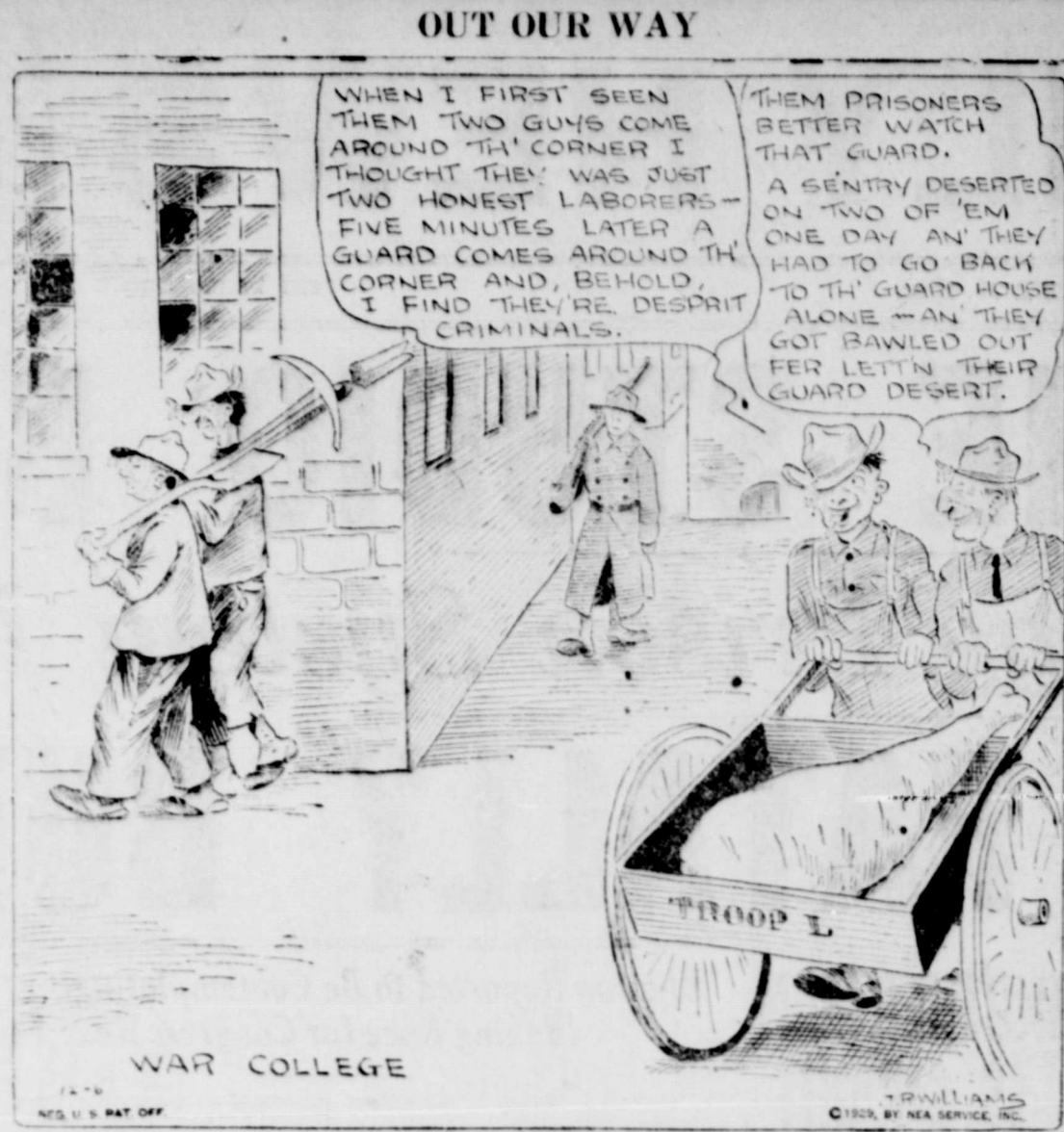

# Randolph Kittens Have Strong Lineup for Next Season

## MANY NEW PLAYERS OUT FOR SEXTET

### Prospects for Another Successful Season Are Bright.

Randolph college Kittens winners of the Southern A. A. U. championship at Dallas last year and semi-finalists in the national A. A. U. tournament at Wichita, Kansas, have returned to campus with a strong prospect for a season equally if not more successful than last when they won national recognition, placing one player on the all-American selection, the only college team to do so. The girls are showing up in practice sessions splendidly.

