Despite sweltering heat the first day and rain the second, Hico's annual reunion played to about average crowds during its four-day run last week.

Temperatures near the 105-degree mark Wednesday didn't hamper the spirits as several thousand people lined main street to view the parade opening the 78th celebration. An equally large number was on hand that night as the Miss Reunion contest was staged.

The rain on Thursday didn't dampen spirits either, as a fair crowd ignored the elements to attend the Hootenanny, produced by J. T. Butler.

Friday night attendance was perhaps the largest for that particular night in recent years. Parking space near the park was at a premium with all available areas packed. Feature attraction was a performance by the Lone Star Playboys, who remained long after usual program time filling requests from the audience.

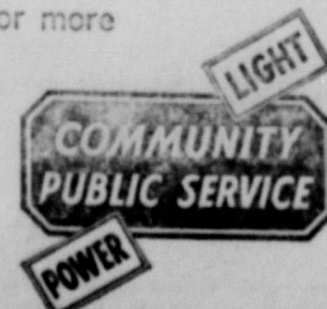

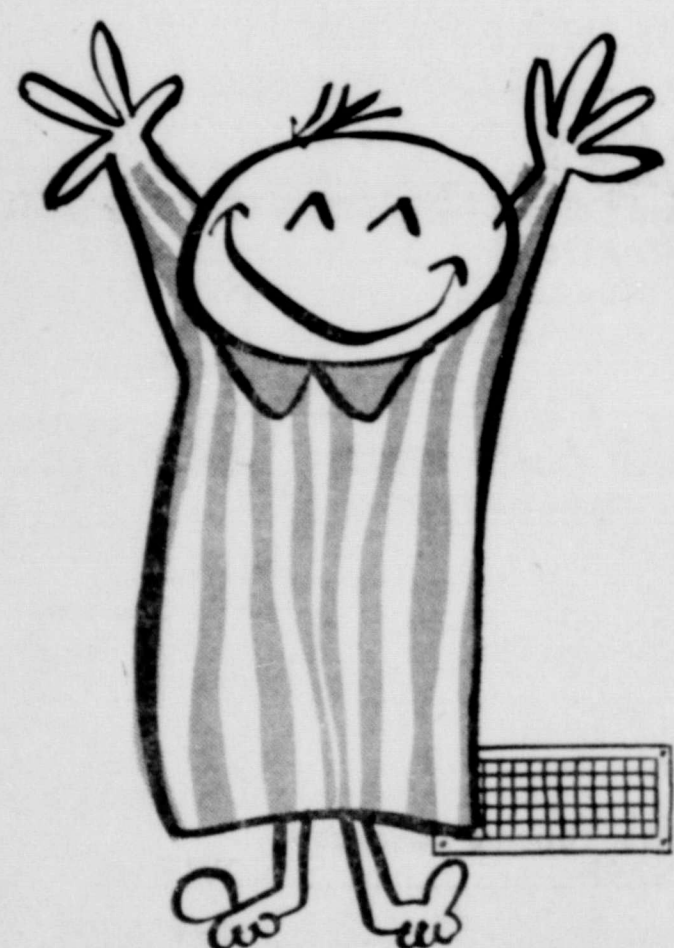

Cotton growers will be interested in knowing that on July 21 the Food and Drug Administration announced that they are tentatively approving the use of arsenic acid as a desiccant for cotton with a four-parts per million tolerance. This announcement is subject to a 30-day protest before becoming official, therefore August 21 should be the date for final approval.

Farmers who will use the acid before August 21 should realize that they are doing so without official approval and that they should be extremely careful to follow the instructions on the label. Excessive applications in order to speed up defoliation is not recommended. Neither should the desiccant be applied before at least 75 percent of the cotton is open.

Poorly adjusted cotton pickers may lose three to four dollars worth of cotton from each acre picked. Losing just one percent efficiency from your cotton picker can mean the loss of a dollar per acre or more. Poorly adjusted pickers commonly lose three to 4 percent efficiency.

The condition of your picker affects cotton grade as well as picking efficiency. Therefore, hundreds of dollars can be saved by putting your machine in top condition before picking season.

HAMILTON-CORVELL SCS News

Brush control in Texas and the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District is one of the major problems on rangeland today.

H. N. Smith, Texas State Conservationist with the SCS at Temple says, "Instead of getting smaller it is getting bigger." He says that "a new survey made by the SCS showed 88,500,000 acres of the state's rangeland, 82 percent was infested with various kinds of undesirable or low value shrubs or trees." He says "brush has moved onto nearly 5 million acres not infested during a survey 17 years ago. Stands existing have grown thicker. The brush spread in spite of efforts by many ranchers to control it. About 14 million acres of brush have been treated in the last 10 years. Stands of cedar, white brush, blackjack oak and post oak also thickened. Although experience showed control efforts to be generally profitable, most control methods are short lived.

