## MILLER AND LOVE CLASH THREATENED

### Sergeant-at-Arms Interrupts Heated Argument

AUSTIN, July 2.—Proposed congratulation of Texas Congressman John G. Box for his demand that Democratic party control be wrested from John J. Raskob brought a clash in the closing session of the senate today which sergeant-at-arms interrupted.

The resolution congratulating Congressman Box was offered by Senator Tom Love of Dallas and Senator Hyer of Fort Worth. Opposition was made by Senators Miller of Weatherford and Williamson of San Antonio. Love's seat and Love's seat are side by side with one interrupting desk.

Miller declared he would rather be aligned with "Goose-neck Bill" than with "Love and De Priest."

Distance between the two senators was gradually diminishing.

Miller was advancing toward Love's desk. Love took off his glasses and pulled up his sleeves.

"Let 'em go!" was shouted, but sergeant-at-arms intervened.

Senator Gus Russek of Shulenburg was elected president pro tem of the senate to serve until the next session. Booms for both Ernest Cox of Corsicana and Fred Misor of Denton for speaker of the next house were started in that branch.

The house voted to have Appropriations Chairman John Wallace stay in Austin for a week after the session ends. This will enable him to confer with Governor Moody when the bill goes to him for approval or veto of the items.

Ex-Senator Robert Stewart, district attorney of Tarrant county and one of the outstanding orators of the state, will deliver a patriotic address at 7:45 Thursday afternoon at Lake Cisco in connection with the annual Fourth of July celebration. Senator Stewart's address will be delivered from the island and his voice will be carried to all parts of the area over the public speaking amplifying system that will be installed.

Mr. Stewart has been prominent in state political circles and two years ago was widely mentioned as a candidate for governor.

## POLO NOT NEW GAME, GEORGE H. COYLE SAY

### "Sport of King Originated in Ind Long Ago"

"Polo is a king's sport," is the opinion of George B. Coyle, owner of the People's Ice Co., here, a dealer in polo ponies. "It is one of the most fascinating American games and is rapidly becoming the international sport. Polo is not a new game. A hundred years or more, it has been the Englishman's hobby, but it did not originate in England. Due to the lack of horses, money, etc., it did flourish in India as it did continue to do in England today. It has more players, horses, and more matches than any other nation."

The continental countries have little interest in polo though France perhaps more than the rest. Through England the game was introduced into America some fifty years ago. Taken up enthusiastically by the New Yorkers, Long Island now boasts the best field, the best players, the best matches, and as fine horses as can be found in the world. Polo in Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, or any other city is fifty per cent behind that played in New York.

Won in 1909.

In 1909 the American team for the first time won the international polo cup. They retained the championship until 1914 when they were defeated by England. Winning again in 1920, they have continued to hold the championship in international polo.

A polo pony is born—not made, and yet training is one of the main essentials. An excellent pony may be ruined by poor playing or a bad rider, and likewise be improved by a good rider and good playing.

Influencing Factor.

An influencing factor on the horse as well as the game is the field. The New York field cost from \$50,000 to \$75,000 and hundreds of men keep the thick turf in perfect condition. The average field is 300 yards long and 150 yards wide, with goal posts, twenty feet apart at either end, and a twelve inch side board to keep the ball from rolling out of bounds. The teams, composed of four players each, line up in the center of the field facing each other. The referee throws the ball between them. The game is on with each team attempting to knock the wooden ball with their mallets to their goal. Played in eight seven and half minute periods, three minutes is given between periods for changing mounts, and a rest of five minutes between the fourth and fifth period. A dangerous ride, or any maneuver which might cause another player's horse to fall is penalized by a free shot at the goal by the opposite side. A polo player must be a good athlete and as swift and active as his pony."

## "JUKES" TO DO 55-FOOT DIVE BLINDFOLDED

### Many Features Are on Program for Water Carnival

A dive from the top of the big diving tower in the deep pool at Lake Cisco with his hands tied behind his back and his eyes blindfolded, will be the thriller to be staged by Jukes the "water clown" during the water carnival July 4, a part of the celebration to be carried out in connection with the annual West Texas Bathing Revue and Celebration. For this dive the tower will be raised 10 feet higher than its present height of 45 feet so that Jukes will dive 55 feet blindfolded and bound.

One has but to imagine the sensation of hurtling blindly through space, unable to check oneself, to realize what a thrill there is to such a stunt as this.

But this is but a small part of the carnival program. The big feature of the afternoon will be a one-mile marathon for a beautiful swimmers' trophy. There will be other stunts, such as "waking the greasy pole," an event that has always proven highly entertaining.

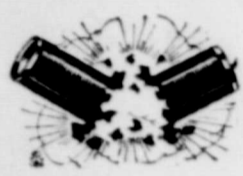

OUTBOARD RACING IS NEW SPORT

PARIS, July 2.—Swimming the English Channel, then rowing it and cycling it in equicycle have given place to the latest sport across the 21 miles of water.

The season for the new sport was recently inaugurated by the British Outboard Racing club and 36 competitors, including three young women, started out to cross the choppy channel.

While this first event was not as successful as had been expected, since the competing boats ran into fog and mist and several of them were lost for hours in mid-channel, the idea has appealed to the imagination of young French sport-

ing people who are preparing to organize races from France to England.

There are indications that the sport may take on bigger dimensions and perhaps lead to races in which countries even as far north as Norway might participate. For example, a British ex-naval officer is presently building a racing motor boat in which he hopes to cross the North Sea from Scotland to Norway, a distance of about 250 miles, during the daylight hours.

With interest in motor boating growing in Germany, Holland and Belgium, there is every indication that this sport will become the latest sporting fad over here and develop into serious tests of seamanship, speed and seaworthiness.

HONOLULU, July 2.—Two army fliers escaped death today when they parachuted to Wheeler field near here after their airplanes had crashed.

Lieut. Reuben Moffatt and J. T. Hutchinson, the pilots, were circling over the field at an altitude of 500 feet when the crash occurred. Hutchinson's parachute dragged him along the ground and broke his arm, but Moffatt was unhurt.

LONDON, July 2.—The Rev. Denham Rowe Norman, who has just celebrated his 101st birthday, is believed to be the oldest person in England. He was ordained in 1855, and retired from active service four years ago.

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
