

Today the governor sent word to the house that the tax board wil meet today, so Rep. Phil Sander told the house if it did not want the responsibility of a 77-cent rate it must pass a bill, saying the rate shall not exceed 69 cents. Meanwhile the senate sought to get the governor to submit reduction of state salaries and appropriations.
