"MURDERED" MAN FACES GRAND JURY

Hearing on Strange Case Begun This Morning

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Ark., Dec. 16.—Trial of four men charged with the murder of Connie Franklin, whom the defense claims is alive, was delayed today when the man who claims he is Franklin was brought before a grand jury for questioning.

Strangest Murder Trial in History

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Ark., Dec. 16.—With the "murdered man" sitting up front, the strangest murder trial in the history of American jurisprudence started in the picturesque stone court house here today.

Connie Franklin, alive or dead, is the issue. The trial of four men were at stake. A man who obtained a separate trial on the eleventh hour, relied on the defense of his comrades' defense as an indication of what his own would be.

Valls at Bay Over Arrest of Calles

LAREDO, Dec. 16.—John A. Valls, Webb county attorney who is known along the border as "the Lone Wolf of the Rio Grande," today stood at bay in his controversy with the federal state department over his threatened arrest of Plutarco Elias Calles, former president of Mexico, on a murder warrant.

Valls sent the following telegram to Henry L. Stimson in reply to the secretary of states' request that Calles be granted diplomatic immunity while en route to Mexico City through Texas.

"I thank you for your telegram," Valls wired, "except the part expressing astonishment at my contemplated action to arrest Calles. A government that has deliberately given diplomatic immunity to a fugitive from justice and has thrown its protective arms around the greatest exponent of Bolshevism in the Western Hemisphere should express no surprise at the honest efforts of patriotic officials to fearlessly enforce the laws of Texas.

"My government's conduct in this particular only postpones the day of reckoning when Calles will be brought before the public bar of justice to face a courageous judge and in inculpable jury in Webb county.

In the burial place, which was uncovered by scientists working under direction of the Rockefeller foundation and the geological survey of China was only one complete human skull, but this is reported to have been in splendid condition, with facial bones and perfect cranium.

ACCIDENT VICTIMS ARE IMPROVING

5 Young People Hurt When Car Becomes Unmanageable

All of the five persons who were hurt when the car in which they were riding became unmanageable and turned over on Eighth street at L. avenue Sunday afternoon were reported this morning to be improved. Miss Fay Clark, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. F. E. Clark, was the most seriously hurt of the five, sustaining a broken shoulder. Bruises and shocks were suffered by the others in varying degrees. They were taken to the hospital last night where they are undergoing treatment.

Occupants of the car, a Buick sedan, owned by Dr. Clark and driven by Fay, were Reeder Shugart, son of Rev. and Mrs. C. O. Shugart, formerly presiding elder of the Cisco district of the Methodist church; Fay and Lucille Clark, daughters of Dr. and Mrs. Clark; Louise Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Q. Clark, and Elta Brennan, J. Hollis Clark, brother of Louise, had left the car a short time before the accident occurred.

Louise, who suffered a head injury that rendered her unconscious for a time, has regained consciousness, hospital reports said.

The young people were returning from a meeting of the Epworth league at the Methodist church. According to accounts from witnesses, the car seemed to have developed a flat tire on a rear wheel and coming down the gravel street began swaying. An effort to apply the brakes was believed responsible for the car leaving the street and striking the curb at the intersection of L. avenue with Eighth street. The sedan plunged from the street into the yard at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Havner, 900 West Eighth, turning over and almost demolishing the top. Some of the occupants were thrown from the vehicle to the ground where they were badly stunned.

Woman Lived Hermit's Life for Science

CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—The germ that turned out to be the first known influenza causing microbe picked a golden-haired, twinkling-eyed young lady in which to make his temporary home.

For more than a year, before the epochal discovery and isolation of the germ from her blood stream by Dr. Isidore S. Falk, 30 year old University of Chicago professor, and afterward when proving tests were being made, Miss Ruth A. McKinney lived a hermit's life.

"She just lived for her germs," her students said of the modest and matter-of-fact young bacteriologist, who chose to isolate herself in the interests of science and humanity. "She gave up all her social life."

MAKE GOOD TIME ON HOP TO BRAZIL

Last Report Places Ship Half Way Across Ocean

PARIS, Dec. 16.—Lieut. Col. Tadeo Larre Borges was far out over the South Atlantic today on his flight from Spain to Brazil, officials advised received here said.

