Fall Term Set to Begin Monday Morning, Aug. 31

Hico Public Schools will begin the 1964-65 term Monday morning, August 31, with a regular classroom schedule the first day. Classes will begin at 9 a. m., and dismissal on opening day will be 2:45 p. m. Buses will run on schedule, and lunch will be served in the cafeteria.

Pre-registration will be held for high school students Thursday and Friday, August 27 and 28. Students are asked to register either of the two days between 8 a. m. and 12 noon.

A general faculty meeting has been scheduled for Saturday morning, August 29, at 8 o'clock in the High School Library.

Game Warden Reports

The new 1965 hunting and fishing license are now on sale. I would like to remind all of you sportsmen that have to buy them to be sure and do this before you go hunting or fishing. By doing this it could not only save some embarrassment but you can also be fined if you are in violation.

You do not have to have a hunting license if you are hunting in your county of residence. Except if you are hunting wild deer or turkey you must obtain one to hunt in your home county. If you are under 17 and over 65 years of age you must obtain an exempt hunting license to hunt deer or turkey. And if you are in this age group the license is good anywhere in the state. There has been a new policy put into effect this year concerning exempt license. You must register on a form which is available at places

from which you get this license. You may also be eligible to hunt on an exempt license if you are between 17 and 65 if you are going to hunt on the place upon which you are residing. Please do not ask the person who issues license to issue an exemption if you do not live on the place which you intend to hunt.

The two exemptions mentioned above are the only ones on this license. If you have been issued an exempt license to hunt on your place of residence and decide to hunt somewhere else return the exemption to the dealer and purchase a license which allows you to hunt anywhere in the state. He will remove the same number of deer tags from the license he sells you that have been removed from the exempt license which you are returning.

For all you landowners who wish to buy your shooting preserve license these are also on sale now and you can either stop me or come by my office. These licenses are only required of persons who are leasing their place for hunting.

Remember to be very careful this year with that gun and always take a little extra time to practice gun safety. The time you take to prevent one accident is certainly time well spent. And accidents not always happen to the other fellow.

Liquor Tax

Texas Liquor Control Board, which enforces liquor laws and collects taxes on liquor, wine and beer, has taken in \$332,483,997 more in the last 11 years than it has spent.

Its expenses during the 11 years were \$18,202,589.

Tax revenue is allocated by legislative act to old-age assistance public schools, aid to needy blind and dependent children, farm to market roads, teacher retirement, state hospitals and state employees retirement.

