Progress Report Given For Upper Bosque Watershed

Much progress has been made by local sponsors of the Upper Bosque Watershed Program since the first easements were signed on June 9, 1963. To date, 91 of the 125 easements have been signed by landowners involved by the 28 flood prevention structures.

Sponsors of the project are Upper Leon, Bosque and Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation Districts, Erath, Bosque and Hamilton County Commissioners Courts, and the North Bosque Water Control and Improvement District.

Landowners have signed the easements with the above named sponsors. Purpose of the easement is to allow the sponsors to construct, operate, maintain and inspect the structures. An easement is needed on all land involved by the earthen dam and emergency spillway, the sediment and detention pools, and an area that will be inundated during emergency spillway flow.

The acreage involved by the individual structures in the watershed varies from 50 to 445 acres. Individual landowners have signed easements for land varying in size from one acre to 425 acres. All needed easements have been obtained on sites 5, 12, 13, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, twenty-five and twenty-six. On seven additional sites, only one easement needs to be signed on each site before they will be clear of all needed easements.

Those signing easements normally receive direct benefits from the upstream flood prevention program. The water in the sediment pools of the 28 structures can be used for livestock water, irrigation water (with a permit from State Water Board), for fishing and/or recreation. Water detained in the detention pools, following heavy rains, will drain slowly out the draw-down pipes to prevent flooding below the dams. Land in the detention area will get a good soaking as the water stands on it soaking it drains off. This has increased grass production from the area.

The size of the sediment or permanent pools on the 28 structures varies in size from 10 to 49 surface acres. The average surface area covered by water is 33 acres.

The 14 structures located above Stephenville are designed to handle the runoff from major rains of 50 to 100 year frequency. The 14 structures below Stephenville are generally designed to handle 25 year frequency rains.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

The hot dry weather continues in Hamilton County as farming and ranching conditions become more critical by the day. Most farmers are now hoping to have enough fall moisture for small grain grazing. Last year there was not enough moisture and oats and wheat furnished little or no grazing before late winter.

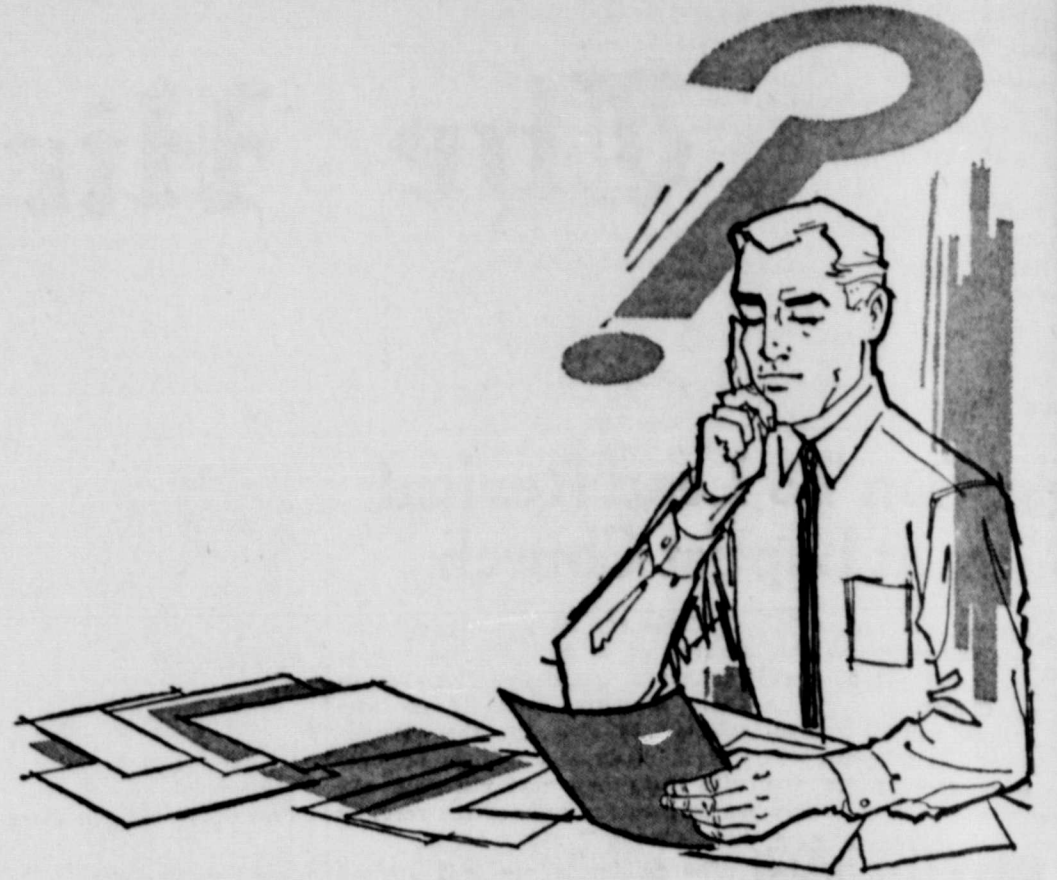
It is now time to consider the varieties of small grain to sow if you do not already have your seed.

