## Mrs. Morrison Elected to Presidency of Texas LVN

Mrs. Jimmie L. Morrison of Hico City Hospital was installed June 19 as President of the Texas League of Vocational Nurses during the 13th annual convention held at Corpus Christi.

Mrs. Morrison will take office in January, 1965.

Attending the convention from Hico were Mrs. Morrison, Mrs. Faye Simons, Mrs. Hazel Strong, and Mrs. Elvina Hicks.

Dr. H. V. Hedges also attended, and served as installing officer for the newly elected TLVN officials.

Mrs. Morrison is a charter member of TLVN, and helped to draw up the constitution and by-laws at a meeting held in Austin in January of 1962. The league was later organized in June of that year.

The newly elected president is also a charter member of the Tri-County League, which was organized in December of 1952.

This will be Mrs. Morrison's third time to serve as president of the state organization, having served as president pro-tem in 1955-56, and as president in 1966-67. She has served as a member of the board of trustees for six years, and two years as chairman of the board. She also served two terms

as president of the Tri-County League. Other offices held by Mrs. Morrison on the local level have been those of secretary, reporter, and parliamentarian.

Mrs. Morrison has been with Hico City Hospital since it opened in February of 1947.

The infant, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mack Phillips of Fort Worth, was dead on arrival at Stephenville Hospital Monday afternoon.

Peace Justice F. D. Hicks of Stephenville said he expected to return a verdict of natural or accidental death after laboratory tests were completed.

The peace justice said an inquest held Monday showed: The parents and son visited in Stephenville Sunday, returning to Fort Worth about midnight. The baby apparently was dead when the parents awoke before noon Monday. They carried the infant to Stephenville, where it was dead on arrival at the hospital.

In addition to the parents, survivors are grandparents Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Mills of Stephenville and Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Phillips of Hico, and great-grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Mills of Johnsville and Mrs. O. B. Leatherman of Stephenville.

Sixty interested businessmen and dairymen were served barbecue lunch at Hico City Park Tuesday of this week, a climax to a dairy tour held earlier in the day.

Hico Civic Club sponsored the tour and dinner in honor of area dairymen, and in observance of June Dairy Month.

First stop on the tour was the dairy operation of George Holladay. Here the visitors viewed the dairy equipment, pastures, and took part in a judging contest, won by W. R. Hampton, Norman Johnson, and E. V. Meador.

From the Holladay place, the group went to the farm of Truman Pearson on the Carlton road where they inspected his plant.

Following lunch at City Park, tour director Harold Walker introduced H. G. Murray of Abilene, manager of Central West Texas Milk Producers Association, who gave figures and statistics on the amount of dairy products marketed by area farmers.

Bobby Traweek of Dublin, one of the top young dairy farmers in the state, spoke to those in attendance on "Outlook of the Dairy Industry." Mr. Traweek stressed the importance of dairymen upgrading their herds to a point where maximum production can be gained at a minimum cost.

Those in attendance voiced their approval of the tour, and several expressed hopes that such an event might become annual affair.

## Tejas Bowl Gutted By Monday Fire

Three units of the Stephenville Fire Department fought a fire of undetermined origin Monday afternoon at Tejas Bowling Lanes.

Howard Burtshell, golf pro at the Tejas Club discovered the fire shortly after 1 p.m. The first units of the fire department arrived at the scene about 1:15. The blaze was under control around 2:30 but standby crews remained there until 4:30.

The fire started in the east section of the bowling lanes which housed the automatic pin setting equipment. Burtshell, whose pro shop is joined to the bowling alley by a breezeway, started pouring water on the flames which were coming out a door at the northeast corner of the building.

No estimate has been given about the amount of damage to the lanes, which are owned by Hugh Wolfe.

No official word has been received as to whether or not the lanes would be rebuilt.

## Game Warden Reports

Now that I have completed one month of quail census lines I am able to report the quail hatch-off should be real good this year. Although I have only seen one covey of small birds I have counted lots of pairs that seem to be setting. If this dry weather holds out the quail that do hatch should live to be grown birds. In studying quail we have found that most young birds fall victim to the elements by getting wet before they feather out, and catching pneumonia. We believe this is the reason when there is a dry spring we see more young birds than any other time. The dove population seems to be much higher than this time last year. Most of them seem to be seen around where there has been some grain harvested. They seem to be very large and fat and should be in fine shape for the coming season. With the good weed crop we have this summer we should be able to hold lots of these birds here until late in the season. Although this is not the prime factor in getting them to stay around awhile it sure does help. As most of you know the doves that seem to stay here during the summer appear to leave about the time the first or second cold norther hits. But with this good weed crop we should be able to get the larger northern birds to stay around awhile longer.

You folks that have places you intend to lease out for deer hunting should be getting set to find you someone if you haven't already. Many people have come by my office the last few weeks asking about places to lease. Most of the folks that want to lease a place like to do it early and then they will have time to build stands and look the deer herd over before the season. Mr. Wilson at Meridian Hardware will take your name, size of place, etc., and might be able to send you someone to lease it. If you leave this information with him, please be sure to tell him after you lease so he can take your place off the list. He is being real nice to handle this for us and I think this is the least we could go to show our thanks.

