





Business Strength Maintained

Texas' 40-month business upswing is the longest of the postwar era (except for the Korean War period), according to the UT Bureau of Business Research.

While the business activity index slipped two percent in May, average for the first five months of 1964 is seven percent above the same period in 1963.

"It now seems reasonable to expect that before any adjustment occurs, Texas business will surpass even the 45-month rise of activity from October 1949 to July 1953," Bureau Director Dr. John R Stockton predicted.

The average individual expects to answer for his own actions. He does not usually consider that he may be responsible for the actions of other persons. That, however, is frequently the case.

You may ask another person to do something for you, that is, to act as your agent. You may pay him, or he may be doing it without compensation. You may ask him to buy or sell property for you. The action may be to negotiate an agreement for you with a third person.

If representations are made by your agent in performing the task which you assigned to him, you are responsible. In a like manner, you are responsible for the contract made by him while he was acting for you.

It saves her many long hours of "shopping around"