The French dispatch boat Belfort, carrying mail across the Atlantic, intercepted an hourly broadcast from the plane at 11:35 a. m. (6:35 a. m. C. S. T.). Indicating its position as 9.2 north 27 west, which is about 425 miles southwest of the Cape Verde Islands and more than one fourth way across the ocean.

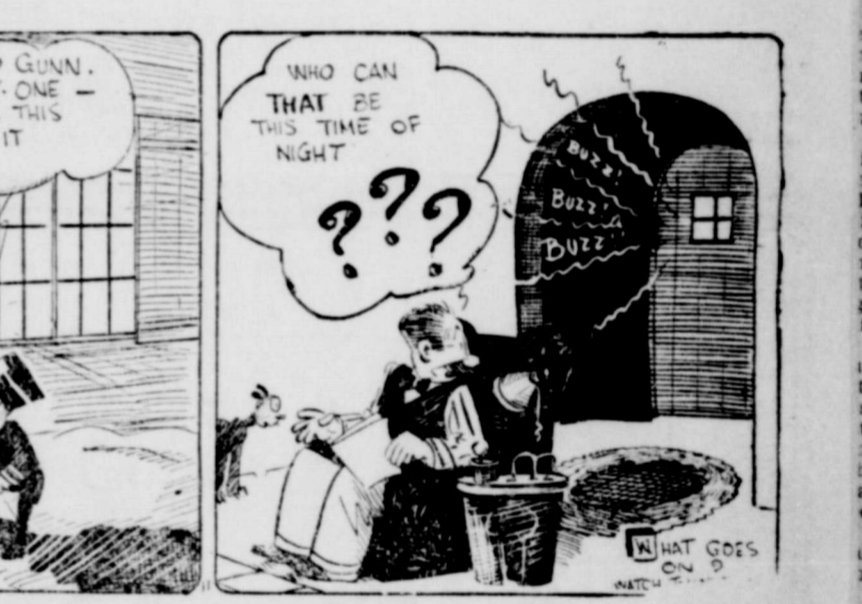

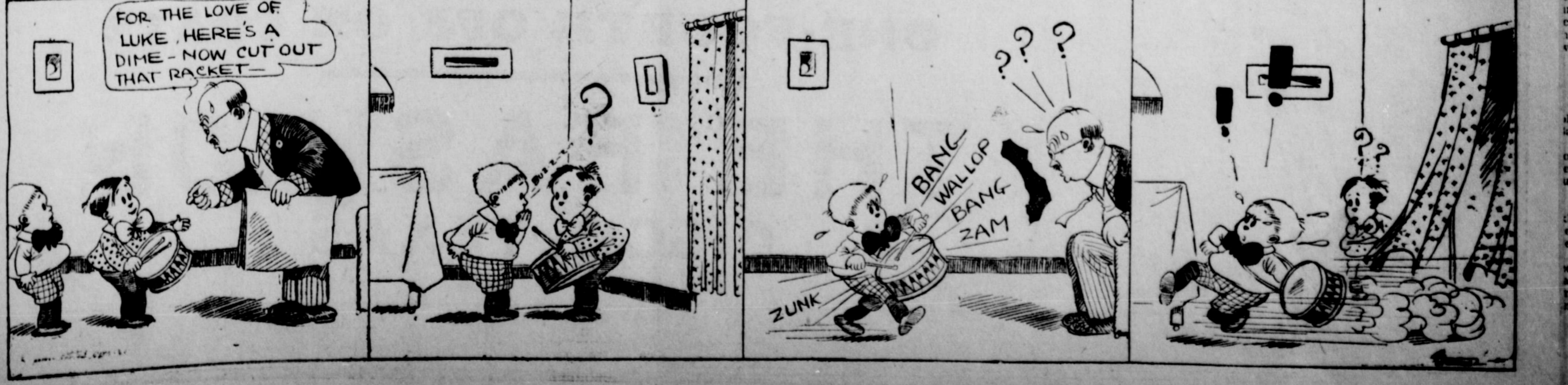

FAVORABLE BALANCE WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 - A favorable trade balance of \$109,000,000 for November and of \$730,404,000 for the first 11 months of the year was announced by the commerce department today.
