PREVENTABLE DISEASE.

Americans cannot fairly term themselves the most efficient people until they stop the present loss of three billion dollars' worth of human values through preventable disease

This estimate was made by Sir David C. Bruce, a world renowned parasitologist, in addressing the British Association for the Advancement of Science in Toronto last summer.

Infection, acute or chronic, by bacteria of parasites, is probably the most potent cause of disease, old age and death. Fortunately most of these infections can be dealt with if a physician is consulted in time. However, this doesn't mean waiting for signs of illness. The apparently healthy should occaionally be examined by physicians to detect departures from the normal that the tendency may be checked at once and illness obviated.

The whole thing is merely overcoming the present universal disposition to begrudge the doctor his fee unless he has remedied real illness. Doctors cannot work miracles upon people who have let disease get a real hold; but they can repair the leaks if given the opportunity.

We are now entering the period of the year when the disease and death rate climbs upward simply because most people regard colds, grippe and sore throats as unworthy of a doctor's

Several generations hence will practice the sound common sense doctrine of Sir David's, but meanwhile people will shorten their lives merely to save a doctor's bill for early and effective it possible to be restless sitting down. examination.—Independent.






