Paper pulp from Southern hardwood swamps may come to supplement or even replace the failing timber supply

Nine-tenths of a cord of wood produces one ton of paper, as compared with one and two-tenths cords of spruce required to produce a ton by the usual process. Similar satisfactory results have also been obtained with popular and birch, and experiments looking to the use of aspen, Addie Bell. beech and tupelo gum and similar

hardwoods are now under way. Many of these woods have only limited uses as lumber, hence their utilzation for pulpwood would be an important advance toward conserving the timber supply.







In that year Chicago consumed 14,436 carloads of white potatoes, only ninety-seven of which were grown in Illinois, although that state shipped six carloads to Atlanta, ten to Birmingham, nine to Columbus, thirty-six to Indianapolis, seven to Memphis, fourteen to New Orleans, and three to Philadelphia.

During the year of 1923 Indiana shipped four carloads of potatoes to Newark, four to Columbus, one to Boston and two to Atlanta and only three to Indianapolis in the exact center of the state. Conversely Indianapolis consumed 1,552 carloads of potatoes during the year, 1,549 of which were grown outside of Indiana.

During the same year Georgia shipped fifty carloads of potatoes to Newark, while New Jersey shipped twentyeight cars to Atlanta. New Orleans consumed fifty-four carloads produced in Wisconsin, while Louisiana was shipping four carloads to Wisconsin. Georgia sent two carloads to Indianapolis and received three carloads from Indiana. It is possible that southerngrown potatoes on their way north passed northern-grown potatoes their way south.

Of course the seasons have a lot to do with such haphazard methods of marketing, but intelligent organization and loyal co-operation and co-or dination can eliminate much of the waste incident to such a loosely marketing system. If the farmers' union can only save the uncounted thousands of carloads of potatoes eaten up each year by freight schedules, it will prove its right to live.-Oklaho-



TO AID PYORRHEA RESEARCH. University of California Receives \$105,000 for the Work.

If anything can be done by science to save our natural teeth from being replaced by better looking ones made by the dentist it is likely to be found out in the next five years by the University of California, for that institution has received a fund of \$105,000 for a thorough investigation of pyorrhea and its relation to other human maladies, to be carried out by the joint co-operation of experts from the various fields of science. Of this sum \$85,000 comes from the Carnegie Corporation of New York.

Besides this new field of somatological research the annual report of the Carnegie Corporation issued recently, announces the continuance of the support of investigations of insulin. This hormone has already come into general use as a remedy for diabetes and has precepitbly reduced the death rate, but little is yet known about its actual constitution and mode of action. 

The principal evaporation area effecting North America has not changthe majority of storms gain noticeable. Mechanics. force and apparently are organized east and south of this valley and usually make a short swing westward, moisture drawn toward itself by the storm wave is lifted after being partly precipitated by the Rocky range and passes over this valley to be precipitated by approaching that rising ground east of Winnipeg. As the storms swing back eastward they are usually too far south for this northern valley, therefore, when moisture is coming from due west or northwest, volleys located as the one from Edmonton to the Rockies have slight chance to receive sufficient moisture. While the planetary positions which

cause or establish evaporation areas make a contact that is of comparatively short duration, the electro-magnetic line of force started by this contact holds for a period which at times is extended to eight months. This electro-magnetic force grows in strength from date of contact until full force is reached, then wears gradually away, being replaced by a new area which is often established months before the old area has entirely lost its power of evaporation. The drouth in North America is expected to reach its full force by April 1 and to lose very little force before September 1. Minor evaporation areas are not expected to materially influence North American precipitation during this period, leaving evaporation area that will cause drouth with practically a free reign for the entire summer.