Although only two of last year's regulars are back for the team this year, the squad has been augmented by many new arrivals counting among them several all-state players of last year. The two regulars of 1929 are Thelma Russell, all-American guard, and Deima Fulmer, who was mentioned for all-American center and who is captain of the team for this season. The strong list of reserves of the championship team of last year are returning Morrison, Darnell, Peay, Allen, Teddie and Hombre.

New arrivals include: Greenlee and Russell, of the state championship team, all-state center and guard respectively; Kirby, Colorado high; Patterson, of Dalhart, all-state guard; Camp, of Post, forward; Johnson, Dublin, Smith, of Eastland, and others.

Randolph college is the only college in the United States to place a paper on the all-American selection last year. The team has never been defeated by a college team in the three years that Coach H. R. Garrett has been coaching the team.

The team has before it this year the hardest schedule that it has ever had, a schedule that will carry it from Texas through Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, Kansas, Tennessee and other states. The first game will be with the Golden Cyclones, of Dallas, January 10.

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—Mr. Arthur Shires, who claims crestfallen in various lines of athletic endeavor, last night essayed to show his "public" that he is a pugilist. If he is "greatness," it must be admitted that he is the "Great Shires" he himself claims to be. It took the said Mr. Shires, who was making his debut as a professional pugilist, exactly 21 seconds to end a fight with one Dan Daly of Cleveland who had never been heard of before in these parts.

Shires, who plays a good game at first base for the Chicago White Sox, achieved considerable reputation as an amateur pugilist last summer when he twice blacked out the eyes of Lena Blackburne, knocking over a "palooka" entitled "Palooka" who was supposed to be the "Great Shires." In fact, this pugilist's ability, combined with his egotism, last night was responsible for the sell-out house which greeted Promoter Jim Mullen when he looked over his White City arena. Mullen did. For him, who has paid out more money for room and board for the boys than perhaps any other fellow in town.

## FOUL WINS SCOTT BOUT AT GARDEN

### Crowd Boos Method of Englishman in Triumph.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Otto Von Porat of Norway, found loser on a foul in the second round of his bout with Phil Scott of England last night, was taken closer to the heavyweight championship today than was his discredited opponent who left the ring with the boos and cat-calls of a record throng in Madison Square Garden ringing in his battered ears.

Scott, brushed by a long sweeping left while in full flight from Von Porat at the start of the second round, hesitated a moment and then flopped to his knees and rolled in the resin. The blow was palpably low, but its force had been spent, and Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight champion, who was refereeing the widely advertised fight, felt certain it hadn't harmed the Englishman.

## When They Are No Longer Good? What Becomes of Automobile Tires

Pop! S-ss—Bump-bump-bump—and another ruined tire is consigned to the junk pile to be resurrected in the form of shoes, according to an article recently appearing in a San Angelo paper. These shoes, the article reveals, are very much in demand by the people of Korea, Spain, China, Greece and other foreign countries.

Though a new industry of which little is yet known, it has become very profitable and worthwhile. Old tires are a welcome commodity to the junkman now for he knows there are distributors in foreign ports awaiting his supply and that ships bound for all parts regularly carry a load of discarded tires.

In making the rubber tcharik, the automobile tire is cut into appropriate lengths, and the canvas or canvas lining removed. The tread and heel of each strip is then fastened together with wire, and the canvas lining is used to make the tongue and strips with which the tcharik is fastened to the foot by means of a small buckle. The edge of the rubber near the toe is cut several times that the shoe may converge slightly. A narrow strip of the canvas is laced around the top of the shoe through small slits, and the rubber tcharik is completed.

French exporters usually offer their junk tires at from 50 to 60 cents apiece, freight prepaid on account of their nearness to Greece and the short hauling distance—a fact which makes tires of French manufacture more in demand than those from the United States. However, in 1928, the U. S. exports to Greece amounted to 40,000 pounds, valued at \$777.

## Iowa Alumni Will Take Some Action

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Dec. 10.—The Iowa alumni association of Cedar Rapids through its president, Judge Thomas B. Powell, has decided to take "definite" action on the ouster of the state university from the Big Ten. A meeting will be held here Friday or Saturday to discuss plans.

Taking a sharp issue with Judge M. L. McKinley of Chicago, Judge Powell denied emphatically that the alumni of Iowa have had any influence on athletic policies in the last few years.

## When They Are No Longer Good? What Becomes of Automobile Tires

Spain is another country whose natives have found rubber foot-wear, or the "abarca," as it is called, to be more economical and lasting than the rope-soled abarcas which have been worn by the Spaniards for generations. The abarca industry flourishes in small towns and villages of the interior and the products are exported to the United States, Great Britain, and the Netherlands. Last year, 12,413,895 pounds, valued at \$710,956 were shipped there by the United States.

