tion to its possessor is \$72,000, according to a report made public today by Dean Everett W. Lord of the Boston University College of Business Admin-The report is based on a long study

of the earning capacity of college graduates. The cash value of a high school education is placed by the re-

The report gives the average maximum income of the untrained man as \$1,200; that of the high school graduate as \$2,200, and of the college graduate as \$6,000. The total earning of each of the three types, up to the age of sixty, are placed at \$45 000, \$78,000 and \$150,000 respectively. Dean Lord in his computation estimated also that while the untrained man at the age of 50 begins to drop toward dependance. the college man reaches his maximum earning capacity at 60.





THUNDER SOUR MILK? REFUTED BY SCIENCE.

Heat and the moisture-laden atmosphere, giving rise to the increase of cheese-making microbes, are responsible for the souring of milk before storms, according to Prof. A. D. Lynch of the Illinois agricultural association. Thunder has nothing to do with it, he declares. The hot, humid air before the rain often warms the cooling tanks and containers to a point where the bacteria multiply rapidly, giving the milk or cream the "off" taste frequently noticed, causing them to sour.

#### DIVERSIFIED FARMING.

North Dakota has reduced its grain acreage 2,733,000 acres since 1919.

If statistics were available in other states, a similar movement would very probably be revealed.

Diversified farming has absorbed practically all of the decreased grain acreage in North Dakota, just as it is doing in other states.

This is the solution of the farmer's problem in large measure. Too many of them have been farming just as their fathers and their grandfathers farmed before them.

There are limits, of course, to diversification. When one farmer goes in for something new and makes money at it, the tendency is for a large majority of his neighbors to try the same thing. The result will be the glutting of the market for that particular product, just as has been

the case with the grain market. Not all communities can follow the same plan, but there is a wide variety of marketable crops available for all soils and farmers who have given some thought and study to the crops they grow are the farmers who have made a success at it.
