Occasionally there comes to this a clipping sent to us by obnoxious readers in yonder land, and to say the least, some are real "stinkers."

Like for instance, this one which credits to Horace Griffiths of Lincoln, Nebraska, who credits something out in Lubbock, Texas with the contribution. It is written by Jack West, and carries a Washington dateline under the UPI banner.

The fact that the writer used Texas in the story entitled "The Lighter Side" matters not a lot, even though we do appreciate the publicity, and his penmanship does have merits.

Read the following and see if it doesn't make sense:

"Vast numbers of Americans have moved to the suburbs in recent years and sociologists have had a field day trying to explain migration."

"In California one of the Los Angeles suburbs is named 'Highland Palms.' I'll bet that every house has a leprechaun at the bottom of the garden."

"The naming of suburbs is deserving something that is good and fine about America—sullyng the tradition that gave us such splendid place names as Old Joe, Cucamonga, Calif., Silt, Colo., Peachy, Fla., and Hico, Texas."

Hico Student Among 32 Chosen for Summer Science Program

College Station, June 24—The names of 32 high ability high school students chosen to participate in a summer science program in mathematics at Texas A&M University July 13-August 10, have been announced.

Included among the 32 students is James Randals, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Randals of Hico.

The National Science Foundation and the university sponsor the program.

The list of students was released by the office of the NSF campus coordinator here. They are from Texas, Arizona, Ohio, Iowa and New Mexico.

Directing the course will be Dr. William S. McCulley of the Texas A&M faculty.

The students will hear lectures and participate in laboratory sessions with one unit of the program devoted to writing the "programs" for an IBM 709 electronic computer.

Participation in the program does not commit the student either to a career in mathematics or to attending Texas A&M.

Know Who You Are Dealing With Before Signing Cont.

What if some glib salesman signs you up for an encyclopedia or a set of pots and pans. Next day you change your mind. Can you cancel the order? Chances are you can't. The typical pattern runs thus: The salesman fast-talks poor Joyce Jones into signing an order for a set of cooking ware, silver, or what-have-you. She pays a nominal amount down, the balance to be over a long term. The price is high enough, plus a big carrying charge, but the installments run for a long time and at first look reasonable. When the shipment arrives, Joyce decides she doesn't want it, and can't afford it anyhow, so she refuses to accept it and tells the company she is cancelling the order. But poor Joyce is out of luck. The company promptly tells her that they "sold" her installment contract to a bank or financial in-

stitution, and she must now deal with them, not the company. The company thus got its sale price in full, the salesman his commission, and the new owner of the contract expects his money in full. Sorry, but it is too late to cancel the order. This is not at all like buying from a local store, where you can usually return the goods if the are unsatisfactory or if you change your mind. If Joyce ships the merchandise back, the company will most likely refuse to accept it. Moreover, the companies buying such contracts are hard-boiled about collections. If Joyce doesn't pay, they will not hesitate to report her to a credit rating agency, or even sue. The moral is, be sure you know who you are dealing with, and be sure you know what you are signing and the consequences. Highlights and Sidelights

U.S. Supreme Court's decision ordering both houses of state legislatures be selected on strict population basis will have a far-reaching effect on the Texas Legislature, particularly the Senate.

In the upper house, no county presently is entitled, by the Texas Constitution, to more than one senator. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith noted that under the new ruling five of the heaviest populated counties would be entitled to 12 of the 31 state senate seats, leaving 19 senators for the other 249 counties. This would create some senatorial districts 300 miles wide. Senate districts now vary from 147,454 to 1,200,000 population.

"The high court's laudable aim of equal representation for all citizens cannot be maintained in such circumstances," the Lieutenant governor said. "Equality will be theoretical only. No senator could serve such a great area as adequately as three of four senators (or even one) can serve a single county."

