

CLOVIS, Oct. 10.-Despite his early arrival in this city, hundreds of citizens gathered at the Santa Fe station this morning to hear Charles W. Bryan, Democratic vice presidential nominee in his first speech in New Mexico incident to his swing through the West. 



Slaying of Animals Only Way to Combat Foot and Mouth Disease

So that readers of the Journal will e able to detect the foot and mouth lisease should it appear in this terriory, the symptoms are herewith giv-

Destruction of infected animalshorough disinfection of the premises and rigid quarantine-these are the only methods found effective in fightng the foot and mouth disease.

According to "Diseases of Animals" book by L. H. Bailey, the foot and nouth disease usually starts with a The animal remains by itchill. self, the back is arched, hair erect, flanks tucked in, and there is shivering or twitching of the muscles. The mouth is often so sore that the animal is unable to eat solid food. The olisters about the feet usually occur between toes and often cause severe lameness. One or all of the feet may be affected. After the blisters burst, raw sores result. In some cases the hoof may be shed.

When the diseased animals are slaughtereed, the carcasses should be buried deep or burned. Hides or wool should not be saved, nor should diseased carcasses or milk from a diseased animal be fed to other animals. It is a germ disease, but the specific




