calm and productive and feeding. And he didn't come at us with spurs jangling when we came in to

A couple of extra roosters roamed the fields freely, enjoying life without bothering the hen colony.

Everything went along smoothly until one day we noticed the rooster walking around with a decided list. Maybe he was old for a Rhode Island Red. It may have been nerve damage or a stroke, but he went steadily downhill over the next few days

Third annual sales tax holiday is August 3-5

AUSTIN-Just in time for backto-school shopping, many clothes and shoes can be purchased taxfree August 3-5, during Texas' third annual Sales Tax Holiday, Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced.

and Sunday of August, no state or local sales tax will be charged on most clothing and footwear priced under \$100," Comptroller Rylander said. "The Sales Tax Holiday provides much-needed tax relief for hard-working Texas families and lets them stretch their budgets a little farther as they shop for school

clothes for the kids and work clothes for mom and dad."

This year, the Sales Tax Holiday is expected to save Texans \$31.2 million in state sales tax and \$8.4 million in local sales taxes. Cities have the option to not waive local "On the first Friday, Saturday sales tax during the tax holiday, but no community has opted out of the event this year.

The rules for the 2001 Sales Tax Holiday are the same as in previous years. They include:

·Most children's and adults' clothing and footwear priced under \$100 are exempt from sales taxes. Customers may purchase as many tax-exempt items as they wish.

·Clothing and footwear used primarily for athletics or protective wear, such as golf cleats or football pads are not tax exempt. However, tennis shoes, baseball caps, jogging suits and other athletic clothes that are commonly worn on the street are eligible for the tax exemption.

 Accessories, jewelry, watches, handbags, wallets and briefcases are not tax-exempt.

• Items previously placed on layaway may be redeemed tax-free during the Sales Tax Holiday, and items placed on layaway during the Sales Tax Holiday may be redeemed tax-free later.

School supplies and backpacks

are not tax exempt. "Earlier this year, I asked the Legislature to expand the list of tax-exempt items to include backpacks, school supplies, sewing supplies and safety gear such as bicycle helmets and car safety seats," Comptroller Rylander said. "I also proposed expanding the tax holiday to five days to avoid the three-day traffic jam.

"However, the Legislature did not make the Sales Tax Holiday a priority, and the proposal died. Next session, I will again urge the Legislature to make Texas families and the Sales Tax Holiday expansion a top priority," Comptroller Rylander

During the first two Sales Tax Holidays in 1999 and 2000, Texans saved an estimated \$69.6 million, including \$54.8 million in state sales tax and \$14.8 million in local sales taxes.

Everyone said they enjoyed it so and they would be back next year. So if you missed this year, you missed a very good time.