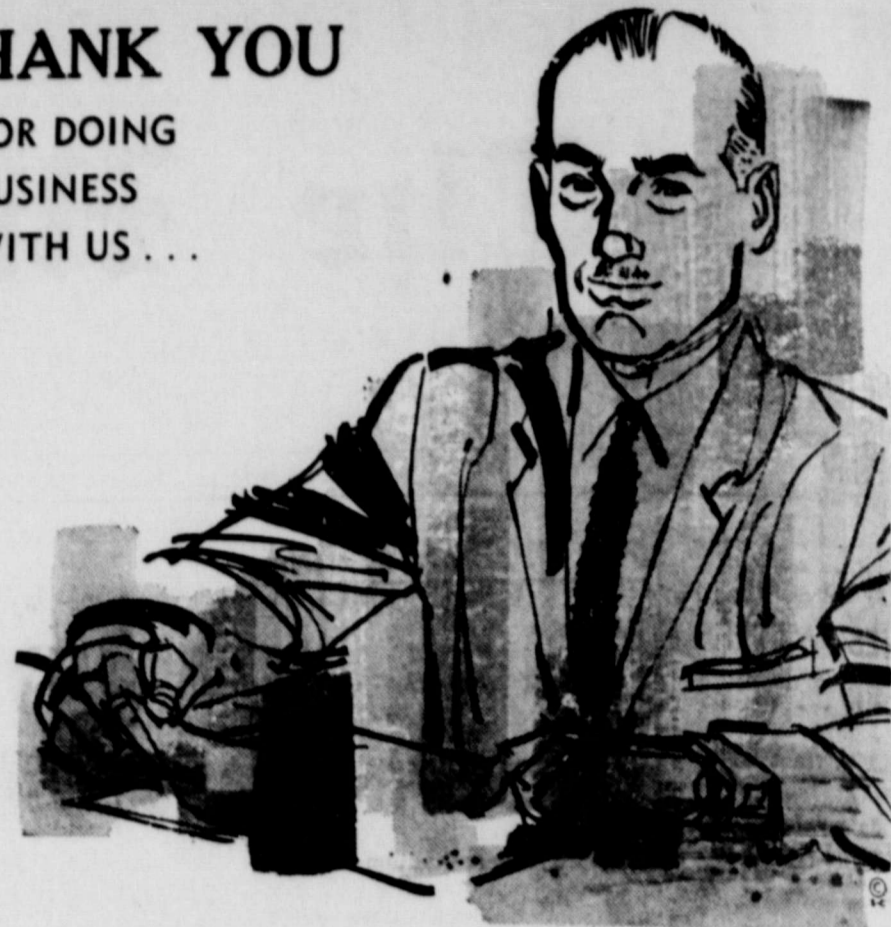

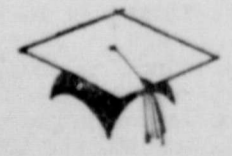

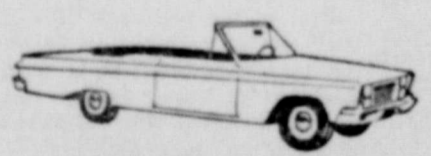

On the Home Range

Be Sure He Gets the Message

Boys are just as appearance-conscious as girls are. But while girls can use make-up and hair styling tricks to improve their looks, boys must rely mainly on good grooming to build self-confidence and present the best possible "front".

It is encouraging that some schools are expanding grooming courses to include boys, but this subject can also be taught at home. A reminder list will help teen sons to develop that "manly look". Why not tape the following dozen Do's and Don'ts to a boy's mirror:

1. Do bathe daily. A hot soapy bath or shower serves to get rid of dirt and "kinks" in stiff and sore muscles. A long-handled stiff brush, or some other back-scrubber, is convenient and stimulating to the skin. Rinse with a cool pounding spray and follow with a brisk rubdown. And don't forget to use a deodorant afterward.
2. Do keep face, neck and ears clean. Girls notice your complexion as much as you notice theirs, and you can't use cosmetics to camouflage blemishes. Help to prevent them by keeping skin clean; three or four soapsuds scrubbing daily is the rule for oily troubled complexions. Use a rough washcloth or a shaving brush, and suds the back of your neck and behind your ears. People see you going as well as coming.
3. Do shampoo frequently, at least once a week, using two or more latherings and plenty of rinsing. This can help prevent or lessen dandruff. Have your hair cut regularly to avoid a shaggy look.
4. Do keep hands neat. Scrub often with a well-lathered brush, and keep nails short, trim and clean. Use pumice stone to smooth any calluses or other rough spots.
5. Don't forget feet. Suds-scrub them when you shower or bathe, then rinse and dry them well. This

helps to prevent athlete's foot. Wear clean socks daily.

6. Do shave as often as necessary, using lots of lather. Wash your face with soap before shaving with a safety razor to make the job easier, and to cut down on the chance of infection if you nick your skin. Wash after shaving with an electric razor, to remove the fuzz that adheres to the face.
7. Do brush teeth twice a day. Clean, white teeth make for a winning smile.
8. Do change underwear, socks and shirt daily.
9. Do carry an extra clean handkerchief.
10. Do wear clean, pressed clothes.
11. Do keep shoes shined. They will last longer as well as look better.
12. Don't wear dirty gym clothes. Add them to the family wash every week.

Indications are that the 1964 crop of apples is going to be a big one, in fact there'll be more apples than any year since 1937!

Summer varieties like Starr, Lodi, early Delicious and Transport are already available at many markets.

Since they will be reasonable in cost why not surprise your family at breakfast with baked apples, hot from the oven.

Core apples without cutting through the blossom end. Pare apples one-third of the way down.

Place apples in a baking dish. Sprinkle the holes lightly with salt, and add 1 tablespoon sugar to each apple. Top with butter and sprinkle sugar over pared portion of apples.