I am sure we will have doe hunting again this year. At the present time we do not know just how the doe line will run. But I think it will take in some areas this year that have not been in it before. The exact area will be outlined in this column later this year.

We have not had any more drownings in our area so far this year. So let's keep it that way and put on that life preserver when on or around water. The minute it takes to buckle it on is certainly worth the effort if you need it.



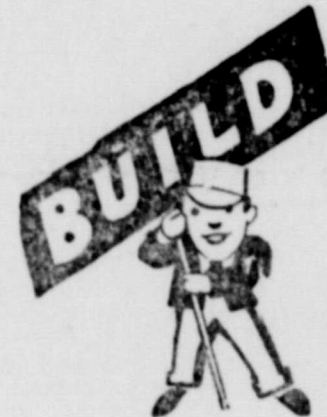

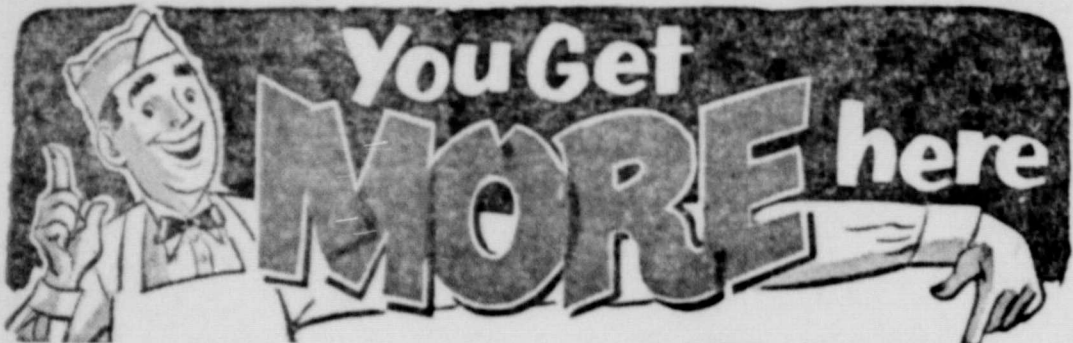

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Insects create a big problem during this time of year for farmers and all home owners. I get six or seven calls each day from people requesting information on certain insects and their control. Most of our insect problems are caused by very common species that seem to attack the same time every year. Their life cycles have been studied and we know which insecticides will control them. Often we come across an insect that is not common to us. This can be expected if you consider that there are approximately three-fourths of a million different species of known insects.

We have a staff of skilled Entomologist at College Station who spend most of their time identifying insects and searching for methods to control the harmful species. When I find insects that I cannot identify I send a few of them to the specialists. This happened last week. While I was checking cotton insects I noticed large numbers of insects in Johnson grass along the ditches and fence rows. They looked like gnats but were larger. Pee-wee Jones called me Friday and said he had found them in milo and cotton. Earl Smith brought in a head of milo Saturday that had several thousand of these insects. We collected about two dozen in a glass tube and sent them to the Entomologists. I don't believe the insects are causing damage, but they were found where there are large numbers of aphids.

I checked ten cotton fields last week and found some thrips in all of them, but in most cases they are not causing too much damage. At this stage it is best not to spray unless thrips and fleahoppers are present in injurious numbers. Additional spraying now may create conditions favorable for a bollworm buildup.

Bagworms are now causing damage in yard trees. Young worms spin silken sacs and attach bits of leaves as they feed. Three insecticides are recommended for bagworm control. They are Malathion, Sevin and Toxaphene. Apply insecticides early while the worms are small. Sprays are ineffective when worms are full grown. After they become full grown, hand pick and burn the bags, because eggs remain in the bags through the winter.

No screwworms were reported week before last in the five state southwest area. This was the first week that no screwworms appeared since the first week of March. The spell was broken early last week however.

Monday, June 22, a case was reported in Val Verde County, and the following day an infestation from DeWitt County was confirmed.

We have not had a confirmed case of screwworms in Hamilton County this year, but we cannot forget the danger of screwworms to our livestock.

Tourist Record Set

Large Texas cities attracted a majority of the record-breaking number of tourists who visited the state in 1963, Texas Highway Department reported.

Out of state visitors totaled 11,700,000, some 26 percent over the previous year. They spent \$532,200,000 to show a 12.8 percent increase over 1962.

Dallas was the stated destination of some 15.8 percent, while 14.1 percent were heading for Houston-Pasadena; El Paso drew 9.8 percent and San Antonio 9.6

Highway Department recently released this information in a colorful 16-page brochure available to the public. The booklet described results of the annual survey on the Texas Tourist Industry, and the cover depicts scenes from the state's outstanding recreational areas.

School Ruling

School boards have the right to make rules about students' clothing. State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar ruled in an appeal against an Andrews school board policy.

Mrs. Kenneth King of Andrews made the appeal which led to the ruling. Mrs. King contended that her third grade daughter, Vickie, should wear trousers to school to protect her health.

