FINAL RITES HELD FOR LIGARD WHITE FINE

Funeral services were held last Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Baptist Church for Ligard White Fine, 73. Services were conducted by the pastor, Bro. James Gibson. He was assisted by Bro. Ronny Hoover of Ponca City, Ok.

Mr. Fine was a retired farmer and rancher, and lived alone at his home west of Carlton. He was found dead early Wednesday morning by a neighbor, Albert Ballard, sitting in his chair on the front porch, and it was thought he passed away around 10 o'clock

Tuesday night.

He was born October 24, 1891 in the Altman community, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney William Fine. On Dec. 24, 1916 he was married to Miss Sallie Frances Harvey, and to this union four children were born, two infants preceding him in death. His wife passed away Oct. 24, 1963. Survivors are a daughter, Mrs. Rex Jones (Mary Louise); one son, James Fine of Jal, New Mexico; his 98-year-old mother, Mrs. S. W. Fine of Carlton; one brother, Sid Fine of Carlton; one sister, Mrs. Willie Barrett of Dublin; three grandchil-

dren, Mike, Keith and Paula Fine of Jal; a host of other relatives and many friends.

He was a member of the Baptist Church, the Masonic Lodge and was a veteran of World War I, serving in the U.S. Navy.

Pallbearers were Masons from the Dublin, Carlton and Hico Lodges, R. L. Armstrong, Woodrow Springer, W. L. Gee, Harold Cline and Eddith Carroll of Dublin, Wayne Cozby and Sam Sharp of Carlton, and Paul Neel of Hico. Burial was in the Carlton Cemetery where Masonic graveside services were held.

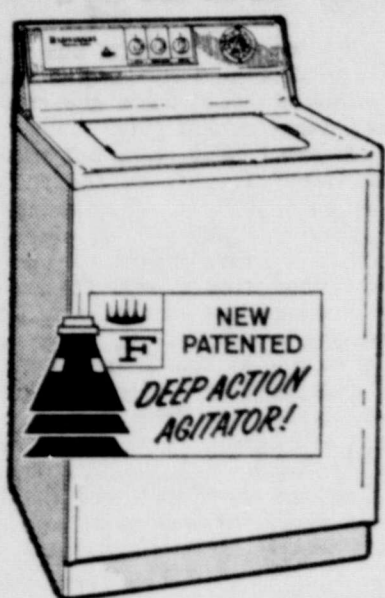
We received 7 inches of rain Saturday afternoon which was appreciated.

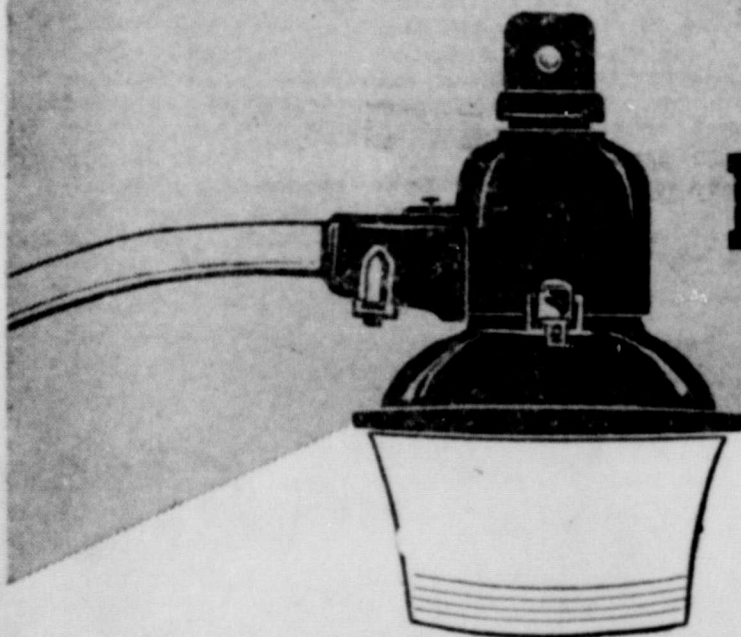
