Bailey Co. to receive disaster relief

Governor Rick Perry has requested the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency provide disaster relief and assistance for Bailey County. The county has suffered damage from excessive rain, lightning, hail, high winds and flash flooding that occurred on June 16.

The Governor is seeking approval from the USDA for Federal Emergency Loan Program assistance for agricultural producers.

Initial estimates report damage to 6,300 acres of cotton, 350 acres of wheat and grain crops, as well as 350 acres of grain sorghum. Damage to farm machinery and equipment is estimated at \$80,000/

Qualified farm operator in designated counties are eligible for low-interest emergency loans from the Farm Service Agency. Producers can borrow up to 100 percent of actual production or physical losses, or a maximum of \$500,000. The agency also offers additional programs, such as technical assistance, to eligible farmers.

buy a bigger crowbar, lay down your hammer, and go for the biggest sledgehammer you happen to own. You see, it finally dawns on

you that there is nothing particularly to be gained at this stage in this sort of project by over-much gentleness. It also dawns on you that, even though your wife really does rationally understand this, she'll be much happier buying groceries or shopping or working in the yard out of earshot from such serious destruction. She'll thank you later for your efficiency, but she's happier not knowing the details.

Juana was over watering our out-of-town neighbors' plants when our renovation project progressed to the sledgehammer stage. When she got home, she saw that I was making great progress and she just asked innocently, "Were you able to get the microwave unattached without breaking

I responded sadly, "No, sorry. It broke pretty much exactly at the same time as the sledgehammer hit it."

Understand, she had no particular love for that microwave. It was, we both knew, pretty much used up. Like our stovetop range, one burner of which hadn't worked for years and the other day started coming on just whenever it took the notion, this microwave had done well to last until the renovation began.

NEVER buy a microwave that opens with a spring-loaded pushbutton and not a simple handle. For more months than I care to admit, ever since I had to replace the old broken spring with a new and makeshift heftier one, it had taken more torque than one thumb can manage for anybody in the household to push that button and open that vault-I mean, microwave-door. I'd been expecting the plastic to give way and the whole button to shoot out through the opposite wall or put somebody's eye out as they were trying to get at their popcorn.

So, I really did try for a while to gently unscrew all the bolts holding that thing up (at kind of an odd angle; my installation had been less than level from the first.) We'd have sent the unit to the Thrift Store. We certainly were not going to re-hang it ourselves.

But the sledge was just too handy, and I can't tell you how satisfying it was just to take a good swing at that thing. I know-some frustrations you have to live with. But when God graciously gives you a way to appropriately remove one, you should receive His gift with gratitude!
