MRS. SHEATSLEY A SUICIDE, SAYS CORONER'S JURY

COLUMBUS, Dec. 4.-The Bexley furnace mystery, which for nearly three weeks has baffled county authorities and expert investigators, tonight had practically ceased to be a mystery with the filing by Coroner Joseph A. Murphy of his official verdict declaring Mrs. Addie Sheatsley, wife of a prominent Lutheran minister, ended her own life by casting herself into the heating furnace of the parsonage

In returning his verdict of suicide, the coroner desregarded the findings of experts who analyzed blood taken from the lungs of Mrs. Sheatsley and conducted other experiments to substantiate a murder theory.

AIRPLANES TO RACE SHADOW OF MOON FOR 400 MILES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 .- An airplane will race the shadow of the moon nearly 400 miles across New York state during the eclipse of the sun on January 24. Carrying a specially designed camera, photographs will be taken from the plane of the sun's flaming corona as made visible during the eclipse.

The purpose of the experiment, as worked out by Dr. David Todd, professor emeritus of astronomy of Amherst college, is to permit photographing for a longer period than the approximate two minutes for which the eclipse will be visible from the earth.

London Sends Photo, Gotham Gets It Before Clock Can Tick Off Half Hour. Movies May be Next.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 .- A portrait of the president of the United States was put on the air in London Sunday and 20 minutes later was reproduced in New York.

As the finished picture was removed from an oscillating cylinder in the offices of the Radio Corporation of America, the jiggling stylus which had drawn it remained poised for a moment. Then there was a buzz, the stylus perked its head this way and that and, putting its inky nose to the paper, traced out a panel in which it embroidered these words from an old Chinese proverb:



TO GIVE G. O. P. FULL SWAY

Democrats Will Adopt "Friendly" Attitude at Short Session. Senator Robinson, Minority Leader, Announces There Will be no Opposition to Program.

Washington, Nov. 29.-The Demoeratic party would adopt a "friendly" attitude toward the administration's egislative proposals in the short session of congress, beginning Monday, it was announced here today by Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader of the senate.

He added that the Democratic organization would co-operate in the passage of the appropriation bills.

Program up to G. O. P. Senator Robinson said it was into formulate the legislative program, and that the Democrats would not assume he initiative unless public necessity required. The minority leader added, however, it was not to be expected that many measures of general importance would be acted upon finally at the short session.

"The indications are,," he said, 'that among the subjects which will require atention are farm relief legislation, including co-operative marketing, the transportation act as it relates to the adjustment of labor disputes, rate making and freight schedules. It is doubtful whether any of these will be brought to a conclusion.

May Dispose of Shoals. "It is expected an effort will be made to dispose of the Muscle Shoals project, and the policy of completing this project by the government seems to be gaining support.

"Further tax reductions hardly can be accomplished in the immediate future, owing to the condition of the revenues, but this subject undoubtedly will be revived in the early future.

"It is not practical to expect the emergencies which may change the outlook for legislation in the short session, but the foregoing seems a fair outline at present."

World Court Plan Doomed? The proposal for American adherence to the world court was doomed unless the Republican senators had a mother to take care of him.-Boston change of heart, Senator Claude A. Swanson of Virginia, ranking Democratic member of the foreign relations committee, declared today.

AN OCEAN AIR MAIL LINE

America and Europe Soon Will Be Linked by Regular Flights Across Atlantic, Dr. Eckener Announces.

BERLIN.-A weekly mail Zeppelin ervice between the United States and Europe will be started soon, Dr. Hugo Eckener, director of the Zeppelin company, who had charge of the ZR-3's trans-Atlantic flight, says.

The Zeppelin-Goodyear combination did not intend to establish a passenger service for the present, he indicated but believed one Zeppelin each way weekly, carrying a half million letters at 25 cents a letter, would be a business success.

Dr. Eckener expects soon to leave for Spain to arrange for a Madrid-Buenos Aires service, operated on the same basis as the proposed weekly service to and from the United States. The dirigibles on this route would take four days going from Europe and four and one-half returning, he estimated. The airship of the future will be arger than the ZR-3, according to Dr. Eckener, who predicted the capacity at from 100,000 to 110,000 cubic meters. With such a ship, he declared, the North Pole region could easily be ex-

As a measure for affecting an easy landing for the big dirigibles, making a repetition of the trouble experiencd on the occasion of the Washington christening of the Los Angeles unlikely, Dr. Eckener suggests starting and langing after sunset, when little gas need be blown off.


