OLD ORCHARD, Me., June 13 .- After the Yellow Bird had taken off on its proposed flight to Paris today, reports sprend that an 18-year old stowaway was aboard the craft. It was not immediately possible to confirm the rumor.

Two Portland youths, Robert Drew and Raymond La Pointe, said that their chum, Alexander Jordon of Portland, had secreted himself in the Yellew Bird's cabin and had not been discovered before the takeoff. Persons connected with the flight doubted the rumor, however, pointing out that Lotti sits in the main cabin and that it would be almost impossible for anyone to conceal himself in any part of the craft.


The Green Flash, a third of a mile from the starting point at the north end of the beach, was edging toward the water when suddenly both wheels sank in the sand.