In upholding the school board, however, Edgar advised that the

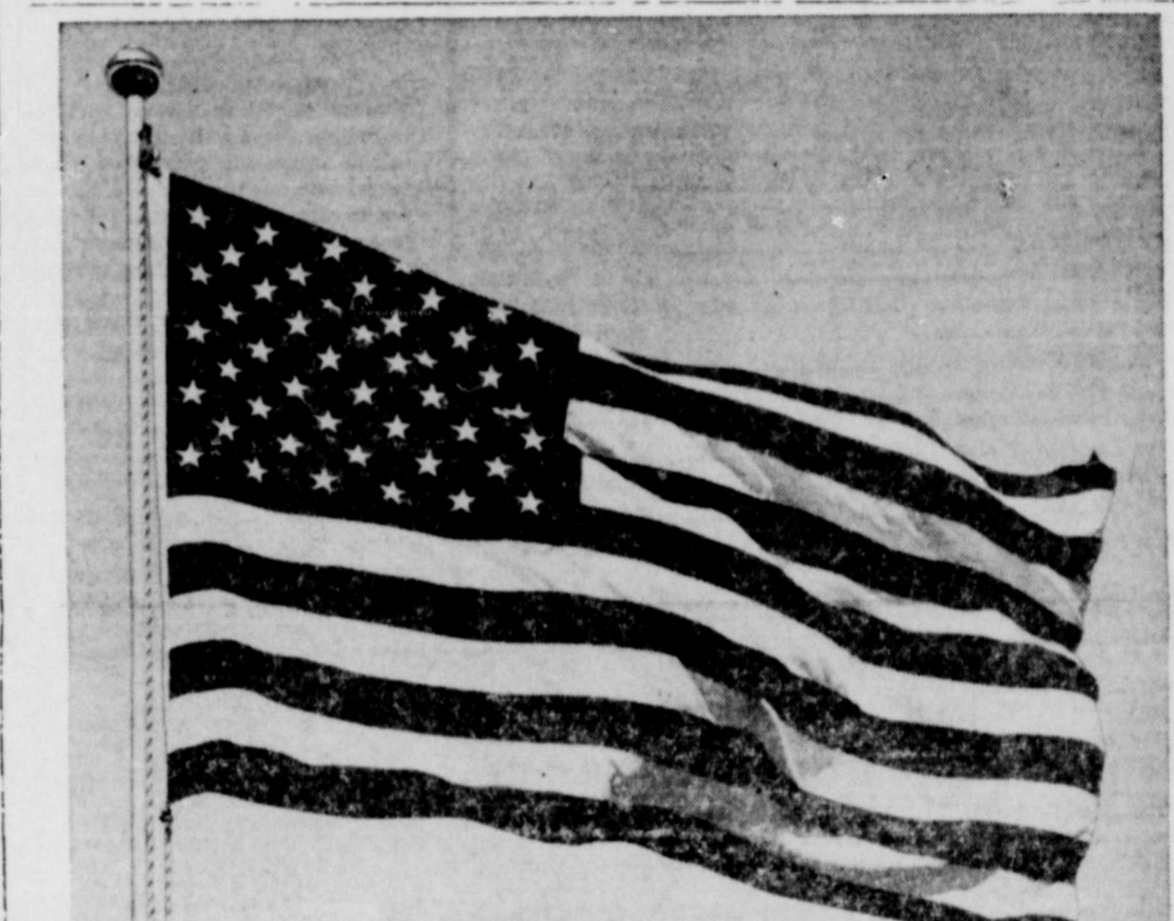

IT'S THE LAW—

Declaration of Independence Expresses Basic Belief

What do we mean when we say that in the United States we have a "government of law" and not a "government of men?" Basically we mean that we have certain individual rights, guaranteed by our federal and state constitution and laws, which may not be denied by any governing body.

The early American colonists had their fill of government by men, and the Declaration of Independence, signed 88 years ago, set out their complaints against that type of government and revealed their belief in a principle which we now accept as basic to our American way of life.

The indictments set out in the

document against King George 3 of Great Britain charged him with numerous violations of that principle. Among the complaints enumerated are the following:

"He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people."

"He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent for laws for establishing judicial powers."

"He has made judges dependent upon his will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries."

"He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good."

"He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation. For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury; for transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offences; For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our government; For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring them-

selves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever."

Our forefathers who subscribed to the principles of the Declaration of Independence were willing to fight for their beliefs. The Revolutionary War followed, dragging through weary years of suffering and suspense. Each of us takes pride in their eventual triumph over gigantic obstacles.

In 1787, when the framers of our Constitution met at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence had been signed 11 years previously, they set to work to create a system of checks and balances in government which was to perpetuate the fundamental theory mentioned in the preamble of the earlier document:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident; That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

"That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed."

Some five years later, the first ten amendments to our Constitution were adopted at one time, specifically detailing various basic civil rights stemming from the underlying theory of the Declaration of Independence.

Our courts day by day guard these rights for us.

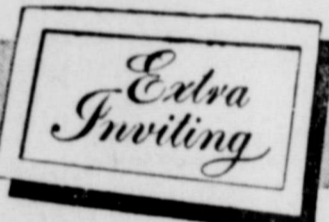