M. J. Norris, agronomist at the experiment station at McGregor discussed small grains with the Hamilton Young Farmers on August 4. He named the varieties that performed best over a five year period on soils very similar to the Hamilton County soils. Moregrain ranks first in oat production. Alamo-X produces most as much grain as Moregrain and produces more forage for grazing. This year both Moregrain and Alamo-X averaged 95 bushels per acre at the McGregor Station. New Nortex is another recommended oat variety for Hamilton County and has been a favorite for several years.

The four varieties of wheat that have proven best over a five-year period at McGregor are Caddo, Crockett, Quannah and Kaw.

Norris also gave the experiment station's fertilizer recommendations on small grains. Apply 20 to 40 pounds of nitrogen and 20 to 40 pounds of phosphorus at planting time advises the agronomist. If the grain produces fall and winter grazing and moisture is available in January top dress with 10 to 30 pounds of nitrogen. If the small grain is not grazed in the fall and winter as was the case last year, there is no need to apply more nitrogen.

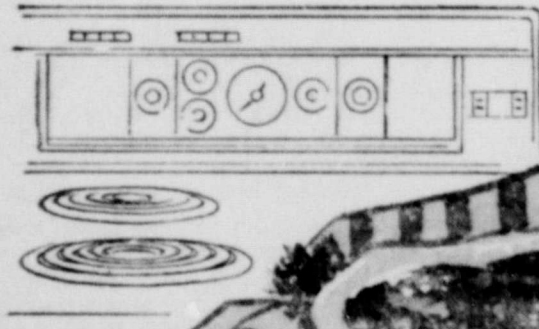

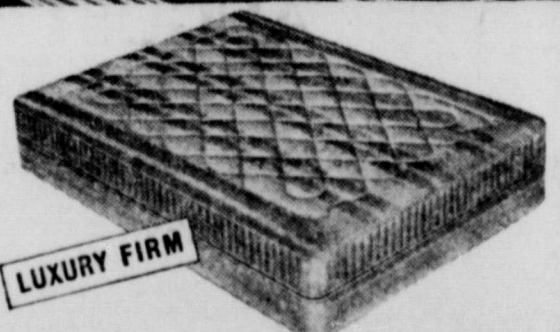

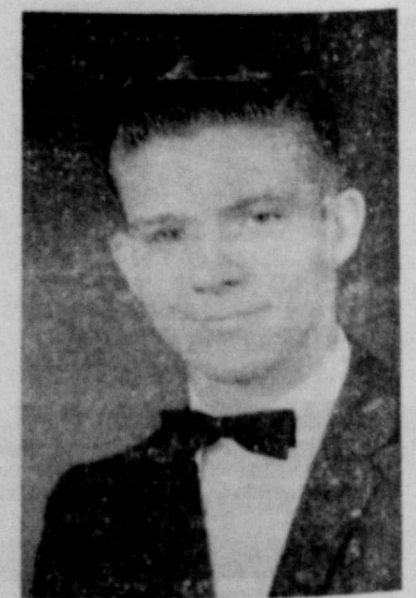

Highlights and Sidelights

Texas' progress in the field of race relations was commended by visiting federal officials in Austin to discuss aspects of the new Civil Rights Law.

Gov. John Connally met briefly with Secretary of Commerce Luther Hodges; former Florida Gov. LeRoy Collins, director of the new Community Relations Service; and former Gov. Buford Ellington of Tennessee.

Session was one of a series to be conducted with governors in all states at the request of President Johnson to discuss the Community Relations Service operation. Agency will provide conciliation service at the state and local level to resolve discrimination disputes.

Governor Connally predicted Texas will continue to move forward without outside help.

Meanwhile, Texas School Boards Association warned that action in the part of segregated schools between new and Labor Day may determine their continued eligibility for federal funds.

According to Department of Health, Education and Welfare officials on the Civil Rights Law, all the answers won't be known until new regulations are drawn late this month.

But the law has been interpreted as banning federal aid to segregated facilities.

Texas schools now get about \$30,000,000 a year in federal money for such programs as the national defense education act, vocational education, school lunch and milk program, and aid to districts

where federal installations bring in a large number of pupils.

al and legislative redistricting situation.

Moffett wants Congress to set that a state may have as much as 15 percent variation from the average population in its Congressional districts. He and Smith spoke in favor of the proposed amendment to the U. S. Constitution which would allow the Legislature to set up one house of the Legislature on a basis other than population.