Pour enough water in bottom of dish to keep apples from sticking. Bake uncovered at 400 degrees (hot oven) about 1 hour, or until apples are tender.

You would be wise to prepare your apples the night before, set your automatic oven timer and wake up to freshly baked apples.

Serve with jiffy vanilla sauce, or a topping of cream cheese softened with cream and beaten until fluffy. For variety add cranberries or crushed pineapple before baking.

"Apples in Appealing Ways," a USDA leaflet is available in my office with many suggestions on the use of apples.

Perk Up Cooked Green Vegetables
Don't serve your family the family the same cooked green vegetables day after day. Try these seasonings to transform your family's regular favorites into something special.

With snap beans or summer squash, cook a tablespoon or two of minced onion, green pepper, or parsley.

Cook a few mint leaves with peas.

Put a small pinch of herb or spice in the water when you cook lima beans.

A little vinegar and sugar heated together make a good dressing for snap beans or cabbage, with or without a few tablespoons of cream.

Point up the flavor of any green vegetable with meat drippings, butter, margarine, or salad oil with lemon juice, horse radish, or garlic. Or add bits of crisply fried bacon, especially to spinach or other greens.

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HAMILTON-CORYELL SCS News

About 70 cooperators with the local Soil Conservation District will receive stocker catfish when the fall delivery is made by the Inks Dam National Fish Hatchery of Burnet.

C. W. Allen who lives about 4 miles south of Hico on Honey Creek, has been busy getting one of his ponds ready for the new fish. The pond had been stocked with bass and bluegills about six years ago and had become overpopulated with bluegills, so chemicals were used to harvest all the fish in the pond. The pond is now being fertilized with 19-10-10 to rid it of moss and provide a build-up of food for the small channel catfish when they are delivered.

If you are to receive stocker fish, be certain you have made every necessary preparation to provide the fish a good home. Ponds that are overpopulated with small pan fish—red ears bluegills, etc.—will not furnish adequate food for the new fish. Such ponds may need a partial or complete treatment to reduce the number of fish. Fish which are large enough to eat can be saved for food and the remainder discarded or used for fertilizer.

Ponds can usually be safely stocked in three to six weeks after treatment with chemicals. Other effective means of reduc-

ing fish populations are by the use of small mesh seines or fish traps both of which are legal on the individual land owner's own farm pond.

Contour farming is a practice that might seem insignificant in a farming operation. Some land owners just don't like to bother with farming contour and point rows.

Contour farming can be done by plowing and planting crops on sloping land by following established guide lines or terraces. To achieve maximum benefit from contouring, row crops should be planted from the terrace up about half way between terraces and then start on the back side of a terrace and plant down to the area already planted. This will help to establish a furrow more

on the level than any other method. The ideal situation, however, is to establish parallel terraces, then there are no point rows.

Contour level furrows are especially beneficial on hard fast rains. The furrows will and hold the water until it has time to soak into the ground. On the other hand, where contour furrows are not present, most of a hard fast rain will run off to the low areas.

IT'S THE LAW—

False Credit Discussed

It's easy to buy things on time if your credit is good. But some people try to make their credit look good when it isn't. This can lead to the crime of "theft by false pretenses."

In a recent case Sam Saddington wanted a new car just like his neighbor's.

At the Super Car Agency Sam could buy his new car for \$300 down and 26 monthly payments.

The Agency asked Sam to sign a credit report. Sam reported that he made \$650 a month, had a \$65 car allowance a month, and his wife worked for \$400 a month.

Sam drove off with the new car. But when he fell down on his payments, the agency repossessed the car and found that Sam never did have the income he claimed. Truth was Sam was making only \$500 when he worked, and he had taken a leave of absence and had never gone back to his job. His wife had not worked for years.

The agency complained to the district attorney, charging Sam with theft by false pretenses.

Sam was guilty as charged. Though no one can be put in prison for debt, he can go to prison for fraud, if, when he bought the goods, he never meant to pay at all, any time. But it is no crime if he just happened to be broke but made no false claims.

Using another's credit card without his permission is also a crime, just as it is to use one's own credit card extensively, knowing full well that he cannot or will not make payment. Again, this is theft by false pretenses.
