



pect of the organization of a Masonic Lodge in the near future; Presbyterian and Methodist promising school, and the usual compliment of professional gentlemen. The headlines in the Abilene Reporter-News, Monday, December 17, 2001, read: "Poll: Religion important to Texans but attendance at services lagging." It was both encouraging and discouraging at the same time. The article stated that "ninety-two percent of Texans say religion is important in their daily lives... "yet, "weekly attendance at religious services in Texas dipper four percent points since 1999 to 50 percent." It even stated that "50 percent is a high attendance rate compared with a national rate of approximately 40 percent"-and that it "is well above the 33 percent the poll recorded in 1997."
