AGENT CLAIMS MAN HAD GUN

SHAWNEE, Okla., July 5. One man was killed and another was critically wounded during a federal prohibition raid on a farm near Tecumseh yesterday.

Jeff Harris, federal prohibition agent, was in jail at Tecumseh as the result of the shooting late Wednesday. The dead man is James Harris, 35. The shooting took place on his farm. His brother-in-law, Oscar Lowery, 34, was wounded.

The raid was led by W. W. Thompson, veteran prohibition agent who has seen 20 years of service in the secret service and prohibition departments.

The arrest of the entire raiding party was first ordered by Ptt-man, but Harris was the only one arrested. Pitman explained further investigation was necessary before action, if any, would be taken against the other men. Other members of the raiding party were Tom Little and John D. Williams. Harris was to be charged with murder today, Pitman told the United

Remarks of Judge in Formally Sentencing Helms to Death

IN HIS HAND The following are the remarks of Judge George L. Davenport, of the 91st district court in formally sentencing Henry Helms, Cisco bank Farmer Shot Down bandit, this afternoon to death in Within Few Yards Davenport's first ocasion to senthe electric chair. It was Judge tence a man to death.

> The defendant, Henry Helms, will stand.

In this cause you were indieted by a grand jury with the offense of robbery with firearms, and thereafter in February, 1928, you were duly tried by a jury of Eastland county for said offense, after entering your plea of "Not Guilty." More than a week was devoted to the trial of your case. You were given every opportunity to present your defense to the court and jury. The jury, composed of representative men of Eastland county, after listening patiently to all the testimony presented, by their solemn verdiet found that you were guilty of the offense charged, and that your punishment should be death. After your conviction a motion was presented to this court by your able attorney for a new trial, and after being carefully considered was overruled, from which order you, through your attorney, appealed to the Court of of Texas, which court is contposed of honorable men learnfair and impartial in their decisions; that court, after hearing the argument of your State, devoted a great deal of time to the consideration of the record in your case, and have finally decided that you received at the hands of the trial court and jury a fair. legal and impartial trial, and that there was no error by the court and jury trying you, and after so finding, affirmed the judgment of this court. Since your case was affirmed your attorney has presented to the Court of Criminal Appeals your first and second motions for rehearing, these motions have been overruled, and your in all respects affirmed; you have therefore been accorded

Life to these good men was as dear to them as your today is to you. but without cause or a moment's warning they were shot down and brutally murdered. The money that was taken from the vaults of the bank at the time, through the prompt efforts of the officers and eltizens of Cisco, was soon recovered and returned to that in stitution; but these faithful officers cannot be brought back to life and to their families. You and your associates were not only responsible for the great sacrifice of human life, but endangered the lives of the throngs of people who were on the streets of Cisco on the afternoon of December 23, 1927. A happy throng, no doubt; mothers and children were there, it was a day of joy be-cause of the Christmastide. It

is hard to conceive that you would have chosen this day of all others to bring sorrow into any home, and hard to believe that you would compel innocent and defenseless children to accompany you in your esthat the jury assessed your punishment at death? It is indeed strange that any man ordinary intelligence would so forget himself and the rights of others to commit a crime such as you have been charged and convicted of First Time. This is the first time during nine years on the district bench

that it has become my official duty to pronounce the death penalty upon a man. I know not why a perverse fate should bring upon you the sentence of death; nor why it has selected me as the instrument to prenounce that sentence upon you. I can assure that to me it has meant sleepless nights and restless days, but I am convinced that the extreme penalty is justified from the record in this case and that you have received a fair trial at the hands of the court and jury, and that the records in your case was given fair and careful consideration by the higher court. But it is not my purpose to dwell longer upon the facts and circumstances connected with your case, it therefore now becomes the painful duty of this court to pronounce sentence upon you. Have you any reason to sur gest why the sentence of this court should not be pronounce ed? (Defendant given an opportunity to speak). IS FORMALLY DIE IN CHAIR Fateful Words Pronounced by Judge

In the dramatic hush of a crowded court room the sentence of death was formally passed upon Henry Helms this afternoon. The solemn pronouncement took place in the 91st district court of Eastland county shortly after 3 o'clock, Judge George L. Davenport, judge of

that court, sitting. Helms stood impassive throughout the reading of the decree. His face was pale, his head bowed, and his hands clasped an ordinary fan before him. He appeared not to hear the direction the court requiring him to stand before the sentence was read. Sheriff Virge Foster went to him, took him by the arm, and assisted him to his feet. He was handcuffed. He made no motion throughout the reading of the entence beyond to raise his head occasionally and look at the judge

When Judge Davenport asked him if he had anything to say he remained silent and motionless. He was taken directly from the court room to the jail by Sheriff Foster and two deputies.

Mrs. De Priest Not First Negro to Be Entertained in the President's Home

WASHINGTON, July 5. When Mrs. Herbert Hoover entertained Mrs. Oscar De Priest, wife of the negro congressman from Illinois, at the white house last month, she was following precedent observed by six presidents on at least fourteen different cocasions. Conciliation Commissioner

Karl Phillips, who has been delving into the history of interracial social contacts at the request of Secretary of Labor Davis, named Presidents Lincoln, Cleveland, Hayes, Grant, Roosevelt and Coolidge as chief executives who entertained negroes. He said his researches are incomplete. In 1864, near the close of the

Civil War, President Lincoln invited Frederick Douglas to dinner, Phillips said. At the "Great Emancipalor's" second augural reception in 1865, Douglas again was entertained at the white house. Certain historians, according to Phillips, have commented on Linoln's marked cordiality toward the negro.

A negro senator, B.

Bruce, was entertained by President Grant, according to Phillips, and Mrs. Bruce is said to have had members of the contemporary diplomatic corps in her home. The other instances Phillips

cited were: P. B. S. Pinchback, (one time governor of Louisiana) was entertained by President

Grant at the white house in Frederick Douglas was invited to the white house by President Hayes in 1878.

President Hayes, in 1878, was entertained by the president of

Howard university. On this occasion he met John M. Langsten, negro dean of the law school, upon whem Hayes called later at his home The minister to Haiti, in 1886,

was entertained by President Cleveland.

Frederick Douglas, in 1885 dined with President Cleveland at the white house, In 1963, Dr. Booker T.

Washington, principal of Tuskogee institute, dined at the white house with President Roosevelt.

Hon. John C. Dancy, recorder of deeds, and his wife were entertained at the white house
