TEN YEARS ADDED TO SILVER'S TERM

FOUND GUILTY OF ROBBERY WITH FIREARMS

By Brings in Verdict Today in Trial of Bryan.

IAN, June 7.—J. R. (Bob) today had an additional 10 years added to the term he served in state prison. The jury in district court here found guilty of robbery with firearms and assessed his punishment in years in the prison from which he escaped after having a sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

While a crowd of men and women packed every available space in the court room, Assistant Attorney General R. D. Cox, Jr., opened argument for the state, followed in order by J. G. Minkert, Bryan, for defense; District Attorney A. T. McKinney, Huntsville, for state; Mack Gates, Huntsville, and F. L. Henderson, Bryan, closing for the state.

Asking the death penalty, which Silver escaped by only a few hours last fall when Governor Moody commuted his sentence to life imprisonment, state's attorneys argued that Silver and his companions had taken a car from two Sam Houston State Teachers college students at the point of a gun, that they were desperate men and that if necessary they would have resorted to violence, even death, to gain possession of the auto in which they made their escape to Houston.

Defense counsel termed the death plea ridiculous, pointing out that the students, Miss Loretta Harrison, of Tule, and Miss Loretta Harrison, of Tule, who testified late Thursday for the state, had admitted that Silver explained he did not want the car, that he and his pals merely wanted a ride. They also pointed out that the only gun in the party was held by Robert Hill, who ordered "stick 'em up."

No testimony was offered by the defense, and Judge Davis gave his charge to the jury when the night session opened. The students were the only state witnesses.

Silver was given the death penalty for holding up Roscoe Wilson, Fort Worth theater cashier, in which Wilson was slain. After his sentence was commuted he was transferred to Wynne tubercular prison farm, a physician having said he was afflicted with that disease. He had been at the farm only about a week when he and four others dashed to liberty in a blinding rain storm.

The indictment of Silver and three others who are scheduled to go to trial in a day or so, followed an exchange of heated telegrams between state and Walker county officials.

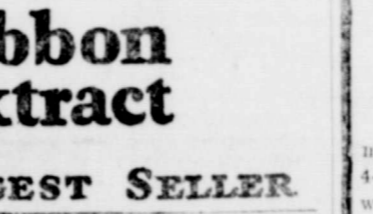
YOUNG PLAN IS ACCEPTED BY EXPERTS

By SAMUEL DASHIELL, United Press Staff Correspondent. PARIS, June 7.—The Owen D. Young plan, devised to settle finally and definitely Germany's world war obligations, was formally adopted today by the experts of Germany and her six creditor nations who have been working on the problem for four months. The Young plan was accepted by the experts late today, ready for transmission to the governments involved as a unanimous solution. Under the Young plan, proposed by the American financier who sat as chairman of the conference, Germany accepts a present cash obligation of approximately 37,000,000,000 gold marks (\$8,813,400,000), a gold mark being worth 23.25 cents.

ONE MAN IS ACQUITTED ON THEFT CHARGE

Dry Law Involved in Five of Case Tried This Week.

Five convictions and one acquittal were verdicts rendered in 88th district court this week, Judge Elzo Been presiding. The prohibition law was involved in five of the cases.

Dave Collins, charged with the possession of a still for the manufacture of liquor, was given a one-year sentence in the state penitentiary. Collins' counsel has appealed his case to the court of criminal appeals, and he was released on appeal bond. C. F. Roberts of Ranger faces a two-year sentence on a charge of sale of a pint of liquor. He was sentenced Tuesday.

Evidence was introduced to show that three men had met Robert on Wayland road in Ranger some time ago and matched coins to determine which of them should buy the liquor. The transaction was made, it was alleged.

Marshall Sentence.
L. E. Marshall was sentenced to one year on a charge of transporting liquor. Evidence introduced alleged that Marshall had made a trip by automobile from Putnam to Cisco, where he received a number of packages, according to Sheriff Everett Hughes and Deputy Sheriff W. A. Peters of Callahan county, who stated that they followed him. Upon his return from Cisco they followed him, it developed, and upon overtaking his car, he broke the "packages" with a hammer. Placing a bucket under Marshall's car, a convicting amount of liquor trickled into it from the "packages."