Lt. Gov. Smith promised to ask other lieutenant governors to petition Congress for a review and "practical relief." A similar resolution may be brought before presiding officers of House of Representatives by Texas House Speaker Byron Tunnell. However, it is doubtful how Congress could intervene except by submitting a constitutional amendment spelling out authority for states to have real bicameral (two-house) legislatures if they want to.

A Texas legislative committee already is at work determining how best to comply with a prior Supreme Court decision ordering congressional districts be formed on the basis of population only. Its work may be expanded to include a look at legislative districts as well.

Highways

Texas highways are now valued at \$4,500,000,000, Chairman Herbert

C. Petry Jr. of the Highway Commission announced.

Petry said every effort must be made to maintain a balanced system of highways, from the farm-to-market roads to the interstate highways, to serve all sorts of traffic.

Tax Revision Recommended

Texas Research League proposes the state's unemployment compensation tax on employers be more closely related to benefits paid former employees.

Benefit payments to unemployed have exceeded revenue for five of the last six years, a League study for Texas Employment Commission shows. However, the Texas Trust Fund, from which payments are made, cannot go broke, because a surtax is imposed on all taxpayers any time the fund drops below \$225,000,000 on October 1.

League recommends extending "experience rating" of employers to lessen the threat of having a flat rate surtax applied.

Short Snorts

Texas is working on a plan to increase park acreage seven times in 35 years according to W. M. Gosdin, assistant parks director.

Nursing Home construction in Texas is increasing, State Department of Health reported. A total of 186 homes went under construction in 1963. By June 1 this year, 94 more were underway. Department spokesmen said the needs for plush nursing home facilities have been saturated, and urged people considering construction of a nursing home to contact health authorities for guidance.

RAMAGE FARM HAS FIELD DAY AT HOOKS

The Jewel Ramage farm, six miles north of Hooks in east Texas, was site of a recent coastal Bermuda field day, sponsored by the Agricultural Extension Service of A&M. The Ramages are former residents of this area.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Two weeks ago, in this column, I told you how grasshoppers could be controlled by spraying with dieldrin, aldrin, heptachlor, malathion, or sevin. The grasshoppers are now mature and more difficult to kill by spraying. Some people are finding that baits are more effective, especially on the jumbo grasshoppers. However, now that most of the grasshoppers are in the adult stage, they will be very difficult to control with anything.

To prepare the bait use the following amounts of emulsifiable concentrate to mix with 100 lbs. of bran: three-fourths pint of aldrin or three-fourth pint of heptachlor, or three-fourth pints of dieldrin, or 1 pint of four pound Chlordane, or one and a third pint of toxaphene. Stir the insecticide in water and add one-half gallon of molasses. Use enough water to make a moist, crumbly mash. This will be about 10 to 12 gallons.

Spread the bait uniformly at the rate of 20 pounds per acre. Do not use baits on forage or grass being grazed by livestock. Keep bait where livestock cannot reach it.

All the insecticides recommended for grasshopper control are poisonous and safety precautions should be employed in applying these materials.

The annual Field Day at the Blackland Experiment Station located near Temple will be held on June 30. All interested persons are extended a special invitation to attend by Station Superintendent R. W. Baird.

Are you drinking more milk and eating more ice cream this month? June Dairy Month is almost gone but milk and dairy products continue to be a good buy. The dairy month theme is "Keep Cool With Dairy Foods, Summer's Hottest Values."

Average milk contains about 3.8 percent butterfat, three and one fourth percent protein, four and a half percent lactose sugar, and three-fourths of one percent mineral. Milk is high in Vitamin A and riboflavin and it is the best source of essential amino acid proteins and of calcium.

Thrips continue to be a problem in young cotton. It's very important to protect the young cotton and get it off to a good start. It is necessary to get the early fruit set if you are going to make good yields. One to one and a half quarts of Toxaphene-DDT (2-1) per acre is the most common thrip killer in the county. Spraying should not continue beyond the one-third grown square stage because it may create conditions favorable for a bollworm buildup. However, if fleahoppers are present in injurious numbers it may be necessary to control them.
