High School Gets 1 and 1-2 More Units in Agriculture

ROBIN PLANE ATTAINS 390TH HOUR

FLIERS ADMIT WEAKENING OF SHIP'S MOTOR

Minnesota's Flight Ends in Crash; Crichton Killed

ST. LOUIS, July 29.—Flying plane, 4,660 feet over Lambert St. Louis field, the St. Louis Robin attained the 390 hour mark of its endurance flight at 1:17 p. m. today, lettering by more than 140 hours the mark it set out to beat two weeks ago last Saturday.

ST. LOUIS, July 29.—First definite admission that their Challenger motor was weakening came today from the Dale Jackson and West O'Brien, pilots of the St. Louis Robin, which at 9:17 a. m. had been aloft 386 hours.

"We know we have a couple of things weak. Has been that way the last 100 hours," said a note slipped to the refueling plane and apparently referring to cylinders of the power unit.

MINNESOTA CRASHES: CRICHTON KILLED.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 29.—Capt. L. Crichton, army flier, was killed and Owen Haugland, his co-pilot, was seriously injured when their endurance flight plane, the Minnesota, crashed on World-Chamberlain field here early today.

The crash came after more than 25 hours of continuous flying during which the performance of the monoplane's motor was pronounced perfect by field attendants. Crichton piloted the plane to within 300 feet of the field, dropped a note to the ground crew and as he zoomed away the craft tumbled, slipped into a spin and crashed.

Members of the refueling crew rushed to the plane and found Captain Crichton, his head badly crushed, dead in the cockpit. Haugland, who was believed to have been asleep at the time of the crash, was rushed to the Fort Snelling veterans' hospital nearby.

Gunmen Invade Inn; Take Money, Jewels

BLUE ISLAND, Ill., July 29.—Six gunmen, traveling in two automobiles, invaded Sparrow Inn, two miles south of here, early today. When patrons, who had been dining and dancing, were lined up against a wall with John Sparrow, the proprietor, they gave up \$600 in money and jewelry. Ninety dollars was taken from the roadhouse.



W. C. T. U. in Texas Makes First Move to Select Candidate It Will Support for Governorship

AUSTIN, July 29.—With just a year remaining before the voters of Texas go to the polls to vote in the state primaries, the W. C. T. U., headed by Mrs. Clyde de Van Watts, of Austin, president, stated today its annual campaign to select the candidates which it will support.

Mrs. Watts has sent out a letter to each of the avowed candidates for governor of Texas, asking that they answer a series of questions designed to show their stand on the question of prohibition and liquor law enforcement.

"We are especially interested," the letter read, "in the nomination of a candidate for governor in 1930 who, as leader of the party in Texas in 1922, will stand with us four-square against the nomination, or against the election if nominated, of any candidate for president who believes with former Governor Smith that prohibition is unrighteous, dishonest, and the foe of the American home, and who with National Democratic Campaign Chairman John J. Rascob believes that it is the duty of the Democratic Party to rid the country of the damnable affliction of Prohibition."

NEW CREDITS RAISE NUMBER OFFERED TO 3

Places Total Count of Affiliation at High Mark

The high school division of the state department of education has granted Cisco high school an additional unit and a half in vocational agriculture, according to communication from Superintendent J. J. Youngblood, who is in Austin, today.

The inspector reported good work on the material submitted for affiliation. Mr. Youngblood states in the communication.

This additional credit and a half in vocational agriculture raises the number of units in this subject to three, and places the number of fully affiliated subjects in the high school in the neighborhood of 26, which is said to rank in number with all other foremost high schools in Texas.

Much good is expected to come to the vocational agriculture department through the addition of the unit and a half additional affiliation, according to E. H. Varnell, vocational agriculturist here.

One of the chief things of value the additional credit and fraction will do is to give those students taking all of the vocational agricultural work offered in the high school here that many more credits for a background to college vocational agriculture, says Mr. Varnell.

Short Course Opens With 3,000 Present

COLLEGE STATION, July 29.—The 20th annual farmers' short course opened at Texas A. & M. college here today with President T. O. Walton giving the opening address.

More than 3,000 people from virtually every section of Texas were registered, with 5,000 expected here today, as the week is over. Of this number 1,700 were farm girls and women.

The week's round of discussion will include talks on agricultural activities, including homemaking and other phases of interest for the girls as well as general agricultural subjects for the men and boys.

LEAVES ON BUYING TRIP.