Otto Shelley was acquitted on a charge of theft from the person. Developments in court tended to show that Ernest Douglas had gone to Shelley's home with the alleged intention of buying liquor. When Douglas produced his wallet, Shelley snatched it from him and ran, it was alleged. The purse is said to have contained \$44.65.

A suspended sentence of one and a half years was recommended in the case of Edna Goodson, negro, charged with selling liquor.

Wayne Johnson, was given two years each on three charges of passing a forged instrument. He pleaded guilty. Evidence was introduced to show that Johnson had forged J. C. Maples' name to checks, writing on the checks, "For Work." It was said that Johnson had been working for Maples, and that he had received checks from Maples which were marked, "For Work."

J. C. Maples is the father of Hugh Maples, who was killed a few years ago, and for whose death Bob Mohler was convicted and sentenced to serve a 99-year sentence. Mohler has since escaped from the penitentiary and is now a fugitive from justice, according to County Attorney Joe Jones.

Laws Passed at Regular Session of Legislature Go Into Effect June 13; New Marriage Law Is One

AUSTIN, June 7.—Watch your step June 13. On that day the laws passed at the regular January session of the state legislature go into effect. Most thrilling is the new marriage law. Three days notice will be required before issuance of a marriage license. The prospective bridegroom will also be required to furnish the county clerk physician's certificate of his freedom from certain diseases. The three day rule would result in three marriageless days in Texas under a strict construction. County clerks, generally, however will accept the notice of intention before June 12 so there need be no hiatus. Buying liquor on Texas soil will not alone be unlawful after midnight June 12-13, but it will be an offense also to take a nip in an airplane, if the plane is one used as a common carrier. Drinking in motorbuses is also prohibited. Giving liquor to a person under 17 will become an offense punishable by jail sentence of not more than a year and a fine of not more than \$500. Whether the courts can stretch this law into an anti-petting law remains to be seen. Its terms provide that contributing to delinquency shall include any act which tends to debase or injure the morals, health or welfare. It specifically includes giving of intoxicants, taking to dance halls where improper persons congregate or causing a person under 17 years to leave home without the consent of a parent or guardian. Not Kidnaping. That Jack Freeth, alias Jack Griffin, cannot be convicted of kidnaping, as he was charged, for leaving Texas with 16-year-old Fannie Lee Minter, is shown by the emergency clause to the new kidnaping law which becomes effective June 13. This clause prints out that the courts have decided it is not a kidnaping to take away a person over 14 with that person's consent. Fannie Lee insisted she went with Freeth willingly. Taking any person away who is under 17 regardless of consent is made kidnaping under the new law. Wife and child desertion will become a felony. Going upon premises after dark to entice away laborers will become a punishable offense. The law was passed to stop rival labor contractors inducing cotton pickers to leave. Taking cotton or cotton seed in an amount less than \$50 becomes an offense. A distinction will be made between drug stores and pharmacies June 13. Places which merely sell patent medicines will be drug stores. Those which compound drugs and fill prescriptions will be pharmacies. The signs of the latter must so designate and the sign cannot be used lawfully unless a registered pharmacist is employed. A stricter optometry law also becomes effective. Blacklisting will be prohibited and it will be punishable after June 12 for election officers to fail to make correct and prompt returns. Motor trucks operated for hire will have to be registered and comply with provisions to be laid down by the motor division of the state railroad commission. The weights and measures law will have new teeth put in it, including a provision which makes giving of false weights or measures punishable even though the weigher does not buy or sell the article weighed. This is designed

Public Opinion Forced the Issue Public opinion is all powerful. Infellette of Wisconsin submitted a motion to restore the privilege of the senate floor to representatives of the press association. This motion was rejected by the rules committee. Now that the battle is on for the freedom of the press as well as the freedom of the people, which latter battle involved the right of the people to be given the record at all times of their public servants, there should be no let up on the part of those who believe in constitutional liberty and the open door in the halls of legislation.