In China, Korea, and Japan, likewise, the industry is spreading and the "tabi" or sandal worn by the coolies, now possesses a rubber sole cut from a tire. The peons and Indians of Latin-America and the peasants of Castile, Catalonia, and Andalusia have found that this latest fashion in shoes, the "zapata de caucho" to be much softer to their feet than the old leather sandals, and more protective against the sun-baked sands and the snow, sleet and rain of the mountain regions.

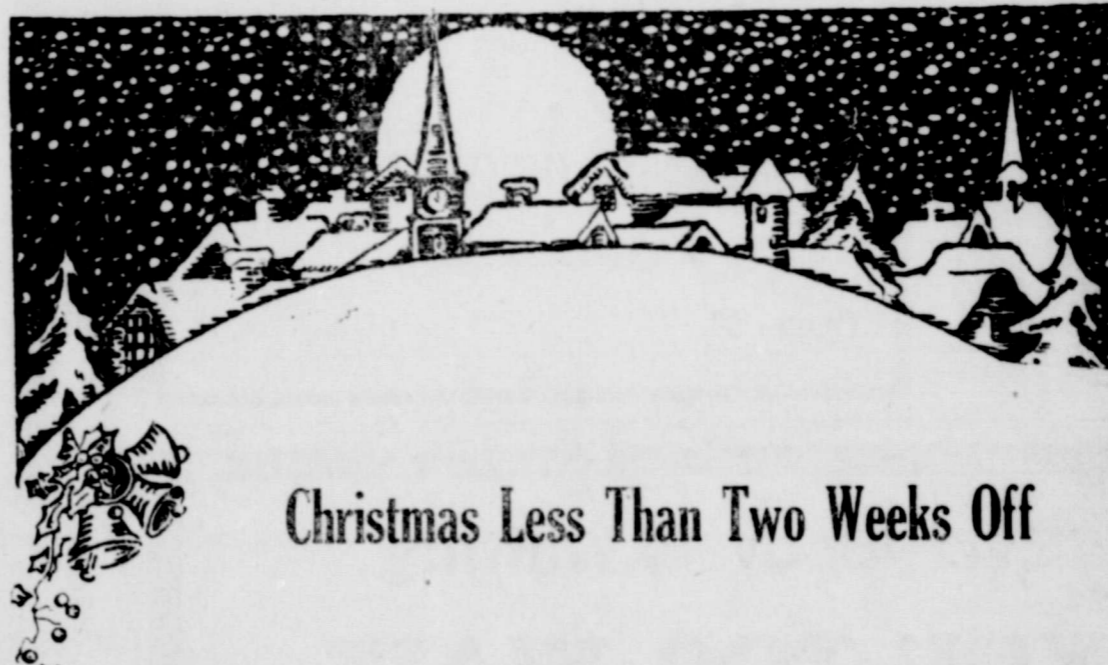

### EARLY XMAS BUYING CAUSES TRADE BOOST

DALLAS, Dec. 10.—Early Christmas buying has induced a boost in commercial circles during the first part of December, figures made public by statisticians revealed today. After years of effort, merchants at last have educated the public to shop early, they said.

Gov. Dan Moody's report of anticipated expenditure of from \$250,000,000 to \$350,000,000 in Texas during 1930 for building and public expenditures was the highlight of the month in state financial circles.

Frank admission from wholesalers of expected declines following the recent stock market crash were unfounded, it seemed today as 1929 business during the Christmas season in Texas is predicted to top that of 1928. Interest in scientific developments among farmers reported to be gaining a foothold. An increase in agricultural activity and production is expected to result. Dallas executives are preparing for the meeting of the country's leading manufacturers, business men on Dec. 9 relative to Pres. Hoover's recent industrial survey.

### Ciscoans Are Urged to Use Caution in Dealing With Fires During Holidays

Fire loss for the month of October in Texas amounted to \$911,691, according to City Fire Marshal M. H. Fleming who is in possession of a report compiled by State Fire Insurance Commissioner J. W. Deweese. The total for the first ten months of 1929 is \$10,526,348, he said, which is an increase of \$1,578,184 over the total loss for the first ten months of 1928.