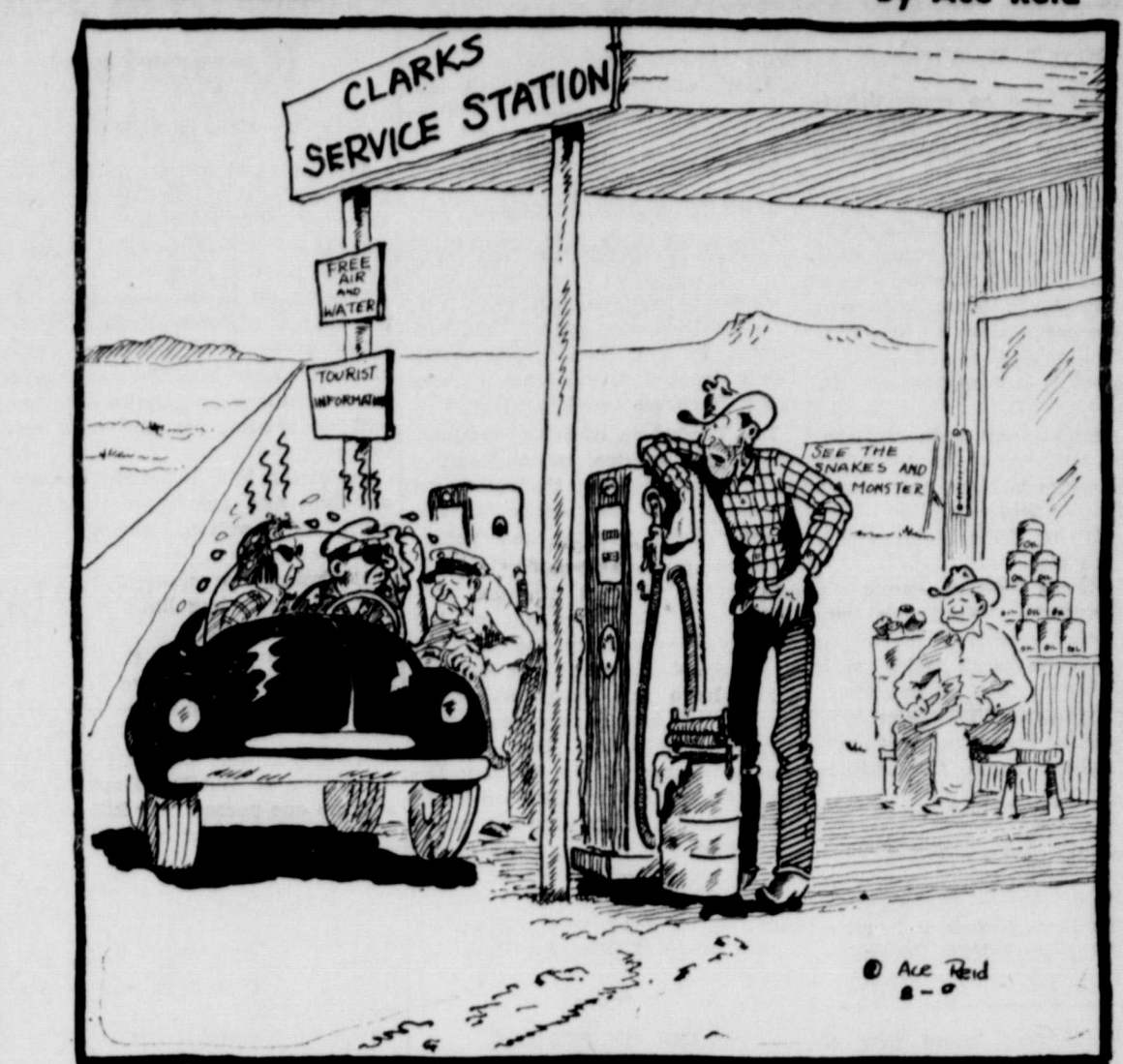

PUBLIC NOTICE

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law." Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the permanent school fund to the available school fund." Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"No, it ain't always terrible hot here, sometimes it's miserable windy or unbearable cold!"

The treatments in most instances only reduce stands of woody plants or opened up the way to other undesirable plants.

In the Hamilton-Coryell SCD there are 838,345 acres of rangeland, pastureland and non-commercial woodland. About 85 percent of that area, or 711,540 acres, is infested to some degree with undesirable brush that includes mesquite, cedar, post oak, black jack oak, cactus, prickly pear, tascajillo, liveoak, shin oak, and bigelow oak. At an average cost of \$8 per acre for control, the brush treatment cost would be about 5.7 million if it was all treated this year. The after care such as re-treatment and sprout control will cost from 10 to 30 percent of the original cost.

During 1963 approximately 15,000 acres of brush control measures was carried out in the Hamilton-Corell district. At this rate brush will continue to become thicker, and more dense because it grows faster than it is destroyed. Landowners that have a brush control program and maintain that control find that undesirable grasses such as needle grass, annual grasses and weeds are reduced when a

good range management program is carried out.

District supervisors of the Hamilton-Corell Soil Conservation District, and technicians of the SCS recommend that all landowners

work out a soil and water conservation plan for their land and include good range management practices such as brush control, range deferred grazing and range proper use.

### Game Warden Reports

By BOB RHUDY

I know most of you hunters are getting ready to dig out that gun and get it oiled up for the hunting season, which is only about a month away.

I don't think we could start off the season any better than by issuing a word of warning about handling your gun. Be very careful this season and make sure you will be around for the next one to open.

Following is a list of the seasons and bag and possession limits on game in Hamilton, Bosque and Erath counties:

Mourning doves, Sept. 1 thru Oct. 30. Daily bag limit is 12 and possession is 24.

Deer: November 14 through December 31. Bag limit two bucks except that by special permit only antlerless deer may be taken in areas which may be designated by the Parks & Wildlife Dept.; however no one person may kill or possess more than three deer in the aggregate.

There will be no antlerless or doe permits issued in Hamilton County this year.