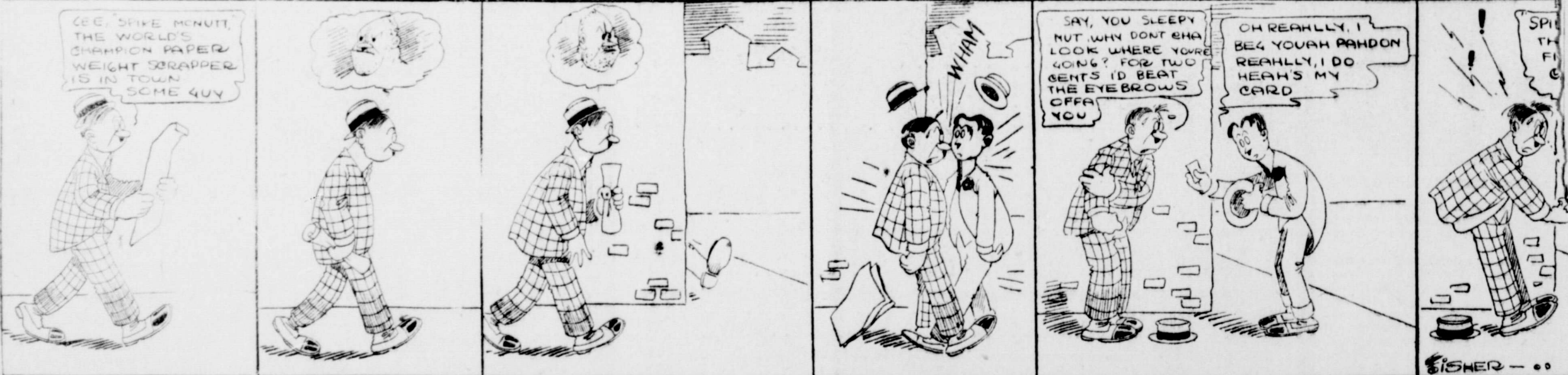

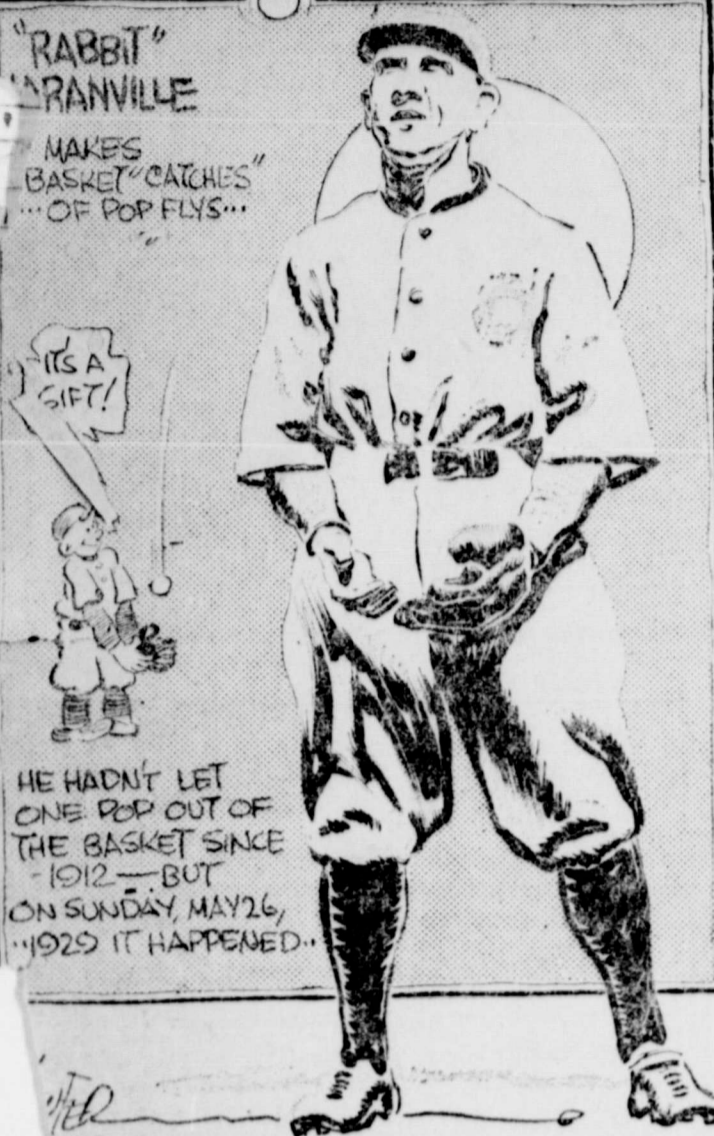
