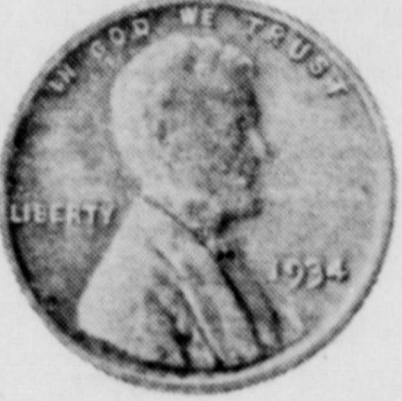
The test in Hico will be held at the C&C Motel Tuesday, June 23 from 10 A.M. to 12:30 P.M.

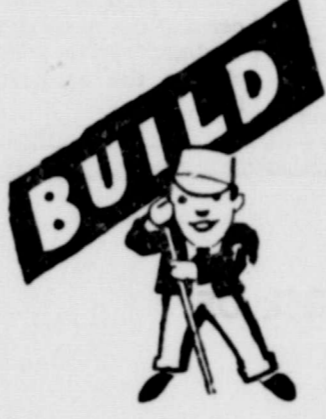

IT'S THE LAW—

Vacation Time Brings Tips On Accidents From State Bar

Vacation time is here. Soon millions of people will be driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident? At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory: 1. Stop. Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences. 2. Render Aid. If anyone is injured, render first aid, stop bleeding, call a doctor or an ambulance or both, do not remove an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury. 3. Protect the scene from further damage. You may be liable for damage to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at

night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicles. 4. Call an officer. Policemen, highway patrolmen, sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages. 5. Gather information, write it down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same. 6. Be careful what you say. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be misquoted. Whatever you say, make it factual. 7. See your doctor if there is the slightest chance you may be in-

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

I took ten 4-H Club boys to the District 8 Camp on Lake Brownwood last week. The camp was planned for the boys to have a good time and they did. The activities were well organized and closely supervised, but the boys had a choice as to the sport or activity they participated in.

This was the 15th camp in sixteen years under the leadership of the District Agent, R. G. Burwell. I have attended the last five as an agent and the first one—in 1948—as a 4-H member.

Mr. Burwell is a master at teaching leadership, sportsmanship and character building in an

atmosphere of fun. The boys learn without realizing it. This was emphasized in a letter which Mr. Burwell received from a Comanche boy after last year's camp. The young boy said: "Mr. Burwell, I had a good time. I didn't learn anything, but if I had eaten any more I would have bursted."

Actually the boys learned quite a few things. One example was the attitude of the boys at the close of the camp. Mr. Burwell told them the camp ground would have to be cleaner when they left than when they arrived. Boys gladly volunteered for the various cleaning assignments. They spread out over the grounds and picked up every little piece of paper and trash. The 200 boys went about their jobs without a complaint.

Claude Hoffman and Robert Sills helped take the Hamilton County boys. The two men were very helpful to us.

It seems we have a lot of disease problems on ornamentals and vegetables. Powder mildew is one of the most common diseases

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

State Democratic party leaders have completed advance preparations for a June 16 Texas party convention which could turn into a donnybrook or go off smooth as silk.

Action will take place at Houston's big coliseum and swank Shamrock Hilton Hotel, convention headquarters.

Delegates and alternate delegates who will cast the 2,834 authorized votes (some counties are sending up to 15 times their authorized strength) will be quartered in 27 hotels scattered all over Houston.

Big job is selecting delegates to the August national presidential nominating convention in Atlantic City and picking Texas national Democratic committee representatives.

Big argument is whether the convention will go on record as favoring the as-yet-written national Democratic platform.

Gov. John Connally, who claims a two-thirds to three-fourths margin of control, prefers that delegates remain silent on the liberal national program. He wants to write his own state party platform at the September state con-

vention along moderate-to-conservative lines.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough and state AFL-CIO President Hank Brown argue the convention not only should pledge its support to President Johnson (there is no argument there) but to his liberal program as well.

Some 26 percent of the convention's seats are in contest.

Highway Improvement Plan

State Highway Commission authorized a \$166,000,000 improvement program to get more safety and less congestion on 2,067 miles of primary and state highways.

Of the amount, \$151,000,000 is earmarked for construction, and \$15,000,000 for right-of-way. About 65 percent of the cost is expected to come from state gasoline tax revenue and license fees and the rest from federal grants in aid.