The holiday season of the year said Mr. Fleming, is the most dangerous time for fires. Extensive decoration with flimsy material offers the fire germ a paradise of opportunity and the utmost caution in dealing with matches, fires, lighted cigars, pipes, cigarettes or with fire in any form about such decorations should be exercised, he said. Electric lights should be used in illuminating Christmas trees and every care should be taken to see that the wiring is in perfect shape. Several horrible tragedies have taken place because of defective Christmas tree lighting, he pointed out.

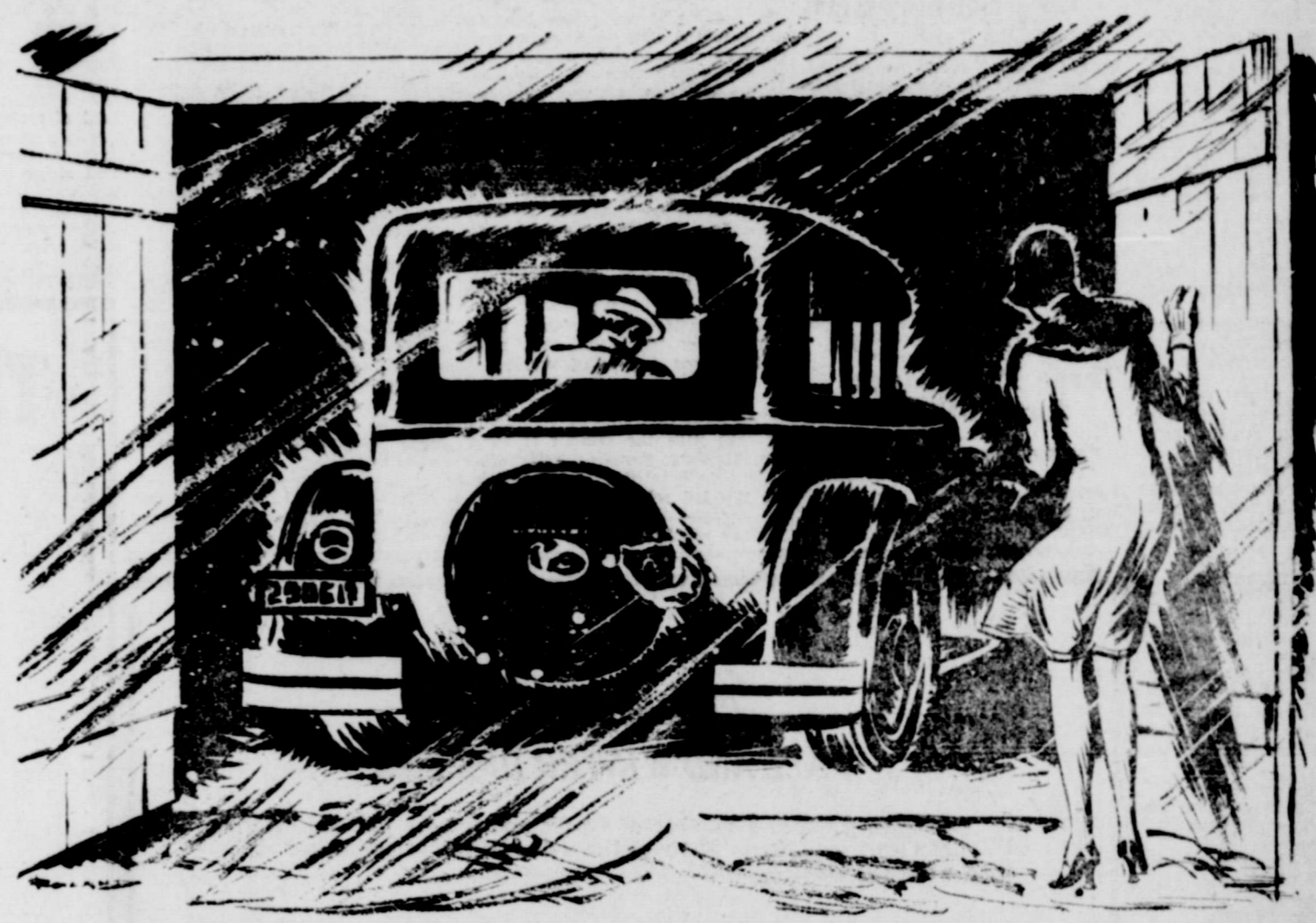

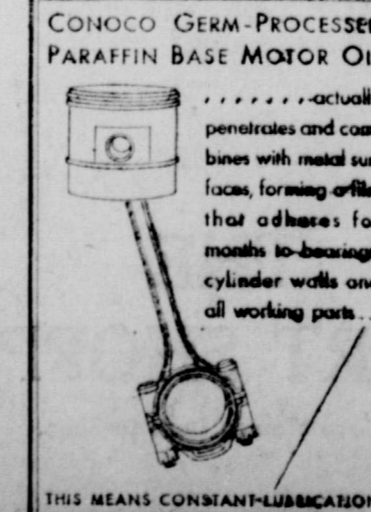

## When They Are No Longer Good? What Becomes of Automobile Tires

By LOUISE TRAMMELL  
Pop! S-ss—Bump-bump-bump—and another ruined tire is consigned to the junk pile to be resurrected in the form of shoes, according to an article recently appearing in a San Angelo paper. These shoes, the article reveals, are very much in demand by the people of Korea, Spain, China, Greece and other foreign countries. Though a new industry of which little is yet known, it has become very profitable and worthwhile. Old tires are a welcome commodity to the junkman now for he knows there is demand by the people of Korea, Spain, China, Greece and other foreign countries.

The Greek mountaineers' shoes are called "Tehariks" and were formerly made from an oblong piece of hide, 6 to 8 inches wide, shaped to the foot by turning up the sides of the strip. A leather lacing was placed around through all the edges. Now however, the rubber tcharik has almost entirely replaced this leather shoe, for though its weight makes it more tiresome to wear, it gives better protection from dampness and lasts from 5 to 12 months, whereas the leather lasts only from 1 to 2 months. Consequently, the former annual importation of from 30,000 to 35,000 cow and buffalo hides has been wiped out.

In making the rubber tcharik, the automobile tire is cut into appropriate lengths and the carcass or canvas lining removed. The tread and heel of each strip is then fastened together with wire, and the canvas lining is used to make the tongue and strips with which the tcharik is fastened to the foot by means of a small buckle. The edge of the rubber near the toe is cut several times that the shoe may converge slightly. A narrow strip of the can-

### EARLY XMAS BUYING CAUSES TRADE BOOST

DALLAS, Dec. 10.—Early Christmas buying has induced a boost in commercial circles during the first part of December, figures made public by statisticians revealed today. After years of effort, merchants at last have educated people to shop early, they said.