Hunting-Fishing Licenses

New hunting and fishing licenses are scheduled to be sent to some 2,800 dealers by August 15. State Parks and Wildlife Commission announces.

Old licenses expire on August 31. More than 2,300,000 are expected to be paid during the coming year—at the rate of \$2.15 for fishing license and \$3.15 for a hunting license.

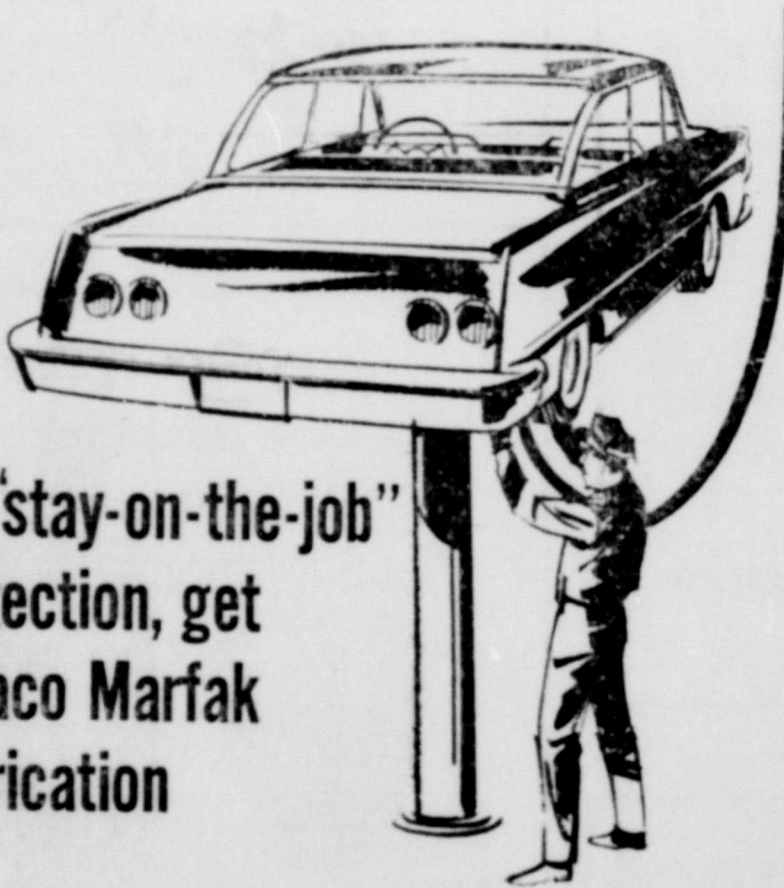

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

IT'S THE LAW—

Duties of Jury Explained

Jury duty is an experience everybody ought to have.

In a criminal case twelve jurors have a duty to do justice as each one sees it, and yet be unanimous. In most trials both sides have much to say, and the evidence is conflicting. The twelve jurors vary in their ability, temperament, character, education and their experience in the world, and in the question at stake.

Yet a jury made up of both sexes with wide age and educational differences, jobs and origins must all come up with the same verdict. Upon their verdict much depends—the life or liberty of others, and the public good. So it may take them days of talking among themselves, all to agree.

Jury duty calls for insight, common sense, courage, tact, fairness, patience, (especially toward the jurors who disagree with you), good humor, tolerance, balance, willingness to hear others out and change one's mind, readiness to go over and over the facts to find something to bring agreement. In short, jury duty demands a "decent respect for the opinions" of others.

More and more women share civic duties, especially as jurors. Time was in Texas when women could not serve on juries. They still cannot in four states.

A jury find facts. It hears and weighs evidence and then comes to a verdict. It does not make the law—the legislature does; and the judge "charges" or instructs the jury concerning the law applicable to the particular case it is considering.

The judge will tell you not to find the accused guilty until he is proved so under strict rules of evidence. If you have any "reasonable doubt,"—not imaginary or far-fetched—acquit the accused.

Civil cases do not demand a moral certainty, merely the "preponderance" of what you regard as

reliable and believable evidence.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler refused to consider the sale of 10 tracts of school land in Bandera County, explaining that he thought his own staff had set values too low.

Treasurer Jesse James reported an increase of \$459,999 in tax revenues for stamps on ale, liquor and wine from July 1963 to July 1964, for a total of \$10,000,000.

Attorney General Carr announced the recovery of \$52,425 against two defendants charged with operating slanted oil wells, making a total of \$800,270 in judgments which have been returned against slant-hole drillers and operators.

Tourist attendance of 16 key Texas attractions have served 10,100,000 this year, up 15 percent over the first six months of 1963, and will get better during the second half of the year, Texas Tourist Development Agency predicts.
