Arrival of Foreign Minister Awaited at Nanking

SHANGHAI, China, July 16.—Reports from Nanking today indicate that the Nationalist government of China will not reply to Soviet Russia's 3-day ultimatum on the Harbin incident within the time limit set by Russia.

CHINA ASKS EXTENSION

LONDON, July 16.—The Exchange Telegraph agency's Riga, Latvian, correspondent reported today that China has requested the Soviet government for an extension of the 3-day period of the ultimatum on the Harbin incident, in view of the prolonged delay in submission of the Soviet note.

FEELING GROWING MORE INTENSE

MOSCOW, July 16.—Feelings are growing increasingly tense today which, according to the newspaper Izvestia in the "third day" ultimatum set by the Soviet note for China to render a satisfactory answer regarding the seizure of the Eastern railway at Harbin, Manchuria.

100 Per Cent Talking

Will Enforce Jim Crow Law

DALLAS, July 16.—William McCraw, criminal district attorney has expressed his willingness to take charge of the state's case if appeals are taken from the police court on charges of violating the Jim Crow law. The Jim Crow law has been upheld by the supreme court of the United States in a case in Louisiana and in the closing statement of the decision it reads as follows:

"If the civil and political rights of both races be equal, one can not be inferior to the other civilly or politically. If one race be inferior to the other socially, the constitution of the United States can not put them upon the same plane."

McCraw's statement was made following recent race disturbances in Dallas over the enforcement of the Jim Crow law, several negroes

regarding the "race signs" in local street cars here.