Gov. Dan Moody's report of anticipated expenditure of from \$250,000,000 to \$350,000,000 in Texas during 1930 for building and public expenditures was the highlight of the month in state financial circles.

Frank admission from wholesalers of expected declines following the recent stock market crash were unfounded, it seemed today as 1929 business during the Christmas season in Texas is predicted to top that of 1928.

Interest in scientific developments among farmers is reported to be gaining a foothold. An increase in agricultural activity and production is expected to result.

Dallas executives are preparing for the meeting of the country's leading manufacturers, business men on Dec. 9 relative to Pres. Hoover's recent industrial survey.

The Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad will spend more than \$7,000,000 improving its system in Texas, directors have announced. Improvements will include laying of heavier rails, elimination of grade crossings, construction of moving stock and the addition of automatic signals.

### Men Grow Smarter College Dean Says

EL PASO, Dec. 10.—Men are getting smarter. Women are getting dumber.

That fact is borne out by Dean C. A. Puckett's annual survey of the Texas School of Mines which has been forwarded to Pres. H. Y. Benedict of the University of

Texas.

The dean's figures show that in the first six weeks of the fall semester a year ago, 12.8 per cent of the women failed in one or more subjects, while this year in the same period their percentage of failures rose to 14.5 per cent. For the men, the failures fell from 35.9 per cent to 47.8 per cent.

### Ciscoans Are Urged to Use Caution in Dealing With Fires During Holidays

Fire loss for the month of October in Texas amounted to \$911,691, according to City Fire Marshal M. H. Fleming who is in possession of a report compiled by State Fire Insurance Commissioner J. W. Deweese. The total for the first ten months of 1929 is \$10,526,348, he said, which is an increase of \$1,578,134 over the total loss for the first ten months of 1928.

The holiday season of the year said Mr. Fleming, is the most dangerous time for fires. Extensive decoration with flimsy material offers the fire germ a paradise of opportunity and the utmost caution in dealing with matches, fires, lighted cigars, pipes, cigarettes or with fire in any form about such decorations should be exercised, he said. Electric lights should be used in illuminating Christmas trees and every care should be taken to see that the wiring is in perfect shape. Several horrible tragedies have taken place because of defective Christmas tree lighting, he pointed out.