Publisher of North Carolina to Show Latest Pajama Garb to New York Mayor

NEW YORK, July 29.—W. O. Saunders, Elizabeth City, N. C., publisher and leader of a movement to emancipate men from the rigors of conventional clothing in hot weather, prepared to don a pair of pongee pajamas today and go down to the city hall to show Hon. Jimmy Walker what is in the way of snappy and comfortable attire for a sultry July afternoon.

If the mayor approves the garb, or at least doesn't disapprove, Saunders will carry his campaign directly to the "man in the street," by venturing forth for a stroll on Broadway or Fifth avenue, he said.

Saunders had no notion at first of launching a "pajama campaign." He started by simply donning them at home after a day at the office, wearing them at dinner and even for a motor ride with his family at night. Only when his garb began to attract attention did it occur to him that he might be a benefactor of mankind by spreading his gospel.

On the train returning from the Democratic convention at Houston, Texas, last summer, he recalled, everyone but he was miserable with the heat. He declined to wear more than his pajamas and a pair of slippers.

THIRD WEEK'S WORK ENTERED BY FARM BOARD

By WELLS CHURCH. WASHINGTON, July 29.—The federal farm board entered its third week of activity today. Its efforts scattered for the moment as one half of its membership is in Baton Rouge, La., attending the annual meeting of the American institute of cooperation and the other half were disposing of accumulated work.

The accomplishments of the board since its inception have been gratifying to the members, they say. The board's actions have elicited as yet little criticism, although Senator Brookhart, Republican Iowa, has stated he wishes to investigate the reasons for the board's secret meetings before the senate confirms its members next Monday.

The impression in some sections of the country has been that the creation of the board with its gigantic revolving fund would prove an immediate "cure-all" for the ills of marketing, producing, and surplusage. It was this impression that had other correct.

It was done in careful fashion, though the efforts of Alexander Legge, chairman, Vice Chairman James C. Stone, and Secretary Chris L. Christensen.

From the moment the board convened, appeals for assistance began to pour in from every producing center of the country. The first announcement of the board was one telling of the intended deliberate action in all cases. Next came the blunt statement that the board was in no position to make immediate loans.

This was immediately clarified by the statement, taken practically from the farm bill itself, that only properly organized cooperatives could secure loans and then only after all other lines of credit had been exhausted.

CABINET OF NEW PREMIER IS COMPLETE

Efforts to placate the opposition radical forces by including two of their leaders in the cabinet as ministers without portfolio failed. Herriot and Daladier, leading radicals, were invited to join the cabinet as ministers of state (without portfolio) but a party conference vetoed their acceptance.

Fire Stocks of Store

DALLAS, July 29.—Fire of uncertain origin destroyed the stock of the F. M. Hammond general merchandise store at Lancaster, two miles from here, early today. The one story brick structure which housed the store was also badly damaged. The building was situated in the center of the town's business section.

Loss was estimated at \$60,000. Volunteer firemen fought the flames with new equipment just purchased by the city and prevented the blaze from spreading to nearby buildings.

The Hammond mercantile establishment has been in existence in Lancaster for 40 years.

FOURTH DIES AFTER WRECK EXCITEMENT

C. B. & Q. Passenger Strikes Car at Grade Crossing

GALVA, Ill., July 29.—Three persons were crushed to death and one passenger on the train dropped dead of heart failure today when an eastbound Chicago, Burlington & Quincy passenger train struck an automobile at a grade crossing here.

Three killed in the automobile were Edward Temple, 60, a Galveston tanker; his wife, Margaret, 36, and Miss Dora Putson, a school teacher.

Finis Parr, 40, a bachelor of Charlevoix, Mich., was so excited by the crash that he dropped dead while standing on a vestibule of the train.

Walter Lennox to Receive B. S. Degree

Walter Lennox, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Lennox formerly of Cisco but now of Corstiana, will receive a Bachelor of Science degree from Texas Christian university with the summer school graduating class on August 6.

He has specialized in biology and chemistry at T. C. U. and was a member of the Horned Frog band of the university.

Thirty-one candidates are announced as constituting the August graduating class of T. C. U., 24 for Bachelor's and seven for Master's degrees, which in addition to the 145 who took degrees in June will bring the total for the year to 176.

Deep Oil Test Rig Erection Is Begun

Erection of the rig on the drilling site of the proposed 4,000-foot deep test, to be operated by J. A. Bertman, et al., has begun.

Work is expected to progress rapidly and actual drilling will begin within a few days, according to plans. The site is one-half mile north of the city limits of Cisco.