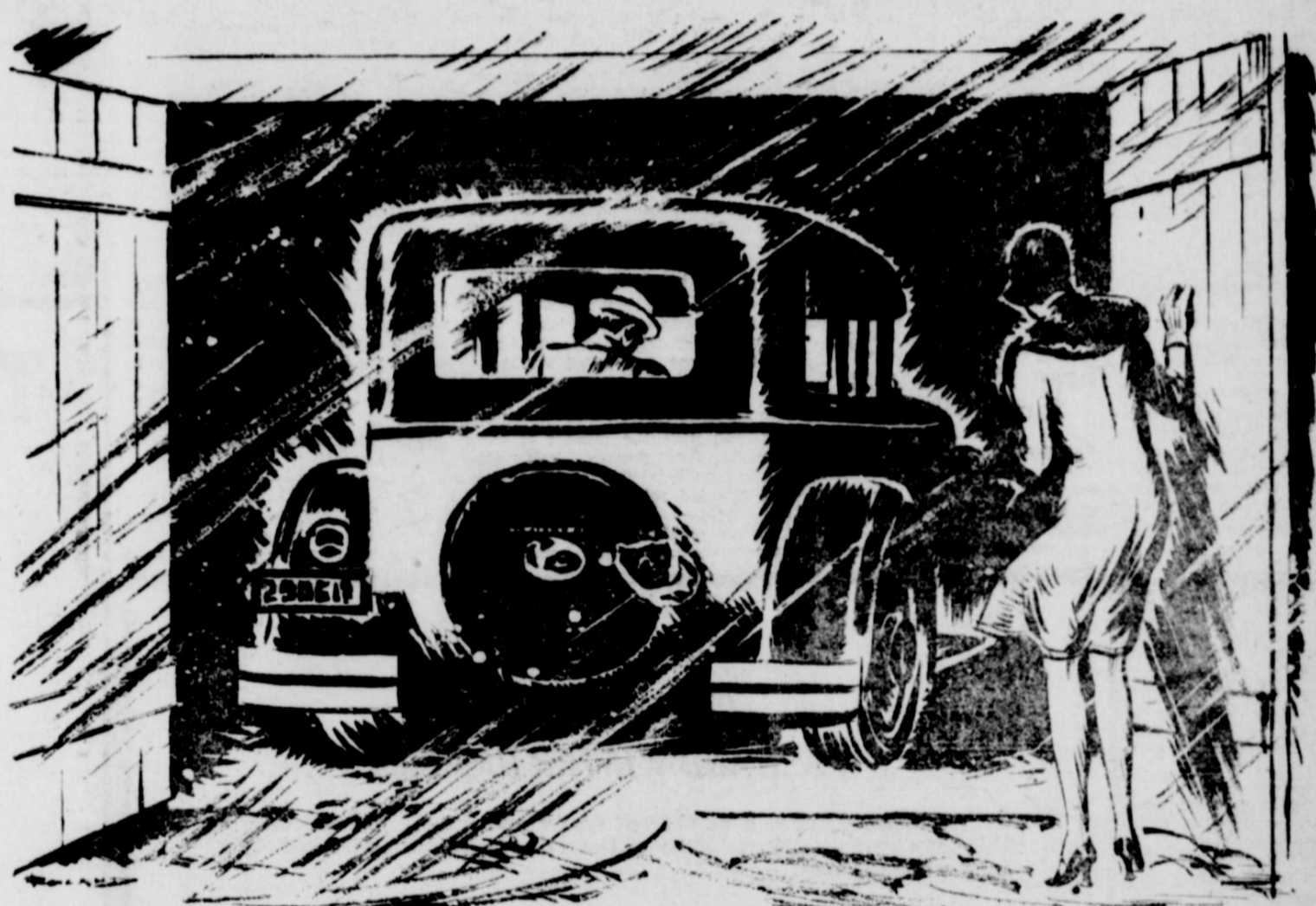

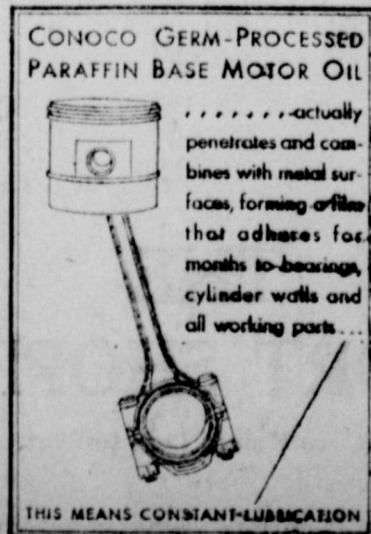
